## **Chief Executive's Foreword**

Since the last meeting of the Council was held in July, there have been great strides made in advancing the future provision of quality homes in Fingal. On August 25<sup>th</sup>. I was very pleased to have visited the site of one of the largest residential housing developments in the state with the Mayor of Fingal Cllr Adrian Henchy and Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien TD. A sod turning ceremony marked the commencement of the construction by Glenveagh at Balmoston, Donabate on a 32-hectare site which will ultimately deliver 1,200 A-rated homes. The development will comprise of affordable, private, cost rental, and social homes. The first delivery of homes will be in 2024. Creating vibrant and sustainable communities involves not only making provision for housing needs but also ensuring that amenities and infrastructure are of excellent standard for the people of the area. With this in mind, a significant portion of the overall site will be made available as a public space with extensive community, sports and recreational facilities open to everyone from the wider Donabate and Portrane communities. The Ballymastone Recreational Hub is a €10 million investment in state-of-the-art sporting and community facilities such as GAA pitches, soccer pitches, athletics facilities and playgrounds which will further enhance this area. I very much look forward to the completion of the first phase of this wonderful residential development and to see this new community flourish in the years to come.

In further positive news, Fingal County Council has once again been shortlisted in several categories for the Chambers Ireland 'Excellence in Local Government Awards', including initiatives in heritage, culture, and community. The annual awards, which are sponsored by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage, aim to acknowledge and celebrate the work being carried out by Local Authorities all over Ireland. This year, four Fingal initiatives have been shortlisted for awards:

- 3D/Virtual Reality Models of Public Realm Projects (Communications)
- Fingal Ukrainian Festival of Cultures and Communities (Festival of the Year)
- Restoration of the Great Hall, Malahide Castle (Heritage and Built Environment)
- Fingal Welcome Rooms (Supporting Sustainable Communities)

I would like to congratulate everyone involved with the submissions this year.

Fingal County Council has links with community and volunteer groups all across the county and it is this symbiotic relationship which helps promote engagement and collaboration in localities. We all know of many volunteers across our communities who strive to promote and improve the areas in which we live and work and we are delighted to showcase their efforts and shine a light on their endeavours. The IPB Pride of Place Competition recognises the immeasurable contribution made to local communities by groups and volunteers across the island of Ireland. The three groups representing Fingal this year in different categories are Garristown Community Council, Broadmeadow Community Garden in Swords and the Draíocht Arts Centre in Dublin 15. These three very worthy finalists have one key priority in common – Supporting and enhancing their communities. I would like to thank the staff in the Community Development Department who liaise with community groups and volunteers on a daily basis and I wish all the groups who will be at the Pride of Place final in November every success.

I would like to welcome Cathal Kearney to Fingal County Council as he takes up his role as Access Officer. In this newly created position, Cathal will promote awareness of accessibility and inclusion and will co-ordinate the provision of assistance and guidance to persons with physical, intellectual, sensory and behavioural disabilities in accessing our services. Ensuring everyone has equal access to our information and services is key and Cathal's appointment will be a great benefit to not only members of the public but also members of staff requiring supports.

Fingal has a long and proud tradition of supporting and curating the arts and I am pleased to announce that Sarah O'Neill will be advancing that work following her appointment as County Arts Officer. Having held the role of Deputy Arts Officer since 2007, Sarah will be bringing her expertise, extensive knowledge of the arts and vast experience to the role and I'm sure you will join me in congratulating her on her appointment.

Accessibility is much more than just physical access – it's about access to our digital and communication services also. Public services should be accessible and inclusive for all, regardless of one's age or ability.

The Learning & Development team continues to implement and deliver the corporate staff training programme for 2023.

Throughout July and August the team delivered **40** courses, attended by **452** staff and **372** training days were provided. *Getting the Most from PMDS* and *Introduction to MS Teams* were new courses introduced over the summer months and have been positively received by those who participated.

Wellbeing Update

The theme for Quarter 3 2023 is ‘Anxiety’ and looking at techniques on how to cope with it. In August, the seminar ‘ *Understanding Anxiety*’ provided staff with information on how to recognise the early signs and techniques to help put coping mechanisms in place. In September, a seminar ‘ *How can Anxiety Impact Sleep*’ will provide valuable

insights and practical strategies which promote a restful nights sleep.

September will see a focus on the roll out of the first Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) training course. The MHFA course is a 12-hour course (4 modules, each 3hours delivered over 2 days) that teaches people how to assist someone who is developing a mental health problem or in a mental health crisis. Throughout the next few months 60 staff will part-take in this course and will help to foster a compassionate workplace and become a pillar of mental health awareness.

**HSU – Health & Safety Unit**

The HSU conducted its proactive safety measures during the months of July & August with the completion of 57 site safety inspections and audits. From January to date the HSU has completed 215 site safety inspections and 32 safety audits. The Unit assisted the Training Section with manual handling training for outdoor staff and school wardens. Post the ‘effective date’ with regard to staff and FCC’s safety management system having transitioned to Uisce Eireann, the HSU continues to offer assistance to all parties through answering queries from seconded staff and attending safety meetings between seconded staff and Uisce Eireann staff. In addition to responding to general staff occupational health and safety queries the HSU to date has completed 81 incident investigations into workplace incidents, accidents and dangerous occurrences.

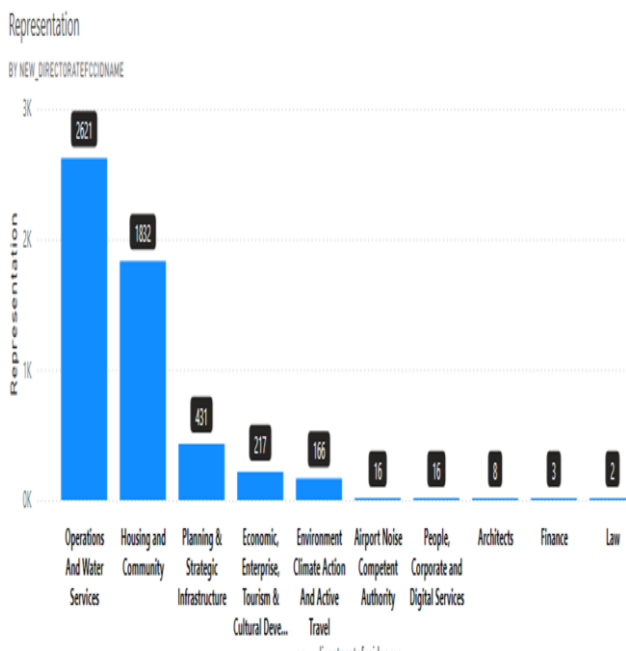

**CRM**

Staff continue to work on the Customer Relationship Management System (CRM) and issue responses to representations from Elected Members (Councillors, TDs and Senators) and complaints submitted by the public. The total number of Elected Members’ representations were as follows: July 700 and August 638.

## Digital Services

### Digital Working

In August, staff took part in 6,551 Teams meetings. 21,241 Teams calls were made, and 734,331 emails were received or sent by the Council.

1,126 support calls were logged by Council staff with the Digital Services Service Desk in the past month and 18 calls were logged by Councillors with Sord. 100% server availability and 99.98% network availability was achieved in the month of August.

## Infrastructure & Support

The Infrastructure & Operations Team continued with the Switch Upgrade Project in the Civic Offices and Depots. Teams Meeting Rooms projects advanced at the Civic Offices, Blanchardstown. A substantial program of work was undertaken which included the expansion of the Councils vSAN to enhance Disaster Recovery and Business Continuity services.

## Communications

### Website

The fingal.ie website continues to attract in excess of 100,000 visitors each month with July having 126,484 visitors and August delivering 109,685. Page views in July were 302,625 and in August they were 263,765. In July the average time spent on the site was 1 minute and 39 seconds and this increased in August to 1 minute and 46 seconds. The most popular pages over the past two months were Planning Applications, Recycling Centres, How to Contact the Council, Libraries and Jobs.

### Fingal Village

The Communications Unit organised the Fingal Village which was one of the features of the Flavours of Fingal on the first weekend in July. Many departments and sections from across the Council availed of the opportunity to create awareness around the work they are doing.

### Irish Language training for Councillors

In accordance with the Council's Irish Language Scheme all Councillors have been offered the opportunity to avail of an Irish Language Course developed by Gaelchultúr. This five-week course will enable councillors to communicate through Irish with the public and their colleagues. The course will begin Tuesday, 27 September and is being co-ordinated by our Irish Language Officer, Bernie Kelly.

### #YourCouncilDay

The annual Local Authority national promotional event, #YourCouncilDay, took place on Friday, June 23 when all 31 local authorities took the opportunity to showcase their work, people and services across social media using the

#YourCouncilDay hashtag. There were over 3,100 mentions on social media of Your Council Day with Fingal County Council generating the second highest engagement nationally on Instagram. The top piece of engagement nationally on Twitter was a Fingal County Council post about the proposed Sutton to Malahide Pedestrian and Cycle Scheme and on Instagram it was for the refurbishment of houses in Portrane.

### DCU Intra Programme

The Communications Unit assists the Intra programme in Dublin City University by taking two students from its Public Relations and Strategic Communications Masters course on a paid work placement each year. The work placement is the final module of the student's course prior to graduation and gives them valuable work experience. The students have worked alongside members of the Communications Unit for the past three months and will shortly complete their placement.

### Event Assistance

The Communications Unit assisted colleagues from other departments with the opening of Rathmore Park in Lusk, the launch of the Dublin Discovery Trail, the breaking of ground for the Ballymastone Recreation Hub, the Ballymoston Housing Development and the Harry Reynolds Road Pedestrian and Cycling Route.

### Media

The Communications Unit received 29 media queries in July and 35 in August. The majority were about the Planning Enforcement Order in relation to Dublin Airport. There were 15 press releases issued in July and 22 in August and these ones about the Fingal Girls TY Football and Fitness programme, the Vintage Picnic Festival, Amber Thursday, Balbriggan Beach Festival, and the installation of noise measuring systems around Dublin Airport.

### Social Media

The numbers following our corporate social media accounts continues to grow and there are currently 31,509 on Facebook, 7,583 on Instagram, 7745 on LinkedIn, 1,100 on You Tube and 22,883 on X, the platform formerly known as Twitter.

### Tourism Strategy 2023 – 2029

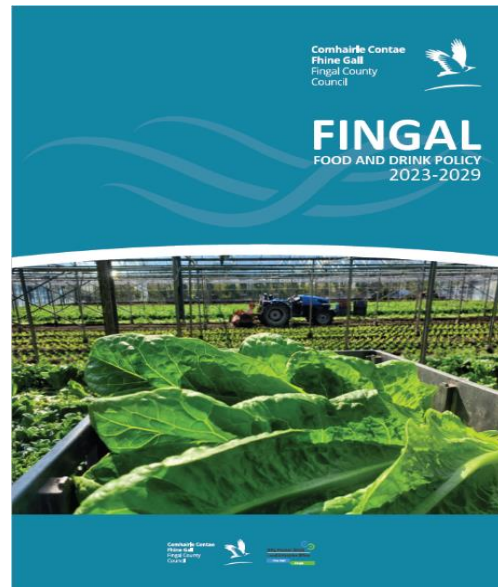


The content of the strategy and design of the document is currently being finalised. This document contains an executive summary, research and consultation findings, the roadmap for the lifetime of the strategy, vision, mission, approach, and four main objectives supported by strategic actions, key performance indicators and measurement tracking systems:

1. Dispersed growth
2. Product experience development
3. Branding, marketing & promotion
4. Collaboration & partnerships

The Tourism Strategy is scheduled to be presented to the EETCD SPC in September and the full Council meeting in October.

## Fingal Food Policy



Following feedback from the EETCD team, the revised policy was received in August. The document presents a strategic context for the policy, an executive summary, the policy itself, a vision for Fingal Food and Drink Industry, a mission statement, 6 Policy Principles, and a Food and Drink Strategy. It also includes a timeframe for the policy, year one high level action plan, guidance on governance, funding implementation and monitoring.

This will also be presented to the September EETCD SPC meeting, and if approved, to the full council meeting in early October.



## Fingal Food & Drink Network



Members of the Fingal Food and Drink Network participated in the Flavours of Fingal County Show in a dedicated Dublin Coast & Fields branded space. Local food producers showcased some of Fingal's finest produce while local and celebrity chefs conducted cooking demos also aimed at showcasing the best Fingal has to offer. The next internal networking and familiarisation event for the network will take place at McNally's Farm in September. The chair and other members of the Fingal Farmers group are also invited to this event to ensure further engagement with the wider farming community.

## Food on the Edge



Fingal County Council is working with the Food on the Edge team on a familiarisation trip to Fingal. [Food on the Edge](#) is a prestigious food symposium that takes place annually in Ireland, it is for chefs, food writers & food enthusiasts from all around the world. It is a great opportunity to promote Fingal food and tourism. The trip will take place on the 19<sup>th</sup> October and will be co-hosted by the Fingal Food and Drink network and local tourism development groups.

## Digital Walking Trails for Castleknock and Balbriggan



The two digital heritage walking trails for Castleknock and Balbriggan that now feature on the Dublin Discovery Trails App were officially launched by the Mayor and the Deputy CE during Heritage Week on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> August.

The launch was well attended by local councillors and a range of key stakeholders including Failte Ireland and local heritage groups who assisted with much of the historic content.

## EVENTS

### Fingal 10k

The Fingal 10k took place with over 3000 registered on Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> of July in Swords. The second event in the Irish Life Dublin Marathon Race series was very well attended and enjoyed by all runners.



## Cricket International

The Ireland v India T20 international series took place at Malahide Demesne. All 3 games were sold out with 8,000 in attendance per game. Games were also broadcast to an estimated worldwide audience of 100 million.



## Concerts in Swords Castle



The two sold out nights of concerts in Swords Castle were a huge success. Feedback received from all attendees was very positive. We also held the Swords Castle Free Family Fun Day on the Sunday and despite the rainy conditions there were big crowds enjoying the vintage games, inflatables, music, magic and more.

### Music Generation Fingal

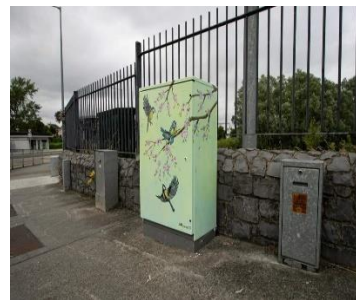
Musicians Éamonn Galldubh and Shane Latimer facilitated a pilot summer music camp for children aged 8 – 12 years. Both music educators are multi-instrumentalists, specialising in a number of music genres including Irish traditional music, popular music and jazz. Workshop participants participating in this 3-day summer camp experimented with the bodhran, percussion and ukulele while learning about Irish traditional and rock/pop music. The activities included learning new songs while those with previous musical experience could enjoy ensemble playing.

## Snugborough Road Interchange Underpass Mural Feature

Three artists from Fingal County Council's Public Art Panel have been invited to submit proposals for consideration on the theme of the natural beauty of the connecting parks, their wildlife and flora. The project will be delivered with the co-operation of the engineering team and BAM.

## Draíocht

A full programme of comedy, music, film, professional work for children and adults is on offer over the autumn season. This includes Coolmine Musical Society, 2 shows in Dublin Theatre Festival, a show programmed as part of Dublin and shows by our Children's Theatre Artist in Residence, Paul Curley, including a piece commissioned by Draíocht and developed with local children. Our Exhibition, Projects, Children/Youth Arts programme and Artist support programme is in addition. Working in partnership with the Arts Office, Dublin 15 artist, Justine McDonnell will have 4 -month residency in the artists studio. Working in partnership with the Community office is enabling us further reach into the community of D15 using existing structures. The 8- week Community Centre Choir Project (from mid-October to mid-December) is taking place in Mulhuddart, Huntstown, Castleknock, Ongar and Parslickstown Community Centres. Draíocht is covering the artist costs, with the Community Centres providing the space, hospitality and recruiting Choir Members from their own user base.

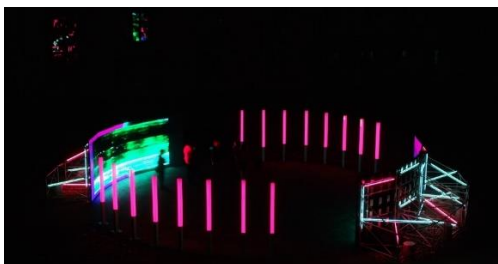
## Draíocht Artist Studio Residency Award



Justine McDonnell, a live performance and mixed media artist was recently selected for the Fingal County Council and Draíocht Studio Residency Award. This new initiative comprises of a four-month paid studio at Draíocht from September until December, a fee of €4000 and €1,000 materials budget. The purpose of the residency is primarily to provide time and space for an artist to develop their practice in a comfortable, practical and supportive environment. During the residency, McDonnell will be developing and composing a new sound installation alongside a live performance and photographic series.

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

### Fingal Skills Strategy



Fingal's TY Student Skills Expo 2023, to be held in partnership with DCU, is taking place on 3<sup>rd</sup> October and will be a one-day event at The Helix, DCU to promote future education and skills options to TY students in Fingal. Notices were sent to all secondary schools in Fingal and over 1,700 students are currently registered to attend the Expo in October. A final call is being made to unregistered schools to afford them the opportunity to attend.



The kick-off meeting for the SKYLA Project "Smart Specialisation Skills Ecosystems for the Twin Transition" was held in Brussels in May 2023. The project will have a term of 4 years and will focus on enhancing the role of VET in smart specialisation sectors. Projects partners include Italy, Poland, Sweden, Lithuania, Bulgaria, Greece and Belgium. Work has commenced on a communication strategy and stakeholder engagement plan. On June 20<sup>th</sup>, the Fingal Skills Strategy team attended training in preparation for the launch of the project website. The project's first formal communications meeting took place in July. Planning is underway for the visit of the SKYLA Project partners to Fingal on the 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> November.

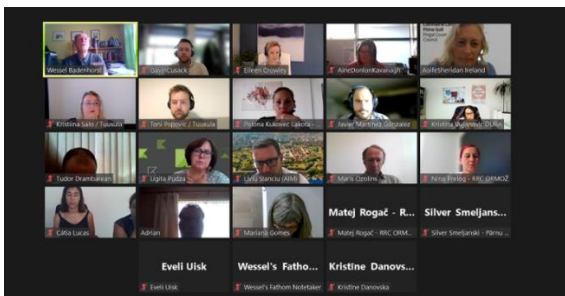




The Council was successful in its application to URBACT for funding to lead a network of 9 small cities/towns in Europe on local economic development called EcoCore. The programme officially kicked off in June 2023 with launch sessions for lead partners and project partners leading into the activation stage of the project. URBACT and Fingal County Council have appointed a lead expert to provide expertise and guidance throughout the project.

The project focuses on the challenges and opportunities for green growth and sustainable economic development along transport corridors. The project duration is 2.5 years.

Balbriggan is the lead town and the other partners committed to the network are Albu Iulia, Romania; Dubrovnik, Croatia; Kekava, Latvia; Ormoz, Slovenia; Parnu, Estonia; Santo Tirso, Portugal; Tuusula, Finland; Villena, Spain. The kick-off meeting for the EcoCore project partners was held on the 20<sup>th</sup> of July to discuss a roadmap for the project.

The first city visit by the Project Lead Expert took place in Balbriggan on the 24<sup>th</sup> of July followed by the initial URBACT Local Group (ULG) meeting on the 25<sup>th</sup> of July. As Lead Partner, Fingal and the Lead Expert are preparing the baseline profiles of all partner cities, a network roadmap for the project. The second city visit to Villena (Spain) was completed in August 2023. Representatives from each of the project partners are scheduled to attend the URBACT Summer University in Malmo, (August 28<sup>th</sup> – 30<sup>th</sup>) to build skills in action planning via URBACT methods. Planning is underway for the

first in-person transnational meeting which will be held in Balbriggan in November 2023.

### Citizen, Equality, Rights And Values Programme (Cerv)

CERV is an EU Funding Programme for citizens' engagement and the implementation of EU rights and values. Fingal County Council has been awarded CERV funding to participate in 2 separate projects, which commenced in January 2023 and will continue for 18 months.



## Green It Your Work

The third Green IT Your Work meeting will take place in the Municipality of Agia, Greece on 29<sup>th</sup> August 2023.



Representatives will be present from Romania, Spain Greece, Cyprus, Slovenia, Croatia, Italy and Ireland who are continuing work on the objectives of Green IT Your Work which are:

- Youth Debates about European Digital Age project highlighting the role of young people in the green transition.
- Promote green jobs with the aim of contributing to greener European cities

## InclusEU

The InclusEU project which aims to encourage volunteer action as a social response for an inclusive Europe will see Fingal host an event in Balbriggan from September 28<sup>th</sup> to October 1<sup>st</sup> 2023. This event will highlight the work being done by Fingal, Foroige, sports clubs and scout group to encourage more young people to get involved in community volunteering. This collaborative project has seen 20 young people from local clubs and youth groups take part in leadership and sports education training throughout July with practical sessions tied into local Fingal led projects.

## Let's Play Rush

The Let's Play Rush Project delivered a successful Community Sports Day at Tayleur's Point, following on from the success of last year's event. There was strong attendance in a full day of sporting games and activities.

Local families and children played with a variety of games provided by Let's Play Rush and competed in different races in an old-school style Sports Day. The event focused on promoting playfulness, social inclusion and healthy lifestyles in Rush.



## Sustainable Fingal



EETCD is currently inputting into the new Local Authority Climate Action Plan and aligning economic objectives and actions under the Plan.

The Council has collaborated with DCU and DAA to submit two funding applications on sustainable projects:

1. DIFFER is a proposal for a Feasibility Study of District Heating in Fingal & an investigation of the feasibility of district heating from data centres in Fingal to supply Dublin Airport which has been submitted to the SEAI – a funding decision is awaited.
2. ATLAS is a proposal to consider AI real-time connect on-demand mobility as a service which has been submitted to SFI for the Sustainable Communities Challenge. The application was not successful and work has commenced to re-orient the project into another funding stream.



The Mayor signed the Circular Cities Declaration for Fingal County Council, which was approved by the Council at its meeting in January. Work is now commencing on an action plan to advance the objectives of Circular Cities in Fingal. Fingal's profile has been published on the Circular Cities website

### Dublin Belfast Economic Corridor

Fingal County Council has been awarded €150,000 by the Department of Housing, Local Government & Heritage under the Shared Island Local Authority Development Funding Scheme for a Feasibility Study for the development of regional innovation/enterprise hubs along the Dublin Belfast Economic Corridor. The Council is leading on the project with the support of the eight local authorities and two universities of the DBEC partnership. KPMG have been appointed to carry out the feasibility study. KPMG has presented a preliminary options appraisal to the DBEC Directors and has been conducting further engagement over the summer period which will be presented at the next DBEC Directors meeting in September. It is anticipated that the feasibility study will be complete in Q3 2023.

### LOCAL AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT



### Fingal Local Community Development Committee

The Fingal LCDC continues to oversee and administer the key areas of LEADER and SICAP and the various Local Development and Community Development funding programmes under its remit. The LCDC also manages the Healthy Ireland Initiative and the Social Enterprise Grants Scheme. The next meeting of the LCDC will take place on 31st August 2023.



### Fingal Local Economic Community Plan 2022 – 2027

Consultants Grant Thornton continue work on the preparation of the socio-economic profile of the county for the new LECP, reviewing the last LECP, drafting high-level objectives, facilitating the consultation process and initial 2-year Implementation Plan. Initial consultation on the new Fingal LECP and engagement with internal and external stakeholders took place in June 2023 and Sub-Committees have been established to collate input to the LECP with an Economic Sub-Committee, a Community Sub-Committee and a Sustainability/Environment Sub-Committee. Public consultation events also took place in June.

Information on the new LECP was made available for public consultation and submission through the Council's consultation portal in July which was enhanced by an information webinar which took place on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of July 2023.

9 submissions were received and are available to view on [Consult.fingal.ie](https://consult.fingal.ie)

Work is in progress to incorporate the feedback from the submissions into the draft LECP and to review the draft LECP with key stakeholders is planned for September.

## Community Support Fund

The Community Support Fund (CSF) was launched in January 2023 and is funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development. Fingal was allocated €341,875 in funding for groups across the county. More than 270 applications were received from community and voluntary groups in Fingal for the current and capital funding streams by the submission deadline of 10<sup>th</sup> February 2023. The evaluation of the applications is completed, and payments of the grants to community groups/organisations is ongoing.

## Community Recognition Fund

The Community Recognition Fund (CRF) was launched in January 2023 and is funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development. Fingal submitted project proposals to DRCD for approval on the 15<sup>th</sup> March 2023. Fingal County Council has received an allocation of €1,748,912 under the Community Recognition Fund for 26 projects across Fingal.

There is an allocation of €850,512 for eight projects in Swords and €435,000 has been provided for four projects in Dublin 15. Three projects in the Howth Malahide Local Electoral Area have received a total of €92,000 while €96,600 will be spent on four projects in Skerries, Rush and Lusk. Three projects in Balbriggan will be funded by grants amounting to €44,000 while two projects in Baleskin will receive a total of €30,200 and one in Santry will receive €20,000.

60% of the funding must be drawn down in 2023 and 40% in 2024, with all projects required to be complete by 18<sup>th</sup> October 2024. The Fund is being administered by Fingal LCDC and consultation has been carried out with the LCDC, Local Response Forum and relevant stakeholders. The Council is moving forward with implementation of the projects, with work commenced on a number of projects.

## SICAP



The resources and staff of the Fingal SICAP Programme continue to be leveraged to assist with the Ukrainian Refugee Crisis response. The SICAP Programme continues to help in the response to

this crisis and is a central resource to the work of the Ukrainian Refugee Community Response Forum. Additional funding has been received from the DRCD to help with the delivery of services to Ukrainian Refugees in Fingal and additional staffing resources from the Ukrainian community have been employed on the ground to assist with this. Confirmation was received during December that the Fingal SICAP Programme has been allocated €304,369 in 2023 specifically for Fingal's Ukrainian Refugee Response.

Procurement for SICAP programme period 2024-2028 has commenced with the publication of documents on etenders in July 2023. Tender evaluation is anticipated to commence in September.



## Leader Programme

In December, the Dublin Rural LEADER Local Action Group (LAG) approved in full the allocated LEADER 2021-22 Transition Programme for eligible projects in the administrative areas of Fingal, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown and South Dublin.

On 26<sup>th</sup> January Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys, announced details of the applicant groups who were successful under Stage 1 of the 2023-2027 LEADER programme, Fingal LCDC was successful in Stage 1 to run the next LEADER Programme for the Dublin Rural LEADER LAG.



A series of public consultation workshops with stakeholders were held across the Dublin Rural LEADER LAG area in May to inform the new Leader Development Strategy. The Dublin Rural LEADER LAG submitted the new Leader Development Strategy on 14<sup>th</sup> July 2023 and awaits a decision on the evaluation of the submission.

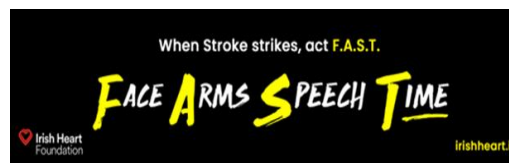
## Woodlands for Health

Healthy Fingal have partnered with Mental Health Ireland and the Sports Office to organise the Woodlands for Health walks. The programme brings service users from the HSE mental health services in Swords & Balbriggan to Ardgillan to interact with other service users and avail of mental health expertise in the calming and quiet atmosphere of the walking paths around the demesne. The occupational therapists are very happy with the impact on patients. A review of the programme was held in July with plans in place to relaunch the programme again in September 2023.



## Stroke Survivors Classes

Healthy Fingal in partnership with the Irish Heart Foundation and the Sports Office are supporting a stroke survivors' class in Dublin 15. The class, which started in May, will occur monthly (until December 2023) and is focused on older adults who have had cardiac issues in the past. The collaboration will see the addition of some low intensity exercise through the provision of a fitness instructor and used as an opportunity to provide participants with information and supports on quitting smoking and/or reducing their alcohol intake. The programme is open to anyone who has had cardiac issues, and anyone interested in attending can contact Katie [ksoden@irishheart.ie](mailto:ksoden@irishheart.ie) for more details.



## ENTERPRISE CENTRES

Fingal's Enterprise Centres continue to participate in ConnectedHubs.ie.

ConnectedHubs.ie is a one-stop-shop for remote working hubs throughout Ireland.



All three Enterprise Centres have space available to start-up businesses and businesses/ individuals who wish to avail of remote working options and facilities. Bespoke options or generic office fitouts can be considered.

Occupancy rates at the Council's three enterprise centres are all over 90%. The three Enterprise Centres currently support 65 businesses and over 320 direct jobs.

Demand for the new Remote Working Hubs in BASE and Beat remain strong following the Connected Free Voucher Scheme run in 2022.

Fingal County Council was approved for €50,000 in new funding to promote Remote Working Hubs in the County under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme Marketing Measure. A cross-departmental team within the Council is implementing initiatives to promote Fingal as a Remote Working Hub base for remote workers.

Drinan Enterprise Centre is promoting the availability of a bespoke media studio facility available for immediate booking to all individuals, groups and business interests.



## TOWN REGENERATION

### Our Balbriggan 2019 - 2025 Rejuvenation Plan – A Socio-Economic Strategy



The Our Balbriggan Programme Office continues to support the Leadership Group and its five pillars, who meet regularly, to progress work across a range of economic and social measures including: Growing the Local Economy, Public Realm & Infrastructure, Education, Skills & Employment, Community Integration, Health & Well Being and Community Safety. The Balbriggan Leadership Group, which is chaired by Professor Brian MacCraith provides oversight and stewardship for the plan's implementation. The Leadership group will receive updates on workplan objectives from all five pillar Chairs at Leadership meetings, the most recent held on the 26<sup>th</sup> June. A review of the Our Balbriggan Programme, its delivery timelines and governance structures will begin in the autumn where the programme will be realigned to the national URDF timeframe.

The Our Balbriggan Rejuvenation Project's Preliminary Business Case for the Call 2 funding was approved by the Department of Housing Heritage and Local Government in July, allowing for the drawdown of over €25 million euro in URDF funding for eligible project expenditure.

The Quay Street & Environs scheme is in final detailed design phase with works anticipated to commence Q1. 2024 and be completed on a phased basis in 2025, Tender documents to appoint a contractor are currently being prepared prior to being issued to E-tenders shortly. Replies to the Suitability Assessment Questionnaire have been received and have been evaluated. Irish Water are due on-site in Quay Street on the 4<sup>th</sup> September. Alternative car parking is available at Bath Road/Balbriggan FC & Bremore Castle. Communications to this effect have been issued on social media and other channels in Balbriggan.



**The pre-planning process for 2 - 4 Dublin Street commenced in March. Planning documentation was presented to the Balbriggan/Rush-Lusk/Swords Area Committee (Services B - Strategic and General Matters) Area Committee in May prior to the Part VIII being published in July going to full Council in October. 2-4 Dublin Street is to be transformed into a new Creative Hub. 8 workspaces at 2 Dublin Street and an ancillary connected space at 4 Dublin Street will support STEAM education, training and enterprise activities supported by SMART Balbriggan.**



#### Our Balbriggan Public Realm Strategy



A comprehensive Balbriggan Public Realm Strategy - Masterplan & Design Guide and a Balbriggan Active Travel & Transportation plan are complete with both expected to be published shortly.

Demolition works on 14 Bridge Street (house known locally as Keelings) began in early June and are now complete. The landscape design for a temporary pocket park at the site is due to begin. Annexes at the rear of DeBruns buildings are also being surveyed before being demolished.

Donnelly Civil Engineering Ltd and MWP Engineering are delivering a package of improvement works at Balbriggan Harbour, as part of a wider package of improvements. Work is progressing on the provision of new lights and shoreside services on the West Pier. The main Harbour upgrade works are scheduled to be completed shortly.



The Our Balbriggan Office continues to generate regular and unique content across all social media channels, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, LinkedIn with over 5.1k followers on Facebook.



### Town Centre First - Lusk

The structure, membership and Terms of Reference for the new Lusk Town Team has been agreed. Together with the Town Team there will be three Pillar Groups representing the Community, Business and Economy and Public Realm / Climate Action & Sustainability (to include Vacant & Derelict Buildings). The third meeting of new Town Team was held in August in Lusk Cultural Centre. A community briefing was held in early July to establish the Community Pillar which will support the Town Team in delivering a new Town Plan for Lusk with input from the local community. A local business briefing was held in July to establish the Business and Local Economy Pillar which will support the Town Team in delivering a new Town Plan for Lusk with input from the local business community. The consultants to support the

preparation of a new Town Plan have been appointed and are working with the Community and Businesses Pillars in Lusk to get their views for the new town plan.



### TOWN AND VILLAGE RENEWAL SCHEMES

The 2023 Town and Village Renewal Scheme was launched during the Summer and is the Town Regeneration Office is currently seeking expressions of interest for the scheme under its many project measures. Details are available on the Council's website or from the Town Regeneration Office.

The Regeneration Office continues to oversee the implementation of the Rush Streetscape Scheme. The Council has been approved for €100,000 in funding from the Department of Rural and Community Development for the Rush Streetscape Scheme and 30 properties in the centre of Rush have been approved for funding. Works continued over the summer period and a number of premises have now been completed in the town.



The Donabate Streetscape Scheme was launched in May and applications for this scheme were sought from properties in Donabate Town Centre. €36,000 in funding has also been approved from the Department of Rural and Community Development for this Scheme under the last Town and Village Renewal Scheme 2022.

The application made to the Town and Village Renewal Scheme Building Acquisition Measure for 2023 has been successful with €500,000 now approved for St. Margarets, The funds will be used to purchase properties to re-develop into multi-purpose community facilities. This funding, under the Town and Village Renewal Scheme, is designed to make towns and villages more attractive places in which to live, visit, invest and raise a family.

The Town Regeneration office submitted one application under the 2023 Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme for Skerries. The Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme (ORIS) provides funding for the development of new outdoor recreational infrastructure. It also provides support for the necessary repair, maintenance, enhancement or promotion of existing outdoor recreational infrastructure in rural areas across Ireland. The scheme supports outdoor recreation activities such as walking, trekking, cycling, kayaking and hiking. It helps to make use of the resources of the countryside that contribute to healthy active lifestyles. It supports the economic and tourism potential of the area for both local communities and tourist visitors alike.

The Town Regeneration Office was successful in July in securing €7 million euro for a new revolving fund that will acquire vacant properties to renovate, bring back into use and sell back into the market for housing purposes. An initial 18 properties under this fund have been approved for purchase by the URDF Round 3 Fund / Department of Housing Heritage and Local Government.

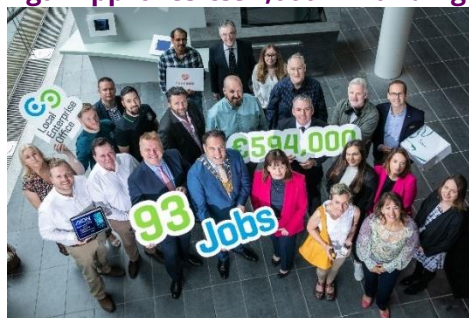
The Derelict Sites Section which manages the Derelict Sites Register was moved to the Town Regeneration Office in August further broadening the capacity of the office to deal with town centre vacancy and dereliction.

### **LOCAL ENTERPRISE OFFICE**



LEO Fingal provides a broad suite of support services to stimulate enterprise and enable small businesses to succeed. Some of the LEO highlights for July & August 2023 are as follows:

### **Leo Fingal Approves €594,000 In Funding**



Newly elected Mayor of Fingal, Cllr Adrian Henchy, joined AnnMarie Farrelly, Chief Executive of Fingal County Council and the LEO team to present successful grant recipients with certificates confirming that their businesses are supported by LEO Fingal. The companies were among 63 businesses approved in H1 2023 for Business Priming Grants, Feasibility/Innovation Grants, Business Expansion Grants, Trading Online Vouchers, and Export Development Grants, all aimed at stimulating enterprise and job creation. In the first half of 2023, LEO Fingal approved €594,000 in funding for eligible small businesses.

### **Management Development Programme**



The Leadership for Growth class of Spring / Summer 2023 graduated at a presentation of certificates ceremony held in County Hall, Swords on Wednesday, July 19th. The graduates have all produced Work Based Assessments which document their businesses strategic plan and acts as a living document as well as a point in time reference for where their business is now and the actions they need to take to grow. The next Leadership for Growth programme commences on September 12th in the Carlton Hotel, Santry.

### **Fingal Enterprising Women Network**





The Fingal Enterprising Women Network (FEWN) ran a very successful Summer BBQ event on June 21<sup>st</sup> in the Malahide Rugby Club. Two speakers Linda Monahan, Corporate to Calm and Denise “Inspired” Horan discussed how to make the most of your business throughout the Summer months & shared some great tips for small business owners. The event was attended by over 150 Fingal businesswomen. A Save the Date has been announced for the next event which will take Place on Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> September.

### Fingal Business Network



The next quarterly Fingal Business Network event is on the 29<sup>th</sup> of September in the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Santry and will feature a panel discussion with several Fingal Businesses addressing challenges and opportunities in their businesses in the areas of: 1. E-Commerce; 2. Expansion; and 3. Employment.

This will be the third quarterly Fingal Business Network convention of 2023, with over 200 business owner managers attending the previous two events. Fingal Business Network is a quarterly initiative where small businesses can meet and discuss their challenges and opportunities with their peers.

### Fingal Business Briefing



Fingal Business Briefing returns on August 25<sup>th</sup> 2023 for the Autumn Winter season where we will continue to run Business Briefings for small businesses and entrepreneurs in the Fingal area. The briefings outline the supports and services available to small businesses and individuals seeking to start their own business, through LEO

and other state agencies. Following the August Briefing, 150 individuals will have attended one of the 4 business briefings held in 2023.

### Energy Efficient Grant Scheme

A new Energy Efficient Grant Scheme has been launched in Fingal. The scheme which is being rolled out throughout the 31 Local Enterprise offices will enable small businesses to invest in technologies and equipment to make their businesses more energy efficient. The grant will cover up to 50% of the costs to a maximum amount of €5,000. The scheme aims to reduce the impact of small businesses on the environment and help them to reduce costs to enable them to become more competitive. Applicants must have completed the Green for Micro Programme. An information session will be held in September for Fingal businesses to learn more about this Scheme.

### Trading Online Voucher Scheme



An initiative under the Government’s National Digital Strategy, the Trading Online Voucher (TOV) scheme supports small businesses by allowing them to enhance their online offering by providing a grant of up to €2,500 for ecommerce and digital marketing activities, as well as giving businesses a better understanding of how they can exploit E-Commerce opportunities for their business. So far in 2023, a total of 55 applications have been approved in the amount of €116,218. The next Trading Online Voucher seminar will be held on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> September in RIASC, Kinsealy.

## Business Advice Clinics and Mentoring



LEO Fingal provides one to one business support services through Business Advice Clinics and a Mentoring programme, online and in person. The Fingal mentor panel consists of a variety of skilled and experienced mentors from a range of business backgrounds. To date the clinics have offered one-to-one advice and guidance to 673 clients in Fingal. The Mentoring Programme continues with a total of 167 clients receiving mentoring year to date.

## Microfinance Ireland Loans

LEO Fingal provides a loan scheme through its partnership with Microfinance Ireland, with loans of up to €25,000 per approved applicant. LEO Fingal is actively promoting the availability of loans from businesses that have difficulty raising finance from their bank. Applications are processed and assessed by LEO Fingal and submitted to MFI (Microfinance Ireland). Applications submitted through LEO Fingal are eligible for a reduced interest rate. LEO Fingal has processed and submitted successfully 9 MFI loan applications YTD.

## Training and Events

The new schedule of Business training and events for Fingal based small business owners and entrepreneurs has been launched and includes a variety of areas for business owner/managers to increase their business skillset.

The suite of business management courses and workshops include areas such as Marketing, Finance, Leadership Development, Social Media and Digital Marketing. The popular 10-module Fingal Start your own Business (SYOB) programme continues to help aspiring entrepreneurs to get their business off the ground. 82 participants have

embarked on one of 7 SYOB programmes year to date. There were a further 84 participants in the SYOB Bootcamp in LEW and 113 at the UStart programme for Ukrainian nationals.

## Internationalisation and Export Development

LEO Fingal is providing a further opportunity to small businesses that wish to develop export opportunities through its latest Export Development Programme which will commence in Q4 2023. In addition, the Exporter grant enables small businesses to explore and develop new market opportunities by providing up to €2,500 to businesses investigating and researching export markets. Export Grants have been approved for seven Fingal businesses year to date.

## Ukraine Enterprise Crisis Scheme



Assistance for business energy costs is being awarded to qualifying businesses affected by the increase in input costs or supply chain issues in relation to the Ukraine war. Applications are now open to Fingal based businesses.

## Digital Start



The Digital Start Programme provides support to obtain digital strategy, technical and/or advisory services for eligible businesses. Digital consultants help to develop a unique digital strategy that transforms businesses by identifying they are on their digital business journey, developing a digital adaptation plan based on identified need and assisting to implement a digital plan. Ten Fingal businesses have benefited from the programme thus far in 2023.

## Evaluations and Approvals Committee

The Evaluation and Approvals Committee (EVAC) meeting met on 28<sup>th</sup> June and approved €152,000 in funding across Business Feasibility, Priming and Expansion Grants. Year to date €558,200 has been approved across twenty-two applications by Fingal Businesses. A further 2 Agile Innovation grants to the value of €101,000 have also been approved in 2023. The next EVAC meeting is Tuesday 29th August.

## Showcase Ireland 2024



Showcase Ireland 2024 will take place from 21<sup>st</sup> – 23<sup>rd</sup> January 2024 at the RDS, Dublin. Showcase is presented by Design & Crafts Council Ireland, Enterprise Ireland and Local Enterprise Offices and supported by the Department of Enterprise, Trade and Employment. This four-day trade show is recognised as one Ireland's largest international trade shows and offers manufacturers, designers and craft makers the opportunity to exhibit their new collections. LEO Fingal have been allocated 8 stands for this event. Following a selection process, there is now a panel of 13 business, the first 8 successful applicants on the panel have been sent to the Showcase Ireland 2024 Committee – Prints of Ireland (Skerries), LuLu & Belle (Rush) and Stories by Ola (Skerries), Nicola Weldon (Balbriggan), Clémence Prosen Art & Design (Balbriggan), Rob Stears Illustrations (Castleknock),

Waylon & Flo (Skerries), Luxie Kids - Trading as BabyDub (Donabate)

## The National Ploughing Championships 2023

Laois where over 250,000 consumers will visit a 50-acre exhibition and trade arena. Each year the Local Enterprise Offices host a Local Enterprise Village to provide an opportunity for clients to take full advantage of this unique consumer event. Each Local Enterprise Office hosts a competition for one suitable business for the event and this year Milk Bath (Lusk) was successful and will represent Fingal at Ploughing.

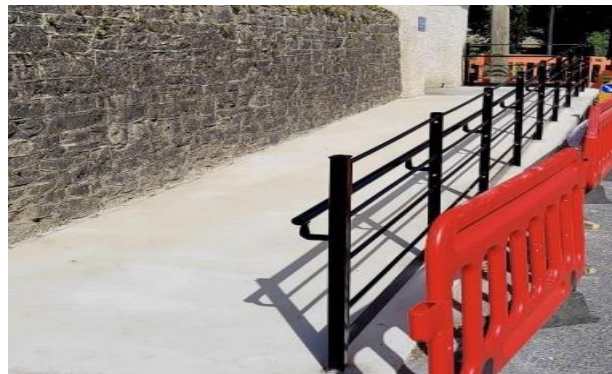

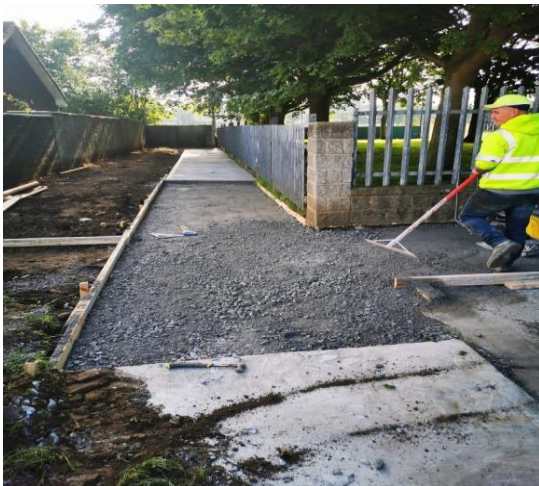

### Storm Betty

One of the main reasons for tree failing after Storm Betty is due to a reduction in the cohesion between roots and the surrounding soil, along with high winds which can increase the chances of a tree failing. When a soil becomes very wet the friction between the soil particles reduces and consequently the cohesion between the soil and a tree's roots is also reduced. This can lead to roots under tension, 'slipping' through soil. If these wet conditions occur during high or even gusty winds particularly while the tree is in full leaf, which adds to the 'sail affect' or loading on the tree, then the chance of failure (up-rooting) is greatly increased.

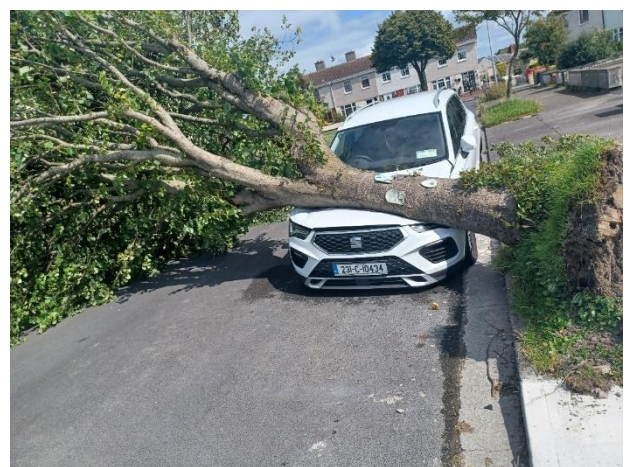

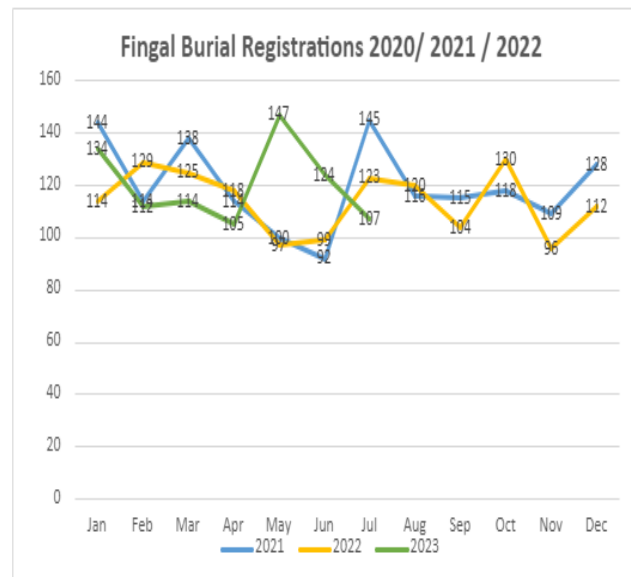

### **Fleet Management & Plant Hire Unit**

82 hires were put in place from 01/08/2023–28/08/2023, engaging 22 suppliers.

### **Street Lighting LED Programme**

The Public Lighting Section will continue with the LED Programme in 2023 with 99.1% of all lights switched to LEDs.

100% of new Decorative LED fittings have been installed county wide.



Faults reduce to 0.29 % of overall numbers of lights. The Public Lighting Area Works Programme is well under way across the county with several jobs complete. (Mourneview Estate - Skerries, Red Arches – Car park, Manorfields Pedway). 2023 funding for specific public lighting projects to light up necessary walkways and connections to schools and buses will be assessed on a case-by-case basis.

### Beaches and Lifeguard Service

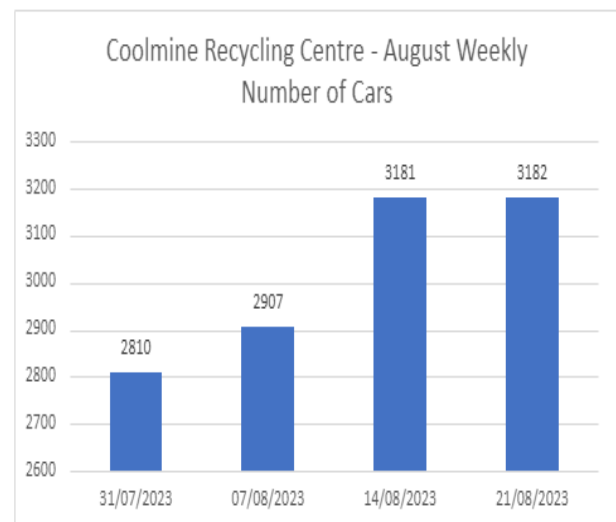
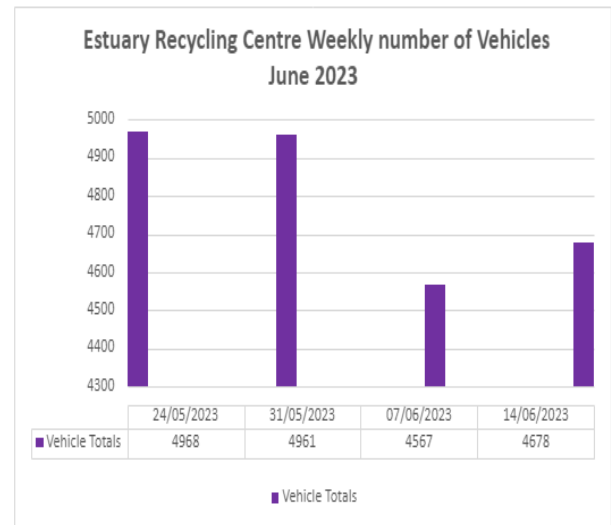
Fingal County Council sought to employ 45 beach lifeguards for the 2023 Bathing Season an increase of 5 on last year. However, following a rigorous recruitment process, the Council secured just 26 lifeguards for the season ahead. Last year we were successful in employing 35. The availability of qualified and interested candidates has gradually reduced over the past number of years. The WSDO has been in contact with some of the trainers, who have advised that the two-year closure of pools had a significant adverse impact on the training of potential candidates. It is noted that this is a national issue affecting numerous local authorities.

The reduced number of lifeguards for the 2023 Bathing Season meant that Portrane, Rush North and Loughshinny lifeguard stations did not open for the season, with Balbriggan and Howth opening part-time. The remaining stations operated as normal.

The service for our non-blue flag beaches concluded on Sunday 27th August. As Portmarnock, Donabate and Rush South are Blue Flag Beached they will be lifeguard weekends only until Sunday 10th September 2023.

The Council will publish on its website [www.Fingal.ie](http://www.Fingal.ie) and through its social media platforms, notice of manned lifeguard stations for the Blue Flag Weekends.

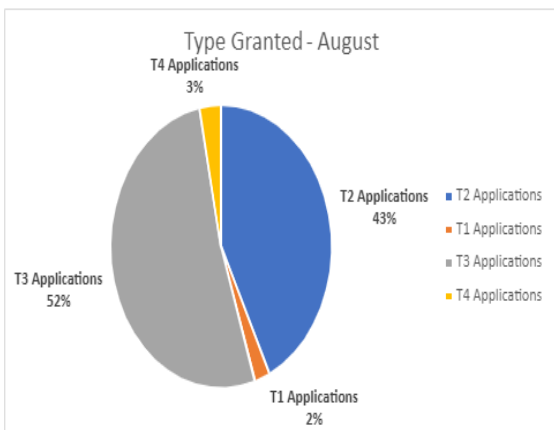
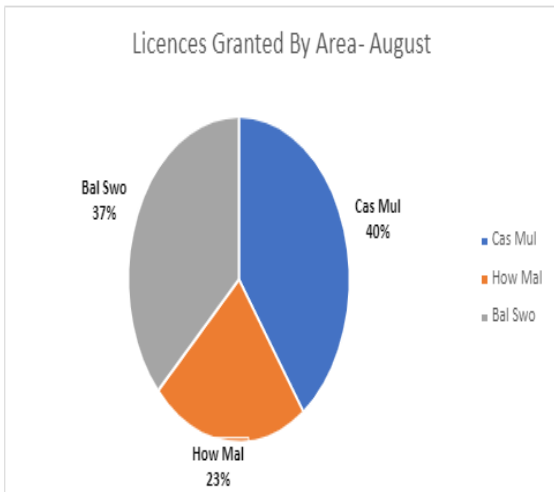
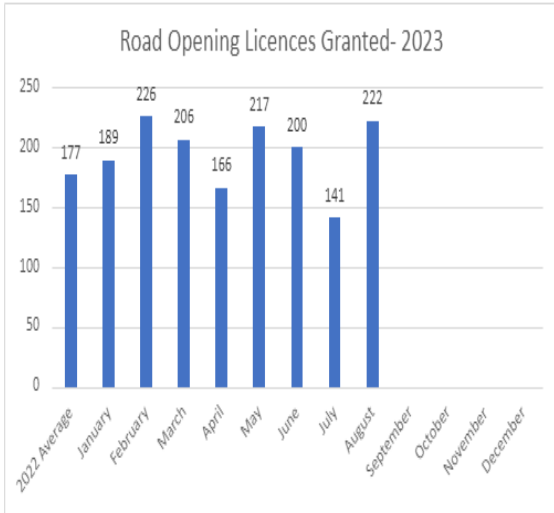
### Licenses

#### - Road Opening License's

The Licensing unit continues to process and manage the licensing system for the County. Applications are allocated by area for examination and conditioning which includes reviews of the existing carriageway, footpaths, cycleways, and grass verges.

Applicants submit temporary traffic management plans for review to ensure all works are carried out safely within the public domain. Road Opening Licences are a cross functional process for the department and are essential for the asset management of Fingal County Council Road network.

222 Licences were granted in the month of **August**, **55%** of which were granted by way of automation. Clerk of Works in each area continue to carry out regular inspections following road opening works by utilities.



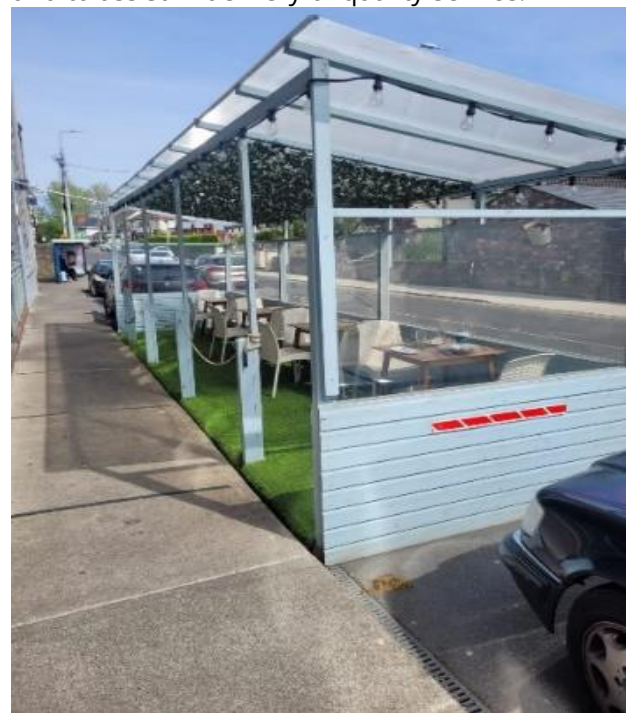
**Casual Trading License**

Fingal County Council currently have 30 Casual Trading Pitches occupied throughout the Administrative Area.

These Licences cover Hot Food/Tea & Coffee/Ice Cream and Flowers.

We are currently in communication with several interested parties in taking up additional pitches throughout the county and site inspections have been arranged.

The Castleknock/Mulhuddart Operations Department is in regular communication with our traders and area inspectors to tease out any issues and to assist in delivery of quality service.



Fingal County Council currently have 33 valid Street Furniture Licence throughout the county: 1 in Castleknock/Mulhuddart, 6 in Balbriggan/Swords and 26 in Howth/Malahide.

We are currently in communication with several applicants re issuing further licences in the coming weeks.

Inspections continue to be carried out to ensure compliance.

Castleknock/Mulhuddart Operations department are close to completing refunds in accordance with S.I. 256 dated 22 of May 2023 for all Street Furniture Licence Holders in the area following engagement with the businesses.

## **Storm Water**

### **- Stormwater Capital Programme 2023-2025**

Fingal County Council are continuing to progress projects recently adopted in the 2023-2025 Stormwater Capital Program. The 3-year program includes 14 projects valued at approximately €3.63 Million, although this is being kept under review. Below is a brief update in relation to the current status of some of the projects that have commenced and planned upcoming projects.

#### **- Howth Stormwater Culvert**

Topographical and Manhole Surveys are now complete. Rain gauges and flow monitors have been installed on the catchment network and were followed by a CCTV Survey of the sewer – now complete. The information from these surveys is currently being interpreted to inform the condition parameters of the existing sewer and thus allow for a preliminary design to be developed. Preliminary design is being progressed as are the Optioneering and Investigation Reports.

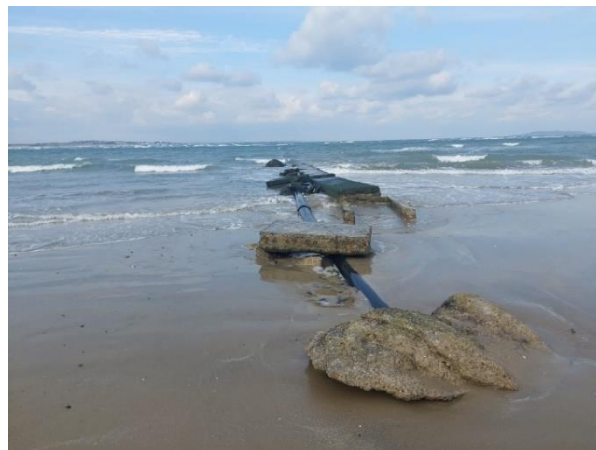
#### **- Wendell Avenue/Heather Walk:**

Stormwater sewer rehabilitation works in Portmarnock are now complete. In total 200m of collapsed sections of network have been replaced in the Dewberry Park, Wendell Avenue and Heather Walk estates. Trench reinstatement works are planned for Q3 2023 with final road reinstatement planned for Q1 2024.



#### **- Burrow Beach**

The proposed remediation of a surface water outfall pipe on Burrow Beach is scheduled to begin following the seabird wintering season around March 2024. Quotation are being sought for the various material required. It will be executed by our own Direct Labour section. Advanced materials purchasing will commence in due course.



#### **- Bath Avenue Storm Water Pipe**

This project involves the laying of a new Storm water pipeline along Bath Ave, Malahide to alleviate localised flooding and allow for future capacity. Scantech Geoscience Ltd were awarded the contract to conduct a GPR and pavement thickness survey. Survey works were completed on the 07/06/2023 and design drawings are being finalized along with a Site-Specific RAMS. Works are scheduled to start on the 25/09/2023. A 10-week window has been allocated to the works which requires a full road closure.

#### **- Ongar Development Stormwater Remedial Works**

Remediation works have commenced on the drainage network in Ongar following its Taking in charge. The works are being undertaken by Formac Contractors with design and supervision by OCSC Consulting Engineers and have a duration of five months. With 60% of the works programme expended all reinstatements of footpath and road are complete with drainage repairs underway currently. Current forecast for completion is end of September.

## - Storm Water Maintenance

The proposed Stormwater preventative maintenance cycle for 2023 is currently underway. A contractor has been procured with a Jet Vac Recycler truck and CCTV camera van. Survey works are ongoing in the in the Blanchardstown & Castleknock areas.

Surveys have been completed of Rusheeny estate and reports and maps are being drafted. So far, a number of restrictions have been found with build ups of concrete and collapses in some sections.



The Stormwater manhole cover and frame replacement programme for replacing assets at the end of life is ongoing. Assets have been replaced in Skerries and Rush.

A new precast headwall has been installed on White's Road in Castleknock. Works are being undertaken to reinstate and landscape the area around the new headwall.

Multiple misconnection surveys and dye testing are taking place in the Balbriggan area. Surveys are focusing on the catchment feeding into the Harbour area via the Bracken River. Investigations are ongoing to determine if misconnections are present in these networks. FCC Water Services are assisting FCC Environment to identify the cause of high E. coli levels that are regularly being detected in the Harbour area. The following is a breakdown of works taking place and findings to date:

Lambeecher/Bath Rd – Jetting & CCTV surveying is now complete. A number of buried manholes have been identified and raised. There were no visible signs of misconnections.

Tara Court - Jetting & CCTV work is now complete. The presence of misconnections has been confirmed. Dye testing is ongoing to identify the exact location of these misconnections.

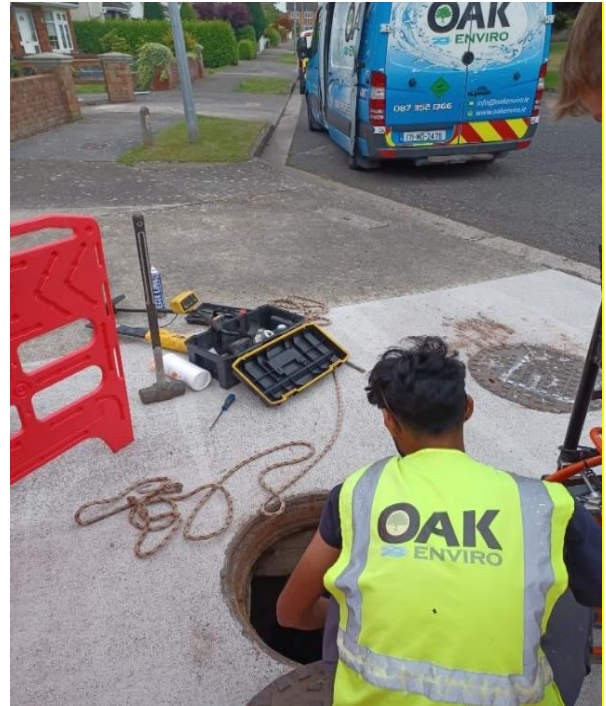
Clonard Court – Surveys have been completed. There was no evidence of misconnections found. A large volume of stone and silt was removed from the network. The surveys identified the need for some cover and frame replacements and there also a number of restrictions that will require excavation and repairs works.



Bremore Castle Mews – CCTV & Jetting complete. Misconnections to the SW network have been identified. Dye testing is ongoing to trace their exact source.



Mill St – CCTV & Jetting works complete. Misconnections have been confirmed. Dye testing has confirmed the source. The owner of an apartment complex has now completed the internal works and there are no visible signs of pollution at the Outfall.



Matt River – Checks are ongoing at various locations for visible signs of pollution. Fulham St, Clonard St, Mill Race, Chapel Ct & R132 Drogheda St - These areas have now been completed surveyed. There were no visible signs of misconnections.

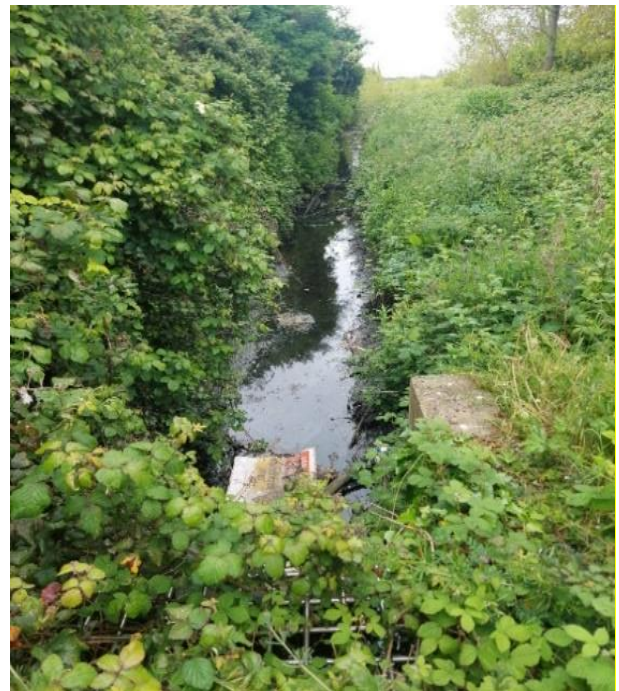


Works were carried out to locate and raise a number of buried manholes in the Flemington Park area of Balbriggan.



#### - **Biodiversity**

Ongoing assistance is being given by the Storm water Unit to *Baldoyle Tidy Towns* who have secured funding for a Biodiversity project on the Seagrang Park stream, Baldoyle.

## Uisce Éireann

Uisce Éireann is Ireland's National Regulated Water Utility with full responsibility for the delivery of all water services for the people of Ireland.

The Fingal *Master Co-Operation Agreement* between UE and FCC was signed on the 5<sup>th</sup> May, 2023. This agreement provided for Uisce Éireann to have full accountability for the delivery of water services, and the necessary management and direction of all local authority water services staff, including those who choose to remain employed by the Council for the transitional period to the end of 2026.

Fingal Water Services Staff have the opportunity during the transition period to either transition to Uisce Éireann or avail of a range of other options in accordance with the agreed National Framework for Future Delivery of Water Services

On the 26<sup>th</sup> July, 2023, *the Effective Date*, full responsibility transferred officially to Uisce Éireann and the Fingal Service Level Agreement was terminated on that date. The delivery of public water services for the County of Fingal is now carried out under the Management and Direction of Uisce Éireann.

Fingal County Council have no statutory basis to respond to queries on water services. All enquiries and questions on water services should now be forwarded directly to Uisce Éireann the national body with full responsibility for the service. Fingal Water Services report will no longer form part of the monthly Chief Executive Report. All contact details are available on their Website.

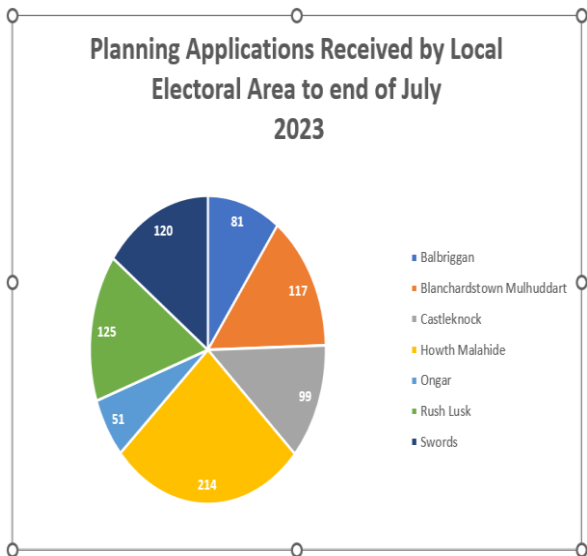

## Planning Applications

There have been 807 planning applications received from 1<sup>st</sup> January 2023 to 31<sup>st</sup> of July 2023, of these 108 applications were invalid leaving a total of 699 valid applications. The volume of applications received by Local Electoral Area (LEA) is detailed in the table below.

From 1<sup>st</sup> January 2023 to 31<sup>st</sup> of July 2023, six Large-scale Residential Development (LRD) full applications have been made to the Local Authority. From 1<sup>st</sup> January 2023 to 31<sup>st</sup> of July 2023 nine decisions have been made on Large Scale Residential Developments. Of these nine decisions made, all have been to grant Permission (3,019 Units).

An Bord Pleanála have issued 16 decisions on SHD applications in the period from 1<sup>st</sup> January 2023 to 31<sup>st</sup> of July 2023. There are five SHD's (4,577 units) remaining with An Bord Pleanála for decision.



## Planning Decisions

A total of 694 planning decisions have been issued to 31<sup>st</sup> July 2023. There have been 573 decisions to grant permission (83%) and 121 refusals of permission (17%). Included in the 573 grants there have been 46 grants of permissions in respect of single house construction, 321 grants of permission for domestic extensions/works, 56 commercial/retail grants of permission and 29 grants of permission in respect of housing developments of which 14 relate to development of 2 – 20 units, 4 relates to 20 – 50 units, 6 relate to 50 -100 units and 6 which relate to development of 100+ Units.

## Building Control Admin

In June 2023, there were 179 building control submission's made via BCMS.

This was made up of 87 Commencement notices, 42 Compliance of Completion Certificates, 31 Fire Safety related Certificates and 19 Disability Access related Certificates.

In July 2023, there were 177 building control submission's made via BCMS.

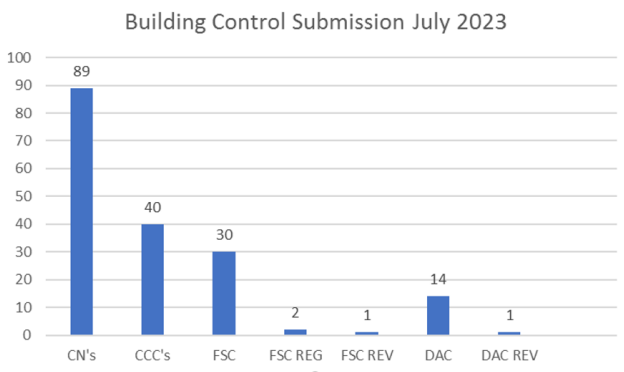
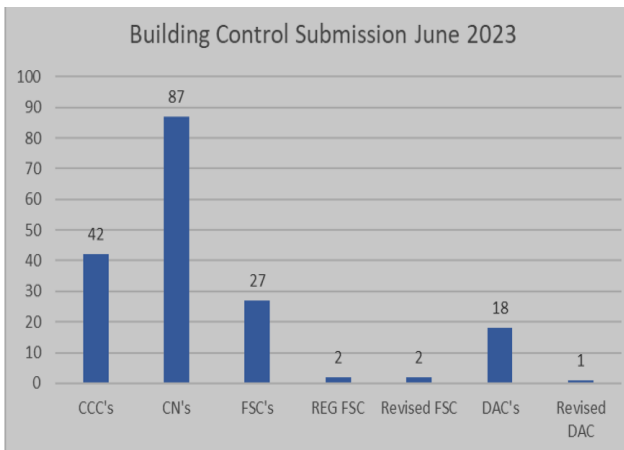
This was made up of 89 Commencement notices, 40 Compliance of Completion Certificates, 33 Fire Safety related Certificates and 15 Disability Access related Certificates.

Commencement notices and Compliance on Completion Certificates are submitted through the Projects module on BCMS.

Fire Safety, Disability Access, Regularisation and Dispensation/Relaxation Certificate applications can be submitted online via the Applications module on BCMS and we are also still accepting hard copy applications directly into the office. Most applications are now being submitted via the online system.

The Building Control Admin team processed 143 decisions in June 2023 relating to Fire Safety and Disability Access Certificates. This was made up of 44 decisions to grant and 99 extensions of time.

The Building Control Admin team processed 146 decisions in July 2023 relating to Fire Safety and Disability Access Certificates. This was made up of 58 decisions to grant and 88 extensions of time.



## Strategic Policy Unit

### Sustainable Swords

The Sustainable Swords Strategy was agreed by the Members at the December meeting. This follows extensive consultation and engagement with the local community. The Strategy outlines 16 possible projects which would transform Swords.

The Sustainable Swords project has been shortlisted for two IPI awards which will be announced at the end of September.

### Residential Zoned Land Tax

The Government's 'Housing For All - A New Housing Plan for Ireland' proposed a new tax to activate vacant land for residential purposes as a part of the Pathway to Increasing New Housing Supply.

The Residential Zoned Land Tax was introduced in the Finance Act 2021. The process to identify land to which the tax applies is now underway and the tax will be payable from 2024.

The objective of the tax is to activate land that is serviced and zoned for residential use or mixed use, including residential use, in order to increase housing supply and to ensure regeneration of vacant and idle lands in urban locations. These locations have been identified within statutory land use plans as being appropriate locations for housing and they have benefitted from investment in the key services to support the delivery of housing.

Fingal County Council has prepared a draft map of the land considered to be in scope for the RZLT as of October 1, 2022.

- Number of sites retained on the Draft map – **97 retained, 9 part retained**
- Number of sites whereby there was ‘no action’ (residential property for example) – **7 (no action) 6 (part no action)**

- Number of appeals decided (29<sup>th</sup> Aug 2023) – **50**, of which **42** confirmed the determination of Fingal.

### **Next Steps**

Where land was included on the draft, and where no submissions were received relating to the land, it is to be included in the final map.

Where an appeal was made to ABP which has been decided within the relevant statutory time frame, or in any event, not later than 30 days prior to the publication date for the final maps (i.e. 1<sup>st</sup> November 2023), then the final map shall reflect the decision of ABP.

Where ABP has not reached a decision in respect of an appeal by 30 days prior (by 1<sup>st</sup> November 2023) to the publication of the final map on 01 December 2023, the land in question shall be included in the final map and the landowner may seek a deferral of tax liability until the appeal has been determined.

Where no decision has been made by ABP at least 30 days prior to date of publication of the final map, or where a decision is subject to JR which has not been determined at least 30 days prior to date of publication, then the land is included on the final map.

The final maps will identify all of the land considered to be in scope for FCC and will provide for the overall area in hectares.

## Incorporating Sustainable Drainage Systems in Residential Developments

The GSDS has outlined SuDS as a sustainable way to manage surface water as we prepare to meet the challenges of climate change. This example of Millers Glen in Swords, shows an example of surface water being held onsite, providing treatment via appropriate planting, and then discharging at greenfield runoff rate.

This is a move away from the traditional method of collecting all surface water via piped systems which can often no longer manage the intense rainfall's being experienced.

## Multi-Party Framework Agreement for the preparation of Surface Water Management Plans (SWMP)

The procurement process has begun for the new Multi-Party Framework Agreement for the preparation of Surface Water Management Plans (SWMP) for the new County Development Plan. The SAQ for the above framework was posted on eTenders with a closing date for tender submissions set for 30/09/2022. The tenders were assessed and a recommendation for progression to the next phase has taken place. WSFP are working with the planners to identify areas for inclusion in the framework.

## Irish Water

- Staff continue to liaise with Irish Water regarding existing constraints within the water/wastewater networks and identifying solutions to resolve.
- Connection and Developer Services – staff continue to provide a planning review of water/wastewater connection applications on behalf of Irish Water, there have been 13 CDS applications during July.
- Staff continue to complete Irish Water templates for every planning file completed.

## Building Control/Taking in Charge Section



- There were 9 Building control site inspections in August 2023 with 13 separate buildings being inspected. This was significantly down on the July figure where there was 21 Inspections and 47 buildings inspected. The drop in inspections was due to staff annual leave, builders holidays and also only includes statistics up until the 28<sup>th</sup> August rather than the full month (up to 31<sup>st</sup> August).
- There were 2 section 11 requests for further information issued in July but no further section 11's listed in August and no enforcement notices issued.
- The 3 developments "Ballygossan Park Phase 1" in Skerries and the "Entrance off Roundabout on R121 opposite The Boulevard, Blanchardstown" and Rahillion Phase 2 were taken in charge in the July Meeting.
- We have one road "Balgriffin to Belmayne Roundabout" up for taking in charge in the September Council Meeting and 2 estates "Cnoc Dubh Phase 2" and "Millers Glen phase 2" for the October meeting.
- We have 49 Developments with formal Taking in Charge requests and a further 305 developments on our system, of which 62 are likely to remain private.
- We have received a taking in charge request for the Drynam estate now as we have had more than 50% of the registered owners request the estate to be taken in charge. We are now cross referencing the names with the details on the Property Registration authority to ensure the taking

in charge request is valid. We will advertise this estate for taking in charge later this year.

- The Taking in Charge works in Thornleigh Estate In Swords by a completion contractor on behalf of the bondsman are complete and we are at final account stage.
- The Ongar Remediation works contract is underway and Formac Construction are currently carrying out works in the Blackwood estate. O'Connor Sutton Cronin are managing these works on behalf of Fingal County Council. The estimate completion date is the end of September 2023
- Works are ongoing in the Gallops housing estate by a contractor carrying out "Taking in Charge" works for Fingal County Council.

### **Dangerous Structures**

There were 0 dangerous structures notified in July 2023 and 4 dangerous structures notified in August 2023 There are a total of 74 dangerous structures active in our database.

### **Transportation**

#### **PSI-002 Ongar Barnhill Link Road**

The Ongar-Barnhill Link Road in Dublin 15 is a long-standing objective of Fingal County Council and Fingal County Council is delighted to have recently appointed civil engineering contractor BAM Civil Ltd to commence works with a two-year construction programme. This new high quality transportation corridor will significantly improve accessibility in this fast-growing area and facilitate the construction of over 1,100 new homes on the surrounding residential zoned lands. The project is being led by the Planning & Strategic Infrastructure Department and consists of approximately 1.8km of road, footpath and cycling facilities including a new bridge crossing over the Dunboyne railway line.

The scheme provides high quality walking and cycling links for new existing and new residents and will tie into the Royal Canal Greenway and Dart+ West. It is being funded by Fingal County Council's development levies and regular updates and engagement with the local community and the local elected members will take place as the project progresses. Similar to the Snugborough scheme, site visits will be arranged for local members during the construction stage of the project.

#### **PSI-001 Snugborough Interchange upgrade**

The project is progressing with completion expected late 2023. A new traffic management layout was installed during August following some resurfacing works which allowed the final elements of the new underpass under Snugborough road to be positioned. The off ramp

from the N3 outbound is being closed for two nights in early September to allow a new gantry to be erected. Local diversion signage will be in place for any diversions. The remaining sections of the pedestrian underpass were lifted into place recently as can be seen below.



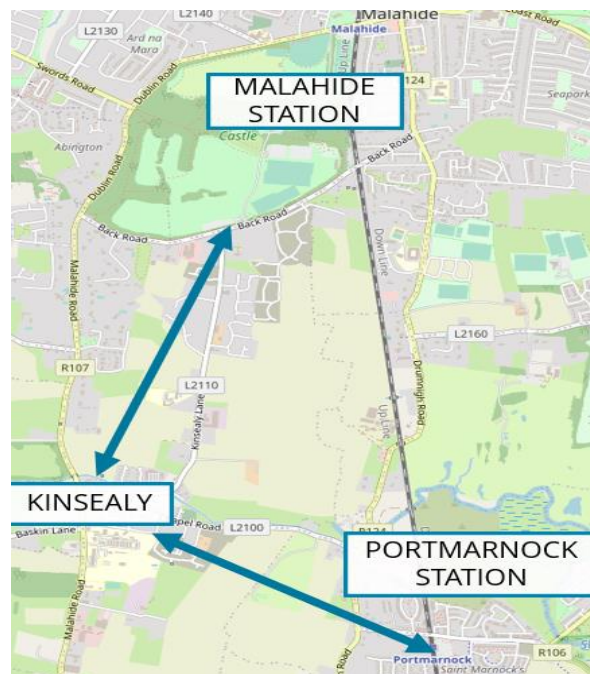

Connectivity**

Consultation with the National Transport Authority and with Transport Infrastructure Ireland regarding the connection with MetroLink is ongoing. The consultants working on behalf of the Planning & Strategic Infrastructure Department have undertaken a Rapid Build Options Assessment Report, in line with NTA requirements, which has concluded that the approved scheme design remains the preferred option, therefore the project is now being brought through the detailed design stage. The findings from the ground investigation works carried out in June and July were compiled and now will assist in the decision making process for the detailed design stage.

**Kinsealy Walking and Cycling Routes**

The consultancy framework for various Swords & Kinsealy projects with the initial project being the Kinsealy Walking and Cycling Routes was recently awarded. The appointed consultants are currently progressing the Kinsealy Walking and Cycling Routes Projects by firstly carrying out a scoping exercise of reviewing the previous reports and assessing the preferred route option. A number of projects arising out of Sustainable Swords will

follow on directly, including the Western Distributor Road scheme. Briefings will be undertaken with the local members at the next milestone stage.



**PSI-005 Harry Reynolds Road Pedestrian and Cyclist Route**

Following the completion of a public procurement process Jons Civil Engineering was appointed during the Summer for the construction phase and the contractor has now started works onsite on this key infrastructure project for Balbriggan. The work has started at two locations on the project on Hamilton Road and on the Harry Reynolds Road just south of the R122. Works are progressing with a new bus stop and a new shared area already installed on Hamilton Road.



It will provide a cycle-link between Drogheda Street and Hamilton Road and serve three school campuses directly at Ardgillan Community College, St. Molagas and Balbriggan Educate Together National School, as well as offering a safe cycling and walking route to shops, childcare facilities and community amenities. To assist with communication to the community a dedicated project website has been setup which will be updated throughout the project, highlighting the projects progression and key milestone stages; [Harry Reynolds Road Pedestrian & Cycle Route | Fingal County Council](#)



### **PSI-003 Sutton-Malahide Pedestrian and Cycle Scheme**

A land surveyor has recently been appointed to carry out a topographical survey of public and private lands within the proposed scheme and this will happen in September. Affected landowners have been notified. Following the completion of the topographical survey, a tree surveyor will carry out a survey of all trees along the proposed route. Meanwhile, ground investigation works are currently being procured which will take place in the autumn, the results of which will allow the finalisation of the large amount of documents that are required for a planning application to An Bord Pleanála. Engagement with potentially impacted property owners, businesses and stakeholders is ongoing.

### **PSI-012 Broadmeadow Way**

Under Fingal County Council (FCC) and Irish Rail specialist supervision, the civil and ground investigation (GI) contractor continued works during the summer months which included security fencing, new culvert and ramp during the summer months. This works package is an

important milestone which will inform the detailed design of the northern causeway element of the project and GI works are expected to be complete by end September 2023. In August, FCC, through Irish Rail, facilitated a site visit to the northern causeway with attendees including the Mayor of Fingal, Cllr Adrian Henchy, the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien TD, local Councillors and the NTA. This unique project represents the first time a greenway will be constructed on a live railway embankment. It is also running through an SAC and SPA and surrounded by water. As such, the planning, environmental and technical challenges that the project has presented have been considerable. Notwithstanding that, the Planning & Strategic Infrastructure project team has been progressing works on a number of fronts, in order to advance the project in collaboration with the NTA and Irish Rail, our project partners. Land acquisition negotiations with a number of landowners and design coordination with Irish Rail are ongoing. As part of the Foreshore licence process, FCC coordinated a Foreshore public consultation for the Broadmeadow Way Greenway on behalf of the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage in June and July 2023. Detailed design for landward elements of the greenway in Donabate are at an advanced stage and, once complete, a works contractor will be procured.



### **PSI-034 Church Fields Link Road**

Church Fields Link Road which includes Irelands first cycle friendly 'Dutch style' roundabout opened to the public in August 2023. Works continue to progress on phase 2 of this high-quality active transport infrastructure project which includes the pedestrian and cycle infrastructure in the parklands, parallel with Church Road. In tandem, works to Wellview Avenue commenced in August with a temporary traffic management plan including a road closure put in place in the area to facilitate these works.



### **PSI-026 Portrane Road Enhancement Project and Turvey Avenue Footpath Enhancement Project**

Fingal County Council has lodged an application to An Bord Pleanála to use a Compulsory Purchase Order (CPO) for the Portrane Road Enhancement Project. The project involves works to widen the existing narrow footpath on the northern side of Portrane Road in order to provide a suitably wide and safe footpath for pedestrians to use in the vicinity of two national schools (St. Patrick's Boys National School and Scoil Phádraic Cailíni). The project also involves works to provide safe pedestrian crossings and appropriate traffic calming facilities. Subject to approval from An Bord

Pleanála, the CPO will allow Fingal County Council to purchase privately-owned land that is required to widen the path and deliver the project. A decision from An Bord Pleanála on the CPO application is expected later this year. Separately, Fingal County Council has commenced a tender competition to procure a works contractor to build a Footpath Enhancement project on nearby Turvey Avenue, in Donabate. The project will see the construction of a new section of footpath to improve pedestrian safety and increase connectivity for people walking between Donabate Village and the residential areas along Turvey Avenue, west of Donabate Train Station. A works contractor is expected to be appointed in October with construction work due to commence shortly thereafter.

### **PSI-027 Donabate Pedestrian Bridge**

The detailed design for the construction of a new pedestrian and cycle bridge over the Dublin to Belfast Railway line at Corballis, Donabate has been approved by Iarnród Éireann and the Commission for Railway Regulation. The new bridge will cross over the railway line, facilitating a safe and segregated pedestrian and cycle route and will enhance connections between the development lands at Corballis, Donabate Village, the railway station and Newbridge Demesne. Heads of terms have been agreed and necessary licence agreements are being finalised with the developers of adjacent lands to facilitate access to, and construction of, the bridge. Procurement for a main contractor for the works is ongoing and construction is expected to commence later this year.

### **PSI-042 Donabate Transportation Projects**

Fingal County Council has appointed Roughan and O'Donovan, a leading multi-disciplinary consultancy firm, to provide engineering, planning and environmental services for the Donabate Transport Projects, which comprise a number of major projects with the objective of improving transport and active travel infrastructure and road safety on the Donabate-Portrane peninsula. The projects include:

- Phase 2 of the Donabate Distributor Road project, to improve access to Donabate and Portrane from the M1-Lissenhall Interchange for

all road users, particularly vulnerable road users such as pedestrians and cyclists;

- Blakes Cross Junction Upgrade, to provide a safer junction layout that caters for both motorised traffic and active travel modes of transport such as walking and cycling;
- A study of the M1-Lissenhall Interchange, in collaboration with TII, to assess all technical and operational traffic issues associated with this strategic motorway junction;
- Donabate Active Travel Routes which encompass a number of related local projects which aim to increase local connectivity for pedestrians and cyclists.

Work on the initial data-gathering, concept development and option assessment stages of the Donabate Transport Projects will commence immediately. Further stages of work, relating to environmental assessment, planning consent, etc. will follow on in subsequent years as appropriate.

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## Housing Supply

### **Fingal County Council - Mixed Tenure Development at Ballymastone, Donabate**



Construction work has commenced at Ballymastone, one of the largest residential housing developments in the state. The milestone, at the 32-hectare site in Donabate, North County Dublin, was marked with a sod-turning ceremony, attended by Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien TD; the Mayor of Fingal, Cllr Adrian Henchy; and

representatives of Fingal County Council and homebuilder Glenveagh.

In total, 1,200 A-Rated homes will be delivered on a phased basis by Glenveagh, with the first phase consisting of 432 affordable, private, cost rental, and social homes. The first delivery of homes will be completed in H2 2024, and it is anticipated that the first phase of 432 homes at Ballymastone will be completed in H2 2025.

### **Housing Information Event- September 25<sup>th</sup>, 2023- The RIASC Centre, Feltrim Road, Swords**

On **September 25<sup>th</sup>, 2023, between 5pm and 8pm** Fingal County Council will host a Housing information evening in The RIASC Centre in Swords. Attendees will have the opportunity to hear about the different options for people who want to make their home in Fingal, including the Croi Conaithe Refurbishment Grant, the Local Authority Home Loan and the Affordable Housing Scheme. Staff will be on hand to deal with questions from those in attendance.

### Land Acquisition

Fingal County Council has recently completed the purchase of 5 No. Sites, comprising of an area of c. 29 hectares to facilitate the construction of up to 800 new homes. The acquisition of further sites for housing development is under active consideration.

### Housing Loans Update

The Local Authority Home Loan (LAHL) continues to be popular with prospective homeowners who cannot secure commercial lending.

As of 30<sup>th</sup> August 2023, Fingal County Council has received 438 applications, of which 200 have been seen by the Credit Committee, after which 53% have secured Approvals in Principle.

The Loan application process in Fingal is now augmented by the introduction of an online application portal which aims to streamline the application process for applicants.

A DHLGH media campaign for LAHL was launched on 28<sup>th</sup> August, with all relevant information being advertised across Fingal County Council's Social Media platforms. ## **Housing Asset Management Report**

### **Energy Efficiency/Retrofitting Programme**

Fingal County Council's Energy Efficiency Retrofit programme is progressing well. Work have been completed on 83 properties at present in Strandmill Estate, Barnewall Estate, Rivermeade, and Glasmore Court. Another 28 properties are currently underway in Strandmill Estate, Rivermeade, Glasmore Park, and Whitestown Gardens. The goal of this project is to upgrade properties to a B2 BER rating. The improvements encompass electrical and heating upgrades, attic insulation, installation of triple-glazed windows and doors, external insulation wrap, and PV panels as needed to achieve the B2 standard.

Investigative works are ongoing in several other estates across the county and under consideration to include in this programme.

### **Planned Maintenance Programmes Cyclical Maintenance - Scheme Painting**

The Scheme Painting Programme provides for external painting and joinery repairs to Council housing stock and currently operates on a 6/7-year cycle. Works are reaching completion in Ashton Estate, Swords and Corduff Grove, Blanchardstown, Dublin 15. External painting is currently underway in Corduff Avenue, Corduff Gardens and Corduff Way, Blanchardstown, Dublin 15.

### Housing Assistance Payment (HAP)

HAP continues to be the primary source of rent support for those in private rented accommodation. Fingal County Council has set up over 242 new tenancies in 2023 to date with approximately over 3,831 tenancies set up since HAP began in 2017.

The HAP team are on hand to deal with any queries from applicants and landlords in person at the Housing Department in the Fingal County Council Blanchardstown Office, by phone on 01 8905000 via the CCU or through email [hap@fingal.ie](mailto:hap@fingal.ie).

### Rents

The new rent review process continues and tenants are required to return their Rent Assessment Form with the relevant documents so that an assessment can be carried out and the correct rent charge applied to the account.

The Rent Arrears team are working methodically through accounts in substantial arrears to encourage tenants to engage with the Council in reducing their arrears. In cases where there is no engagement, despite repeated efforts, proceedings will progress through the legal arena and to date the Rents Section has secured one Possession Order with 7 others currently before the courts.

The Rents team encourage any tenant who is experiencing difficulty paying their rent to engage with the Council to examine possible solutions. However, there are instances where tenants do not engage or make alternative payment arrangements and, in those situations, the Council needs to take further action.

### Private Rented Inspections

The private rented inspections team had another successful year in 2022, exceeding the target set by the DHLGH by inspecting 6112 dwellings equalling 117% of the annual target, placing Fingal in the first quartile of local authorities nationally.

For 2023, following the roll out of annual registration by the RTB and a project to streamline registrations, the target for 2023 is set at 4,576, equating to just over a quarter of 18,000 registered tenancies within Fingal.

The team continue to work on meeting this target and improving compliance. 64.5% of the target was reached by the end of May comprising of a total of 3,407 inspections and 2,952 dwellings inspected.

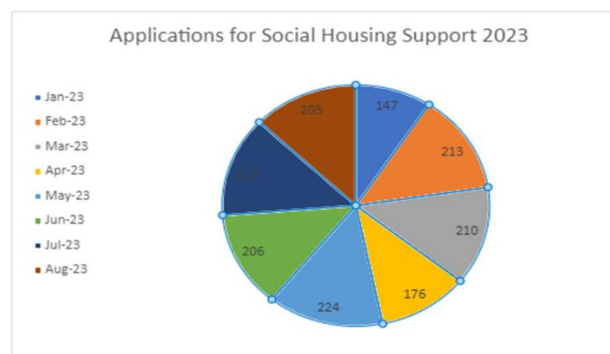

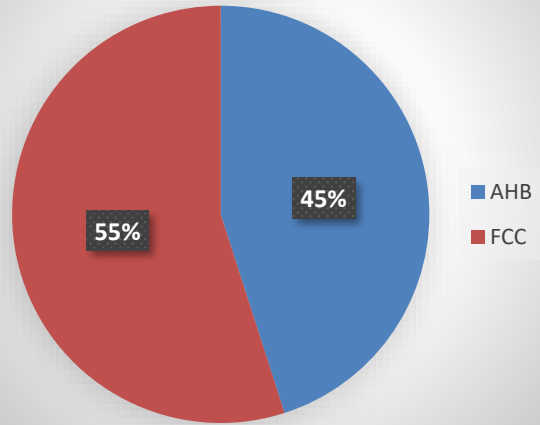

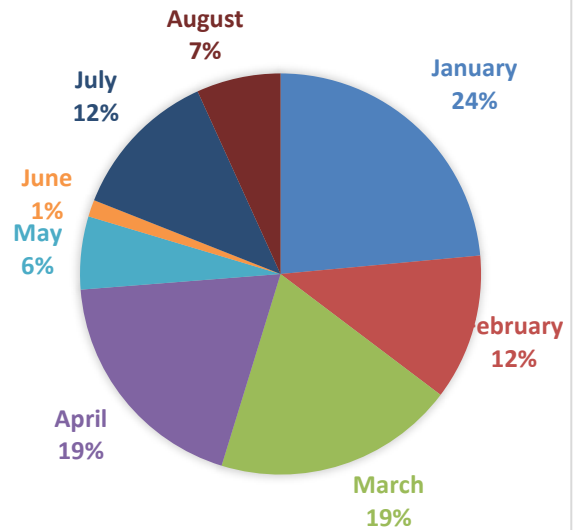

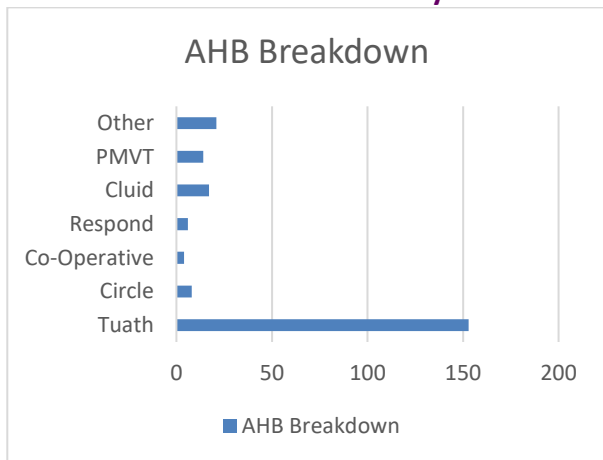

This chart portrays a breakdown of the AHB's reflecting the nominations sent to them during 2023 thus far. Tuath have received the most nominations from Fingal County Council in 2023 so far.

Tuath have confirmed continued delivery for the remainder of 2023 with a large number of properties coming in Hansfiled D15.

Fold have confirmed delivery of 58 properties for over 55's accommodation along with 76 general needs properties in the Dublin 15 area.

The collaboration between Local Authorities and Approved Housing Bodies is continuing to have a positive impact on the delivery of social housing.

### Homeless Services.

#### Homeless Exits 2023

During the month of July 2023, 27 households exited homeless circumstances into various forms of social housing support - including into private rented tenancies under the Homeless HAP Scheme.

Homeless HAP accounts for 11 of these tenancies, comprising 9 homeless preventions and 2 who exited from emergency accommodation.

Separately there were 15 households that exited homelessness into social tenancies.

In total 2 FCC households exited emergency accommodation during July 2023.

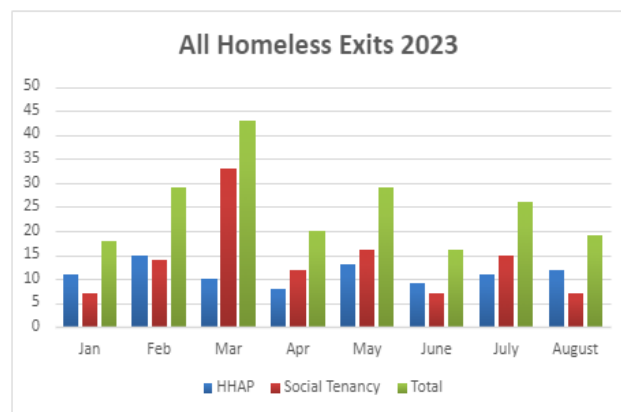
During the month of August 2023, 20 households exited homeless circumstances into various forms of social housing support - including into private

rented tenancies under the Homeless HAP Scheme.

Homeless HAP accounts for 12 of these tenancies, comprising 11 homeless preventions and 1 who exited from emergency accommodation.

Separately there were 8 households that exited homelessness into social tenancies.

In total 1 FCC household exited emergency accommodation during August 2023.



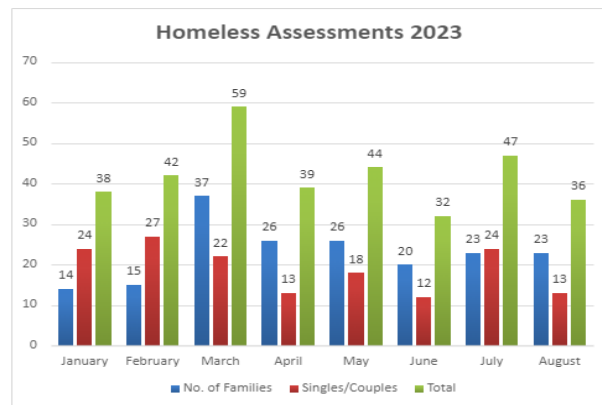
### Homeless Presentations

Fingal's Homeless Team continue to engage with those experiencing homelessness to offer advice and support. Homeless Assessments continued to be carried out.

In July 2023, there were a total of 47 full homeless assessments completed - comprising 23 families and 24 singles/couples.

In August 2023, there were a total of 36 full homeless assessments completed - comprising 23 families and 13 singles/couples.

To date in 2023 there have been a total of 337 full homeless assessments completed.





A weekly Rough Sleepers Co-ordination Group monitors the reports of rough sleepers. The reports come from various outlets, including the DRHE Outreach Team, Elected Representatives, the FCC Operations Department and the general public,

The progress of these cases are monitored until the needs of the reported rough sleepers are met and the cases can be closed.

### **Homeless Action Plan 2022- 2024**

The DRHE, with the approval of all 4 local authorities in the Dublin region, has finalised the Homeless Action Plan Framework for Dublin 2022-2024. This Plan is the first plan to be put into operation since Ireland signed the Lisbon Declaration on combatting homelessness in June 2021, which aims to end homelessness by 2030.

It will follow on from the previous Homeless Action Plan for 2019- 2021 and continues with the three key themes of **Prevention, Protection and Progression**.

The Plan was developed based on a detailed consultative process including submissions from various Stakeholders, interested organisations, Service Providers, Members of SPCs of the four Local Authorities, the Dublin Joint Homelessness Consultative Forum and the Statutory Management Group.

### **Preventing Homelessness, Notices to Quit and Tenant In-situ Acquisitions**

Fingal County Council is aware that households in the Fingal area who may have received a notice to quit, which is also referred to as a notice of termination, from their landlord may be worried or unsure of what to do.

Fingal County Council and the Dublin Regional Homeless Executive (DRHE) would like to advise anyone affected of the services that are available to them in these circumstances.

- We strongly encourage tenants residing in the Fingal area, who have been issued with a notice of termination, to contact Fingal County Council as soon as they receive a notice from their landlord. The contact details for Fingal County Council are provided at the bottom of this page.

- When the tenants contact Fingal County Council, staff in the Housing Department will take note of the termination date.
- The Council advises the tenant to refer the notice to Threshold, a service funded by the DRHE to provide a Tenancy Protection Service for private renters in the Dublin Region, including Fingal. Threshold can also be contacted directly on Freephone 1800 454 454 or via their website [www.threshold.ie](http://www.threshold.ie) which contains more information and advice on the validity of your notice.
- The Council's first response will be to try to prevent homelessness. This includes assessing the person's position on the social housing list, providing advice on applying for Choice Based Lettings, advising the person on the level of Housing Assistance Payment (HAP) they may be eligible to receive, and, in some cases, assessing if the Council can acquire the dwelling where the tenants reside if it is being offered for sale.
- Placement in emergency accommodation will be a last resort, if no other alternative can be identified.

The Council has been engaging with tenants who have been issued with a notice of termination, as well as their landlords, and following assessment, 13 tenant in-situ properties are at the sale closed stage. A total of 88 properties are at the sale agreed/conveyancing stage with a further 51 cases in the negotiation process. In addition, the Council is assessing a further 337 queries and applications concerning notices of termination and tenant-in-situ acquisition.

The Council will continue to deal with notice of termination queries and cases as expeditiously as possible and progress tenant in-situ acquisitions while taking account of circulars and guidance issued by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage.

Fingal County Council continues to liaise with other Dublin and neighbouring local authorities to deal

with tenancy issues that may require an inter-authority approach. In particular, we are working closely with our colleagues in the other Dublin Local Authorities on the implementation of the Government policy and guidance, with a focus on the needs of tenants.

Whilst the Council will, in the context of current circumstances, adopt flexibility in dealing with potential acquisitions of properties with tenants in-situ, any acquisition is subject to appropriate due diligence and checks before any commitment is made to acquire, including, for example, determining that a valid notice of termination is in place, the tenant has a social housing need, and the condition and valuation of the property.

The Government has put forward options to allow tenants who are not eligible for social housing to remain in their homes, including schemes to support the purchase of homes and a Cost Rental in-Situ Scheme. On the Cost Rental Tenant-in-Situ Scheme, this is available for tenants who are not eligible for social housing and are at risk of homelessness. The DHLGH has advised that local authorities are to be the first point of contact for this scheme, but it is managed by the Housing Agency. Under the scheme the Housing Agency can purchase a property and rent it to the tenant. Fingal County Council will undertake an initial assessment of the tenant's circumstances and refer details to the Housing Agency for consideration, where the tenant is at risk of homelessness and the Cost Rental Tenant-in-Situ scheme applies. The Housing Agency will then make contact with the landlord with regard to the purchase of property.

Where a tenant wishes to purchase their home from the landlord, local authorities can provide advice about the Local Authority Home Loan scheme. The Government is examining implementing a 'right of first refusal' for tenants to purchase their homes, as well as expanding the First Home shared equity scheme. The Council will be able to provide more information on these when available.

Work around preventing homelessness, assessing notices of termination and responding to tenant and landlord tenant in-situ queries is being led on by the Council's Homelessness section, taking a tenant-centred approach, supported by staff dedicated to deal with tenant in-situ housing acquisitions. ### **Launch of Fingal County Council 's Housing Strategy for Disabled People 2021- 2026 held on 17th May 2023, Council Chamber, County Hall.**

The Council's Housing Strategy for Disabled People 2021- 2026 was launched by former Mayor Cllr Howard Mahony on 17th May 2023, in the Council Chamber, County Hall Swords which was filled to capacity on the day. The launch was attended by the Chief Executive, elected members. Housing SPC, Senior Council officials, Disability Steering Group, Disabled Persons Organisations, Service Users, Service providers, Housing Agency, HSE, various Approved Housing Bodies and advocacy groups.

The Strategy was prepared in collaboration with the Disability Steering Group, comprising, Chairperson, Mr. Robert Burns, Director of Services Housing & Community Dept., and the various aforementioned stakeholders.



This new Strategy builds on the strategic aims of the previous one, (2016- 2020) whilst setting new aims, thereby reinforcing the Council's commitment to responding to the challenges and availing of the opportunity to improve service delivery in helping meet the needs of disabled people.

The core objective of the Strategy is to promote equality of access for disabled people to the full range of housing options available, to work collectively and in collaboration with relevant stakeholders and to ensure that the strategic aims set out are implemented in a fair, equitable and timely manner. The Strategy aims to provide disabled people with better opportunities and foster a more inclusive community. The approach not only prioritises accessibility but also recognises the importance of creating environments that promote independence, equality, and integration for all residents.

Individuals with disabilities, whether they be mental, sensory, intellectual, or physical - regularly face numerous challenges in finding suitable housing options that meet their specific needs. However, the Council believes that this forward-thinking approach - will help to break down these barriers and creating a living environment that enables people with disabilities to thrive and actively participate in their local communities.

Launching the strategy, the former Mayor of Fingal, Cllr Howard Mahony said: "I am proud to launch this strategy which I believe will help secure a better housing experience for those with a

disability and further empower them to live the life they want to lead. It is a really important collaborative piece of work that brings increased opportunities for independence and supports the physical, mental and emotional well-being needs of people."



Key elements of the new housing strategy include:

- **Universal Accessibility:** All housing units should be appropriately designed and future proofed with universal accessibility in mind, particularly in the planning stages of new housing developments. This means incorporating features such as wider doorways, ramps, elevators, and accessible bathrooms to ensure individuals with disabilities can navigate their homes with ease and dignity. By eliminating physical barriers, we are promoting independence and empowering residents to live with greater freedom and autonomy.

- **Integrated Communities:** Our strategy encourages the development of integrated communities where individuals with disabilities live alongside their peers without disabilities and ensuring personal supports are in place for people transitioning congregated type settings into locations of peoples choosing, close to services, public transport etc. By promoting diversity and inclusivity, we are fostering social connections, reducing stigmatisation, and creating opportunities for meaningful interactions among residents. This integration allows individuals with disabilities to become active participants in community life, breaking down stereotypes and building stronger, more cohesive neighbourhoods.
- **Supportive Services:** Recognising that some individuals with disabilities may require additional support, our strategy looks to ensure that adequate support services are available for people who need them. Interagency collaboration, particularly with the HSE in this regard, is an integral part of the implementation of the aims of the Strategy. These services can include personalised care plans, assistance with daily living activities, and access to healthcare resources. This approach will help provide residents with the tools they need to live independently and pursue their goals.

## **TRAVELLER ACCOMMODATION PROGRAMME** **Traveller Accommodation**

A significant programme of works in relation to the refurbishment and upgrading of existing accommodation on Traveller specific sites is currently ongoing. These works are in accordance



with the objectives set out in the Traveller Accommodation Programme 2019-2024. Refurbishment works to the 5 Bay Halting Site at St Brigid's Lawns, Porterstown, Dublin 15 have commenced. Works include replacing the existing welfare units with new modern units and upgrades to the on-site utilities.

Regular site visits by Housing Inspectors continue on all Fingal County Council Traveller specific sites while checking on vulnerable residents and advising on the continued supports available. Council officials continue to liaise and engage with the Traveller Community, Traveller Advocacy Groups, Welfare Services, Child Services, Mental Health Services and other services and agencies to resolve issues when and where possible.

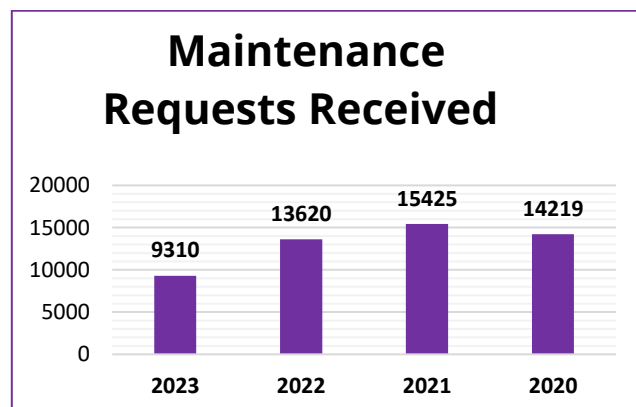
**Disabled Persons Grants (DPGs)**

## Boiler Servicing Programme

The Council provides an annual heating servicing facility, including all maintenance and upgrade works, for a nominal fee of €3 per week to participating tenants. Contractors progress batches of work throughout the course of the year. The 2023 Programme of work continues, with Contractors working across the County in areas such as Whitestown, Rossan, Court Road, Curragh Hall, Cruise Park Avenue, Craoibhin, Curran Park, Fullam Green and Pinewood Heath.

## Anti-Social Behaviour/Inspectorate Unit

The management and sustainment of social tenancies and good estate management falls within the remit of the ASB/Inspectorate Unit. Alleged breaches of Tenancy Agreements are investigated and pursued in accordance with housing legislation and policy.

There are occasions when the vulnerabilities, complexities and health related issues associated with a tenancy require tenancy sustainment and welfare intervention and supports. Ongoing case management and review with a variety of external agencies, including Approved Housing Bodies, An Garda Síochána, TUSLA and the HSE may be required to ensure all agencies work collaboratively with a view to achieving best outcomes for our Communities. This work is ongoing in relation to a number of Tenancies in the county.

The Housing Forum for the Dublin 15 area has resumed, with the most recent meeting taking place in early May. The next meeting of the Blanchardstown Forum is scheduled to take place on 14<sup>th</sup> July 2023.

The Housing Forum affords collaborative working between Council Officials, Elected Representatives, Statutory Agencies and Community Representatives in relation to good estate management.

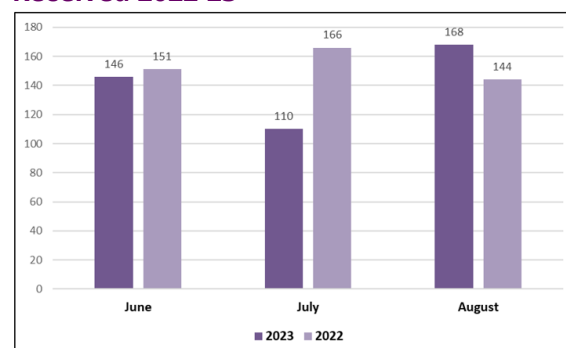

The Council's Fingal Ukraine Response Forum chaired by the Mayor continues to meet regularly with the next meeting on the 13<sup>th</sup> September 2023 to assist co-ordinate the response of the various statutory agencies and voluntary groups in the county to assist the Ukraine community.

## Liam Rodgers Rest Centre

The centre was re-opened as temporary accommodation for displaced Ukrainians on the 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2022 to cater for increasing pressures on the accommodation situation in the country for displaced Ukrainians. The centre is presently operating at full capacity utilised for new arrivals to the country with various statutory agencies linked with the centre to provide support to the new arrivals. Every effort is made to move the rest centre occupants to more permanent accommodation as soon as possible with a steady stream of moves to pledge accommodation. Supported by the Council and the Peter McVerry Trust (PMVT), **245 persons** have moved from the rest centre to OfferAtHome\pledge accommodation across the county and country since 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2022 with arrangements finalising with respect to further moves to OfferAtHome\pledge accommodation

## OfferAtHome\Pledge Accommodation

National call for vacant unoccupied properties (OfferAtHome) to accommodate Ukrainian displaced persons was launched on the 24<sup>th</sup> of November 2022. In terms of the Fingal area, all suitable properties offered are occupied. The monthly recognition payment is **€800** per month for vacant properties and **€800** to host a Ukraine

This event was well attended by existing hosts and prospective hosts.

## **COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT OFFICE**

### **Community Development**

Community development is a process where community members come together to take collective action and generate solutions to common problems. Community wellbeing, economic, social, environmental and cultural challenges are often solved through collective action being taken at a grassroots level. Community development ranges from small initiatives within a local group to large initiatives that involve the broader community.

Building community capacity, strengthening community participation and involving people in decisions that affect their lives is a complex process and can only be achieved by working with local communities and agencies who have responsibility to the people in those communities. In August/September the Community Development Office worked in partnership with a number of community groups and partners to support the projects/Initiatives set out below

### **Mourne Celtic FC 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration**

Mournes Celtic FC celebrated its 10-year anniversary with a family day and charity 5-a-side soccer tournament on the sports ground in the heart of Mourneview Estate in Skerries. The event was very well attended with over 250 community members who enjoyed face-painting, penalty shoot-out contests and the tournament itself. The players entry fees were donated to Skerries RNLI. The event was co-funded by the Community Office through Community Activities funding. Speaking about the contribution, chairperson Thomas Byrne said: *"Mourne Celtic Football Club would like to thank Fingal County Council for the grant for our 10th year anniversary!". It would not have been possible to hold the Community Day without this funding.* The event was a great success.



### **Pride of Place Preparation**



The three groups representing Fingal in the 2023 IPB Pride of Place Competition have been preparing for the judging visits on 4<sup>th</sup> & 5<sup>th</sup> September. The Draiocht Arts Centre Dublin 15, Garristown Community Council and Broadmeadow Community Garden, Swords will each take part in the north-south competition which showcases the best in community development in Ireland.

The community of Garristown in north Fingal are nominated in the 500-1500 Population category and a committee formed over the summer has put together a presentation highlighting the tremendous voluntary work the community stakeholders from the local library, parish church, community council, tidy towns to the various cultural and sports clubs have done in the area. Broadmeadow Community Garden in Swords is showcasing its work over the last 13 years in the Climate Action and Biodiversity Category. This active group has linked in with many local organisations who use the garden for community, recreational and environmental purposes.

Finally, the Draiocht Arts Centre in Dublin 15 will compete in the Creative Place Category and is busy working on its presentation for the judges which highlights the work they do with the vibrant youth and children's sector in Blanchardstown and beyond.

The results of the competition will be announced at a Finals Event being hosted in Armagh city in November.



**Summer Event - Families of children with additional needs**



On Saturday the 12<sup>th</sup> August Balbriggan Hope-Arch group in collaboration with Aster Family Resource Centre and FCC Community Development Office hosted a summer event for Families of Children with Additional needs in Castlelands Community Centre. The initiative, which forms part of a bigger social inclusion and Integration project, focuses on three main areas of Community Development: Social inclusion, Integration and civic engagement. The family friendly sensory event in Castlelands Community Centre was enjoyed by 75 families across Balbriggan where the Balbriggan Hope-Arch group was launched. The group utilised this event to register new members and promote the group to a wider audience and has been working with the Community Development Officer in Balbriggan as well as Aster Family Resource Centre in order to build capacity. The group will undertake committee skills training this September and had its first AGM during the summer in order to register on the PPN/FCCR.

### Black and Irish Pod Cast



On 28<sup>th</sup> July Foroige Balbriggan were proud to host a live recording of Black & Irish Podcast. The young people, taking part, discussed the theme of diversity and inclusion with Minister of State Joe O'Brien and captured key points and offered direction for the concerns raised. The event was funded through the Community Integration Fund. The Black & Irish Podcast will be a key feature during Fingal Inclusion week as part of the project by Balbriggan Social Inclusion Committee.

### Balbriggan Inclusion Week Committee - Social Inclusion Tour

On Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> August Balbriggan Inclusion Week Committee came together for the first time. The overall purpose of Balbriggan Inclusion Week Committee is to foster connections and collaborate through a partnership approach with members of the committee and wider community/services/agencies regarding Fingal Inclusion Week activities in Balbriggan. The Committee aim to highlight the strong collaborations within the community through a 'Social Inclusion Week Tour' at 5/6 locations ending with a showcase of services to the local community and an illustrated social narrative piece.



## Festival in a Van



Festival in a Van visited five locations in Fingal in August, bringing music, poetry and song to communities in Portrane, Donabate, Rush, Lusk and Skerries. Supported by the Community Office and funded by Creative Fingal, the van played short gigs in St Ita's Resource Centre, Portrane and Donabate Community Centre. The visiting musicians and poets were joined on both occasions by locals. The following day the event visited St Catherine's Estate in Rush and later Floraville Park, Skerries where the touring musicians were joined by dancers from the local refugee community. Finally, the Van reached Garristown in north county Fingal and joined with local musicians celebrating the preparation work carried out for the Pride of Place competition taking place later this month.



## 2023 Safer Halloween Programme and Community Scarecrow Competition



The Community Development Office has received expressions of interest from over 60 community groups in participating in the Fingal Safer Halloween Programme. This programme provides fun recreational and diverse activities for young people during the week before Halloween to deter them from participating in antisocial Halloween activities. Participating projects will also organise stay safe activities and promote the Community Development Office 'Stay Safe and Awareness' campaign. This will generate an awareness of other deterrent initiatives provided by Fingal County Council including Bulb Planting, Recycling Amnesty and Bonfire Removal measures.

## LGBTQI+ Mapping of Community Group and Services

As a result, LGBTQI+ General Awareness Training is taking place in Blanchardstown (Parslickstown Community Centre) on Monday 18<sup>th</sup> September in Balbriggan (Bracken Court Hotel) on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> and Swords (Applewood) on Saturday 23<sup>rd</sup> September.

### **Baldoye Racecourse Community Garden celebrates 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary.**



Racecourse Community Garden, Baldoye celebrated their 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary on 24<sup>th</sup> June 2023 in the company of the Mayor Cllr, Adrian Henchy, Cllr. Joan Hopkins, volunteers, family and friends. The Community Department supported the development of the Community Garden in 2013 and continues to provide support to the project. The community garden continues to grow from strength to strength and is very much a community space. While gardening remains the focus, the garden continues to develop with designated social spaces for BBQ's, outdoor films, boules and tables/chairs for tea and chats and is an example of what can be achieved when communities work together.



### **Community Garden Networking**



The Community Department coordinated a meeting of members of Baldoye Racecourse Community Garden and Broadmeadow Community Garden to share experiences and plans for the community garden. Members of Broadmeadow Community Garden visited Baldoye Community Garden on 31<sup>st</sup> July 2023 and learnt how the garden developed as a community space with regular social events. Baldoye garden is also used by other local groups and schools as well as 'friends of the garden'. Members shared their gardening experiences and fund-raising ideas to facilitate further plans for both gardens, with plans afoot to visit other community gardens.

## Celebrating Summer Solstice in Swords



On 21<sup>st</sup> June 2023 Broadmeadow Community Garden celebrated Summer Solstice by hosting a gathering of local community groups. Broadmeadow Gardeners invited residents, as well as members of Swords Men's Shed, Swords Women's Shed, Fingal Beekeepers, Fingal Horticultural Society, Tidy Towns and Swords Singers to spend some time in the garden and share knowledge and produce. Refreshments of tea, cakes, bread and honey were enjoyed over talks about planting, composting and best flowers for bees. While a new section of the garden was planted with crops of onions and pumpkins, produce such as peas, lettuce was shared with guests and slips of rosemary, lavender and mint were given to all to take home and plant.

### Swords Circular Economy

Swords Circular Economy project is part of the Community Department's Keen to Be Green Communities Initiative. It is a collaboration between the Community Department and Swords Tidy Towns, Swords Beekeepers, Swords Woodlands, Broadmeadow Community Garden, Swords Men's Shed and Swords Women's Shed. It takes place in August and September with various workshops, talks and as well as nature and woodland walks in locations throughout Swords. During August Fingal Beekeepers Association gave a talk the importance of protecting bees and how to help them in Broadmeadows. The community garden was presented with specially designed sign for their garden to acknowledge the work they do in planting and development of various pollinator beds.



Swords Women's Shed hosted a talk on how to create bespoke pieces of art and on upcycling clothing. They were reminded of the impact of purchasing sustainable clothing, shoes and handbags and the value of visiting and supporting local charity shops.



A masterclass on the Art of Upcycling was facilitated by Ukrainian artist Liliia Ilvovska. Over 35 people from all over Fingal attended this masterclass on how to take simple pieces of plain clothes, denim, cotton and transform them to bespoke pieces.

The over-all aim of the Swords Circular Economy is to develop an awareness among residents of the need to promote biodiversity and provide practical steps that individuals can take to promote the sustainable management of waste and the circular economy, and advance Fingal's climate action commitments while at the same time promoting a sense of community in Swords. Upcoming events include guided nature walks in the Swords area for families, a sustainable gardening course, food waste workshops, clothes swap shop, guided woodlands walk and a free cycle repair workshop.

### St. Margarets Community Clean Up



A community clean took place in St. Margaret's on 22<sup>nd</sup> July 2023. St. Margarets Community Group organised the clean-up around the village and St. Brigid's Well. Thanks to Operations Dept, litter picking equipment, gloves, bags were supplied and collected after the clean-up. Refreshments were on hand to sustain volunteers.

### COYGIG- Rivervalley Community Centre Watch Party



Rivervalley Community Centre, Rivervalley Rangers Soccer club and the Revive Group hosted a Ladies World Cup Watch Party on 20<sup>th</sup> July. There was standing room only in the community centre as the Irish team took on Australia. Young and old cheered the team on, as four screens displayed the Irish team's best endeavours. Plenty of goodie bags, fruit and chocolate kept the supporters going.

### Shared Island Intergenerational Project

Department of Foreign Affairs, Shared Island Civic Society Funding was awarded to support a cross border intergenerational project in Balbriggan and the village of Mayobridge, Newry. This is a collaboration between the Community Department and Linking Generations Northern Ireland. Both communities will participate in separate intergenerational projects, each involving 10 older people and 10 younger people, and will share experiences throughout the project. The initiative will commence with a workshop for all participants on 9<sup>th</sup> September 2023 in Balbriggan, facilitated by Linking Generations Northern Ireland. Following this initial session preparations will begin to develop projects in each location.

### Integration Art Project

A recent collaborative project between the Dublin 15 Community Development Team and the Ukrainian Support Officer brought two groups together, the Mountview Art Group and the Ukrainian Art Group. The aim of this project is to encourage shared experiences through the medium of art. The launch of the exhibition take place on 6<sup>th</sup> September at 6.30pm in Blanchardstown Library and will run for one week. The project will support a further 10-week integration art programme where both groups will meet each week and build on their art skills, shared knowledge and friendship.



### Ongar Youth Planting Initiative

The Community Office in collaboration with Environment and Operations Departments worked with Ongar Community Centre and Ongar Development initiative to support a Parenting and Teen planting project in Ongar Village through Anti-Litter and Graffiti funding. The project took place on the 30<sup>th</sup> of July and had an excellent turnout of volunteers in addition to over 30 young people. The initiative was also supported by several local businesses in the area who provided food and refreshments for the volunteers. We look forward to seeing other projects from the group in the future.



### Castlecurragh Family Fun Day

Castlecurragh Residents Association held their second annual Family Fun Day in Mulhuddart Community Centre. The event was supported by the Community Development Office, as well as by Mulhuddart Community Centre, members of the Mulhuddart Football Club, Foróige and the Community Gardaí. The family fun day was very well attended by the local community. Planning for next year's event is already underway.



### Variety Show Group Talent Competition



The Variety Show Group held their Talent Show Competition this year in Mulhuddart Community Centre. Supported by the Community Development Office, this event showcased the wealth of talent of all ages and backgrounds from the local area. The organising committee and each show participant put in an incredible amount of work to make the event successful. Well done to all who attended and participated in auditions, rehearsals and the big event itself.

### Facilities

#### Lets Sing! Community Choir Pilot Project - Dublin 15



Five Community Facilities have embarked on a collaboration between the Community Development Office and Draiocht. This pilot

project will see community choirs set up across five community centres for the last quarter of 2023. Draocht have sourced a Choir Master Debra Salem who will provide guidance and oversee the establishment of the community choirs. There is no audition as everyone is welcome. The main purpose is to bring people together to have fun through singing. The choirs will take place at

1. Parslickstown House
2. Mountview Youth and Community Centre
3. Huntstown Community Centre
4. Castleknock Community Centre
5. Ongar Community Centre

This initiative will provide new opportunities for engagement with community facilities. It is hoped that by the end of the project one overall choir will be established for Dublin 15. The Community Office will then explore supporting the choir under the One Town One Voice Project. The pilot project will commence on 13<sup>th</sup> October and will run through to 3<sup>rd</sup> December.

### **100% target reached for AEDs in FCC supported community facilities**



We are delighted to confirm that we have reached the target to provide an automated external defibrillator in each of our FCC supported community facilities. The AED is used to help those experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. It is a sophisticated yet easy to use medical device that can analyse the hearts rhythm and if necessary, deliver an electrical shock, or defibrillation to help the hear re-establish an effective rhythm. This has been an ongoing project for the past three years and we are delighted to have reached our goal. We are also rolling out Cardiac First Response training at all sites to ensure that at least 25% of the Community facility staff are adequately trained. Our plan is to ensure that all staff employed in our community centres will be proficient in the use of the AED equipment in 2024. We have had several first aid emergency instances in our centres where staff have had to deal with emergency situations.

Thankfully due to the high level of training provided they were able to manage the emergency until the arrival of the emergency services. This project will further support our commitment to making the difference and possibly saving lives.

### **Playful Streets Pilot**

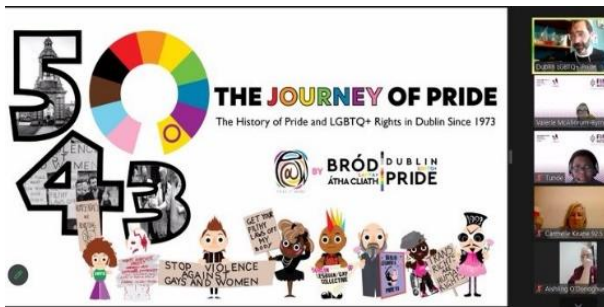

## Diversity, Equality, Inclusion & Belonging (DEIB) in the Workplace

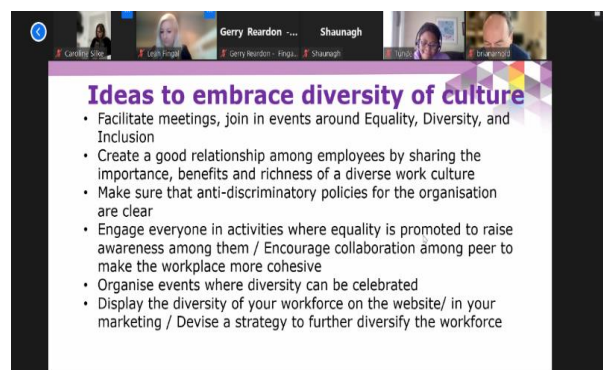
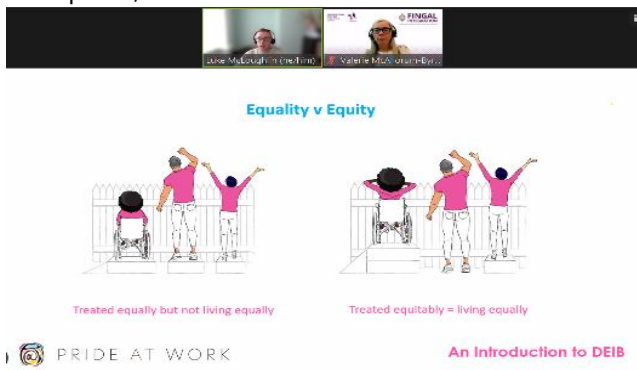

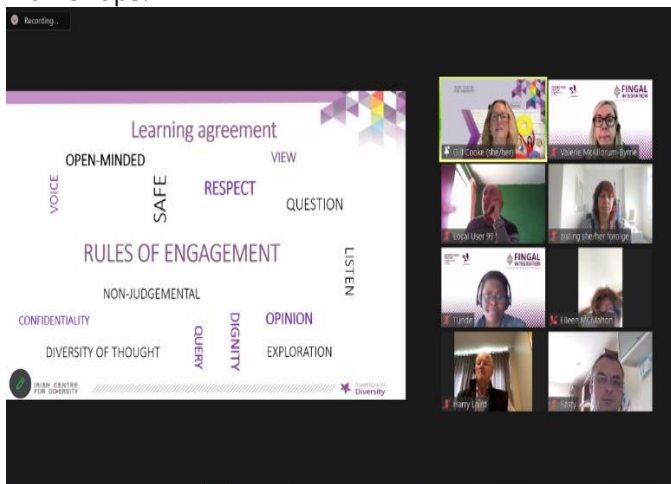
## Cultural Awareness Workshops

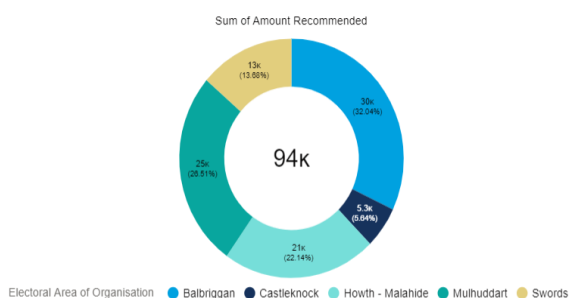
### **Information Event/Showcase for Over 55's: Baldoyle/Sutton**

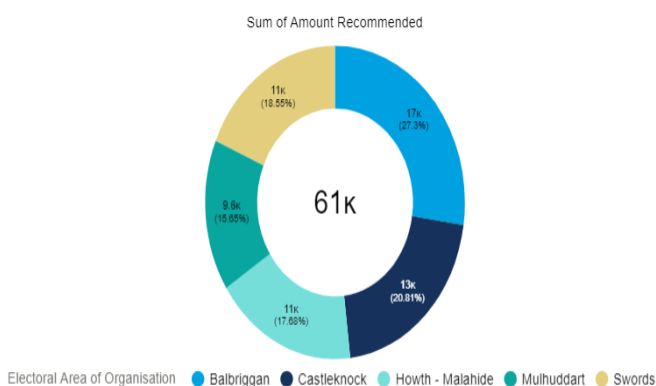

## Her Outdoors Week

The "HER Outdoors Week," took place from 13<sup>th</sup> – 20<sup>th</sup> August was a national campaign developed by Sport Ireland Outdoors. Its primary objective is to promote and encourage more females to explore and appreciate the advantages of outdoor activities while highlighting local opportunities available for girls and women to engage in outdoor physical pursuits.

Throughout the week, 16 events were organised by the Fingal Sports Office, attracting a significant turnout of 471 participants across all events. Notably, several events attracted substantial interest and participation, such as the Yoga and Dip sessions introduced by the new Fingal Swim

Officer Megan Swan at Donabate and Portmarnock Beach, Paddle Boarding in Malahide Estuary, and Fingal Orienteering at Malahide Castle.



### Balbriggan Beach Festival

In its third year, the Balbriggan Beach Festival 2023 successfully achieved its goals of enhancing community cohesion, highlighting opportunities and achievements of local sports clubs and providing a day of family-centred activities.

With the collaboration of Fingal Sports Office and local sports clubs, this event emphasised dedication to both sports and community engagement. With over 2000 local attendees, the festival witnessed impressive support.

Participants enthusiastically engaged in various sports like Olympic handball, beach volleyball on the permanent nets, rugby, cricket, and football. Additionally, the festival offered family-oriented activities, including yoga sessions, drumming workshops, PLAY activities, and a lively Colour

Party finale, enhancing the beach with vibrant colours, funded by Active Cities Dublin. The Balbriggan Beach Festival 2023 was an enormous success, uniting the local community, celebrating local sports clubs, and delivering an enjoyable day of family entertainment. It has firmly established itself as an eagerly anticipated annual event, continuing to unite the Fingal community.



### 3 x 3 Basketball Ireland Tour

Fingal Sports Office, in collaboration with Basketball Ireland, recently hosted a successful tour of 3x3 basketball events at various locations across Fingal County Council. The events, which were held at Balbriggan's Millfield Shopping Centre, Swords Pavilions Shopping Centre, and Blanchardstown Shopping Centre, aimed to showcase the incredible basketball talent in the local communities. Additionally, the events promoted community engagement and encouraged residents to participate in come-and-try sessions.

One of the tour's highlights was Balbriggan's Late-Night Basketball group participating. This group plays every Friday evening in Flemington Community Centre 7-10pm and brought a group of 60 youths together to partake in the fun of the tour. This event served as a terrific way to kick off the tour and set the tone for the rest of the events. Overall, it provided an exceptional opportunity for everyone to engage in some fantastic basketball action. Prizes were awarded to the winners of the tour by Active Cities Dublin.



### Fingal Women's FAI Watch Party

On the 20th of July, Fingal Sports Office and Active Cities Dublin hosted Fingal's FAI Women's Watch Party, which was a celebration of women's football. The event attracted up to 1500 individuals, including residents of D15, local football clubs and supporters. This event, which was free of charge, featured enormous screens that allowed attendees to experience the live action with the same level of intensity as if they were in the stadium. In addition, an exciting competition for the "best-dressed super fan" was organised, which added an extra layer of excitement to the event, with prizes awarded, including a signed Ireland jersey.

The positive and lively atmosphere among supporters further contributed to the festive spirit of the occasion, and the Australian Embassy Ambassador also joined in the celebration of Ireland vs. Australia. The Fingal Women's Watch Party was a great success, highlighting the importance of women's football within the county while also embracing the legacy of Fingal's projects of a new TY FAI girl's course, Girls World Cup blitz before the Watch Party, and a MentHERship programme that encourages football at all ages, all mentioned below in the FAI update.



### Fingal Sports Office and Ukrainian Centre collaboration

Fingal Sports Office, in collaboration with the Fingal Ukrainian centres, has actively promoted community engagement and inclusivity through various sporting initiatives throughout the summer months. Notably, the Ukrainian community has significantly participated in the below events, illustrating their growing integration into the local sports scene.

During HER Outdoors Week, the Aer Lingus Bowls Day saw substantial Ukrainian participation, with 40 attendees. This involvement has paved the way for further integration of the Ukrainian community into the Aer Lingus Bowls club for upcoming events and programmes. In addition, Basketball Ireland's donation of a basketball net to the Liam Rodgers Ukrainian group led to the initiation of an introduction to basketball programme for 4 weeks in the centre. Ukrainian residents' keen interest highlights the positive impact of inclusive sports programmes and their potential integration into local clubs.

Furthermore, 150 Ukrainian residents attended the Balbriggan Beach Festival Promoting social integration as Fingal Sports Office organised transport and lunch/ice-creams for the residents to enjoy at the Balbriggan beach. Fingal Sports Office's support, including equipment provision and transportation, contributed to the success of these events, emphasising the power of sports in fostering unity within the diverse community.



### **Parkfit**

Throughout the summer, weekly Parkfit sessions were organised in various locations across Fingal, including Meakstown, Swords, Balbriggan, and the newly introduced location in Miller's Glen, Swords.

These sessions allowed participants to immerse themselves in outdoor physical activity within parks of Fingal. Throughout the ten-week duration, each of these locations consistently attracted more than 30 participants, underlining the widespread interest and enthusiasm for outdoor exercise within the community.

Furthermore, Parkfit played a pivotal role in the HER Outdoors Week festivities. During this special week, Parkfit programmes garnered substantial attention, with a remarkable turnout of over 150 women actively participating in these fitness programmes. This enthusiastic engagement during HER Outdoors Week underscored the commitment of the community to promote and celebrate female involvement in outdoor fitness and well-being initiatives.



### **Sports Leadership**



The Sports Office collaborated with Foroige Balbriggan and Balbriggan RFC to deliver a week-long Sports Leadership programme during August.

The programme gave the group the opportunity to obtain Youth Leadership qualification as well as three Sports Qualifications and the opportunity to do some coaching experience in their club. The event culminated in a trip to Carlingford Adventure Centre as well as a chance to harness their leadership skills at the Beach Festival Event in Balbriggan.



### Boxup

Fingal County Council has introduced a pilot project of BoxUp units at Skerries Community Centre and Rush South Beach. These innovative units enhance local recreational spaces, promoting a vibrant outdoor lifestyle.

The Active Cities Programme focuses on encouraging physical activity, particularly among the least active in society. This initiative, involving the Swiss-based company BoxUp, provides easy local access to free sports and leisure equipment thus reducing barriers to participation.

Eight Local Sports Partnerships have collaborated with BoxUp to bring these solar-powered lockers, filled with equipment tailored to local amenities, to Ireland. Users can access the equipment through a free app.



### Co-funded Officers Highlights

#### FAI (Football Association of Ireland)

38 Summer Camps throughout Fingal, engaging over 3,500 participants.

In conjunction with FCC and Garda – Balbriggan ‘Late Nite League’ was extended to continuation through the summer to August, due to the demand of participating cohort. Every Friday, an average of 50 youths ‘dropped-in’ for this safe and secure community-intervention – which assists in informal Community Policing

Involved in 10 Club ‘Watch Parties’ for Ireland matches during Women’s World Cup – providing ‘party packs’ for clubhouses

With FCC, delivered a ‘Girls World Cup’ Blitz at Abbottstown on 16<sup>th</sup> July – 15 teams, consisting of 140 players, aged between 7–10 year-olds, provided an excellent day of skill, friendship, and fun.



MentHERship Scheme’ - Building on the excitement and legacy of the World Cup, FCC is funding female coaches, aged 16-21, on their ‘Coaching Pathway’ Education Courses - on the proviso they MUST coach younger girl players at their clubs.



Free- Fingal Referee Course - encouraging all community members to consider becoming a referee.

### Leinster Cricket

Corduff Cricket Day-Camps, 24 8-11year olds (including 13 girls) participated throughout July, as a follow-on from weekly coaching visits to St Patrick's NS during May / June

### Cricket For All

'Cricket for All' Guide published in August (official launch with Mayor in September. 1<sup>st</sup> ever schools 'Table Cricket Match' between TETNS v St Luke's - which concluded with a visit to Tyrrelstown Cricket Club. Over 120 participants took part in Cricket 4 All summer activities

### Leinster Rugby

Camps – Westmanstown RFC & Balbriggan RFC – 250 kids took part in 10 days designed as an intro to game. 14 new sign-ups accrued, 5 girls & 9 boys. 'Give it a Try' - a one night a week initiative aimed at attracting girls to rugby based in 3 clubs; Suttonians (13-17 year-olds), Balbriggan and Skerries (6-12 year-olds) - over 100 girls took part.

For the first time, 5 female players from the Fingal area were selected for Leinster U/18s Panel; 3 from Skerries / 1 each from Balbriggan and Coolmine... to note, 5 years ago these clubs did not even have operational Girls Sections. Two girls have further progressed to the Ireland U/18s. 6 FCC area boys have been selected to Leinster U/18s.

## Active Travel

### **NTA funding allocations for 2023 – see Appendix 1**

#### **Strategic Planning**

##### Active Travel Strategy

The Active Travel Strategy was presented at the full Council meeting in June 2023 and has been adopted by the councillors.

The Strategy is now intended for use by planners, decision makers and anyone else within the council who is in a position to influence how people travel around the county.

#### **Protected Cycle Lanes:**

##### **BLRS Area:**

#### **St. Cronan's Ave and Brackenstown Road Protected Cycle Lanes**

As the project comes to a completion the final snags are currently underway by the main works contractor. Over 20 new trees were planted during the summer and multiple new flowerbed areas are now establishing along the front of the schools on Brackenstown Road and along St. Cronan's Avenue junction. St Cronan's Junior and Senior schools are back and our walking and cycling officers are working with the school management and pupils to promote and encourage the use of the new infrastructure by walking and cycling to school. Walking and cycling buses are being promoted and with the support of the parents' association these can be very successful for the smaller kids in allowing them to walk and cycle to school safely.

The project will need to go through a bedding in phase over the coming weeks and months to allow for all stakeholder's experience the module shift and allow all road users both vulnerable and

motorist integrate and commute in a safer environment.

The project has delivered safety improvements for vulnerable road users across 11 Junctions, with new toucan crossings and 5 zebra crossings to meet the desire lines. Traffic calming measures, two-way off-road cycle track and improved landscaping which helps soften the environment and make the area a more attractive place for everyone.

An official opening of the project is being organised for mid-September

#### **R132 Ministers Rd to Blakes Cross + Kilhedge Lane**

The Project Team together with the Engineering Design Team have been progressing well with this project over recent months. The tender evaluation has now been completed and the Project Team are in the process of appointing the successful tenderer for the works contract.

These works will be commencing over the coming weeks with drainage and kerbing to be the first items to take place. Traffic Management will be in place throughout the works, but no road closures are anticipated at this stage. Temporary speed limit order is being processed at present to reduce the speeds along this section of road to 60km/hr. Liaison with Corduff National School, local

residence and business will be co-ordinated between the project team and the contractor to keep all stakeholders informed as the works progress. Updates on a weekly basis will also be provided to Cllr's through the usual weekly updates.

### **Seatown Road Swords:**

Engineering Consultants are finalising the Non-Statutory Public Consultation Summary Report which will be published on the Consultation Portal. Works are ongoing to finalise the Tender documents to allow the Project Team to go to the market for a Contractor to complete the works proposed on the ground. This project will be going to the market in the coming weeks for a Contractor and progressing to Construction stage at the end of Q3 start of Q4 this year.

### **Donabate Portrane R126 cycle paths:**

An Engineering consultant is appointed to the project and several surveys have been completed to inform the design process. The Engineering consultant is currently working with the project team in developing concept designs and options report to assist with stakeholder engagement. The project will extend from the end of the distributor road in Donabate along the R126 right through to the coast at Portrane. The Project aims to provide walking and cycling infrastructure from Donabate to the coast at Portrane which will provide connectivity to the Fingal Coast Route.

### **Coney Hill Balbriggan R132 cycle paths:**

An Engineering consultant is appointed to the project and several surveys have been completed to inform the design process. The Engineering consultant is currently working with the project team in developing concept designs and options report to assist with stakeholder engagement.

### **Pathfinder Pinnock Hill to Airport cycle paths:**

The Project team have been liaising with Dublin Airport Authority and the National Transport

Authority in relation to agreeing the scope of the project. Tender documents were published by CPU and the tender competition has been completed to appoint an integrated design team. The Project Team is in the process of appointing the successful tenderer to commence with the necessary surveys and concept designs and options report for the project. Further updates will be provided over the coming months.

### **Howth-Malahide Area:**

#### **Baldoyle-Howth Protected Cycle Lane Scheme Phase 1**

Phase 1 of the scheme is substantially completed.

#### **Baldoyle-Howth Protected Cycle Lane Scheme Phase 2**

Options report received and under review by Active Travel.

#### **Paddy's Hill to Broomfield via Naomh Mearnog GAA**

Design brief being prepared for the connectivity project. Once complete it is intended to run a tender competition to appoint a design consultant for the project. Footpath works around Paddy's Hill car park have been completed by Operations department. Further enabling works to continue over Q'3 2023.

#### **Seamount Heights to Old Gold Course Link Park**

Preliminary design was revisited after feedback from Active Travel and internal FCC stakeholders. A meeting with residents was held on 24th May 2023. Our next steps are to incorporate the comments expressed at the site meeting on 24th May 2023 into the proposal. This will be developed to detailed design and tendered for the construction of the works as soon as possible.



## **Station Road Portmarnock Footpaths and Cycleway**

Works have been substantially completed and press release has been done by FCC on project.

## **Feltrim Road Cycle Infrastructure**

These works are expected to go to tender for a design consultant in 2023.

## **Scoil an Duinnigh to Waterside Footpath and Cycleway**

These works are expected to go to tender for a design consultant in 2023 once consultation with the Department of Education has been completed.

## **BMCO Area:**

### **Snugborough Road – NAC to Ongar**

Work is continuing on the options report for the project after internal reviews by the Active Travel team and a workshop with the NTA. Further design changes are being developed by the design team taking into consideration future BusConnects projects in the immediate area. A Gateway 2 Report is nearing finalisation to be issued to the NTA for approval to proceed to the preliminary design phase of the project. A project appraisal report is also being prepared.

### **Clonee to Blanchardstown Shopping Centre**

All data collection has been collated and has informed the initial development of the options report. The initial draft options report and drawings have been reviewed internally by the Active Travel team and has been issued back to the design consultant for consideration. Stakeholder meetings with Meath County Council and the TII have taken place.

### **Castleknock to Dunsink Lane**

This project is split into 3 separate sections, namely: (a) Auburn Avenue linking into the Royal

Canal at the 12<sup>th</sup> Lock, (b) Dunsinea Lane and (c) Dunsink Lane. Work is continuing developing the options report for each section and a rapid build option for Auburn Avenue is being explored. Separate draft options reports have been submitted by the design consultant for sections a & b and have been reviewed internally by the Active Travel team. This review has been issued back to the design consultant for consideration to further develop each section.

### **Hartstown/Huntstown/Mountview Road**

The phase 2b junction designs have been completed by the cycle design office (CDO). These designs are being reviewed by FCC before tendering for construction.

### **Castleknock to Blanchardstown via Farmleigh**

Stage 2 of the tender competition for a design consultant has been completed and works are ongoing in appointing a consultant during September.

## **Towns & Villages**

Works are continuing in the development of an Active Travel Plan for a number of our Towns & Villages. Details are outlined below.

### **New Street**

An application was made to An Board Pleanála by members of the public in relation to the proposed public realm improvements, requesting EIA and AA Screening Determinations. As a result the Part 8 Process is on hold until after An Bord Pleanála has made its decision, outlined to be by the 11th of September 2023.

### **Balrothery Active Travel Plan**

Tender competition has closed and assessment is ongoing. It is the aim to appoint a consultant during September to commence work on the Active Travel plan once the procurement process is finalised.

### **Skerries Active Travel Plan**

Stage One of the tender competition for the appointment of an integrated Design Team is now completed with the tender assessment process completed and letter to successful and unsuccessful tenders to be issued. This will allow for stage 2 of the process to commence which will take 7-8 weeks to complete. The Project Team are also in the process of publishing the Consultation Report for the project together with the ESRI report that was carried out on Active Travel best practice Nationally and Internationally. These report will inform the overall design process when the integrated design team is appointed in Q4 of this year.

### **Skerries Harbour Road:**

The Project Team together with the Integrated design team have been working rigorously over the summer in developing concept drawings and options report to assist with stakeholder engagement. Internal workshops to discuss through the proposals occurred during the last few months and this feedback from these meetings have been taken on board. The project team and the Integrated design team are developing photo montages and video footage of the proposal to assist in the consultation phase of the project.

### **Connectivity/Permeability**

We are continuing to receive various requests for Permeability and Connectivity improvements from various stakeholders across the county. These requests are being recorded in detail for evaluation through a multi criteria analysis. The projects are then reviewed across the departments to identify if an appropriate means of delivery can be established on the ground. A number of projects identified through this process are being developed through the design phases for execution later this year.

Where other projects are being progressed in the area at either design or construction stage we endeavour to include these Connectivity and Permeability improvements within those projects. Greenway connectivity support teams have been convened to review, design, and deliver active travel infrastructure that will enhance accessibility between the proposed strategic greenways and

residential, educational, amenity and commercial zones. These support projects have been set up for Fingal Coastal Way, Broadmeadow Way/Sutton to Malahide Greenway and Royal Canal Greenway. This will help to optimise the use of the proposed greenway by both leisure and commuter users.

### **Newtown Bridge, Balheary Road:**

Engineering Consultants are finalising the Non-Statutory Public Consultation Summary Report which will be published on the Consultation Portal. Works are ongoing to finalise the Tender documents to allow the Project Team to go to the market for a Contractor to complete the works proposed on the ground. This project will be going to the market in the coming weeks for a Contractor and progressing to Construction stage at the end of Q3 start of Q4 this year.

### **Rush South Beach:**

Engineering consultant currently preparing concept design and options report for new universal access path. Discussions with landowners have taken place during the summer, and we are working collaboratively with the property owners to find an optimal solution that caters for everyone's needs.

### **Access Constraints**

Following on from circular (NGS Circular 4/22) and guidance from the NTA (Access Control of Active Travel Facilities) the Active Travel Unit has mapped the access constraints (in particular kissing gates) within Fingal. We have put together a list of access constraints to be considered for removal and works proposed to improve for pedestrians, cyclists and disabled persons. This list is currently being reviewed by the various departments to ensure that the removal of these constraints provide a positive impact in these areas. On completion of the review Fingal County Council Active Travel in conjunction with Operations will be coordinating the removal of these access constraints across the county.

### **Secure Bicycle Parking Infrastructure**

Contractor is currently on site at various locations across the county and is progressing works to install a number of bike parking facilities across the

county. Further works are planned in Swords, Donabate and Dublin 15 areas in the coming weeks. Locations are currently being agreed for expansion of virtual e-bike parking in public areas. Active Travel has taken delivery of six new bike repair stations and will be rolling out two stations in each area. Installation works have now commenced.

### **Road Safety**

#### **Safe Routes to School**

##### Round 1 – Tranche 1

The works contractor for the Safe Routes to School Tranche 1 contract is making great progress at each of the three school sites. Works to date have progressed well, with little or no disruption to the schools or traffic in each of the three areas. A brief update is provided below for each school site and associated construction works completed to date since the appointment of the works contractor.

#### **Rush and Lusk Educate Together**

Works are now completed on this SRTS Project. The contractor is due back to site to carry out some snagging and maintenance work to the Rain Gardens and issues that were identified through the independent Road Safety Audit.

#### **Castaheany ETNS / St.Benedict's NS**

Works are now completed at the school site, The contractor is due to carry out minor snagging and maintenance on rain gardens. Stage 3 RSA has been completed by independent auditor.

### **Bayside Junior & Senior School**

Works are now completed at the school site, The contractor is due to carry out minor snagging and maintenance on rain gardens. Stage 3 RSA has been completed by independent auditor.



### **Scoil Choilm CNS**

Installation of flexible bollards on Porterstown Rd. outside the school entrance is complete. These initial works took place before the new school year starts to alleviate poor parking near the school gates. The main works are due to start at the end of Q4 2023.



### **Round 1 - Tranche 2**

Design is currently underway for the Tranche 2 schools (4 no.) with a view to progressing to construction later in the year. An initial meeting has been held with the NTA regarding the preliminary designs of the project. Work is ongoing in relation to progressing the design to detailed stage.

### **Round 2**

In mid-December An Taisce announced Round 2 of the Safer Routes to School programme, with the following Fingal schools selected:

- Holy Family Junior National School, Forest Fields, Swords
- Scoil Bhríde Buachaillí, Church Avenue, Blanchardstown

- Scoil Bhríde Cailíní, Church Avenue, Blanchardstown
- St Helen's SNS, Limetree Avenue, Portmarnock
- St. Colmcille's Girls' National School, Chapel Lane, Swords

The Active Travel team are working closely with An Taisce in relation to data collection and engagement with the schools to develop briefs to enable the tender process for designers and contractors to carry out the works. An Taisce are due to provide delivery plans for each of the schools that will inform the design process. FCC are in the final stages of procurement of a consultants' team that will be working on the designs for these schools.

### **Mobility & Behaviour Change**

#### **Community Cycle Portmarnock to Howth**

On Saturday 26 August, members of the Active Travel team led a community cycle from Portmarnock to Howth, using the new connector path that connects Station Road to the Baldoyle-Portmarnock Greenway.

The cycle started at Station Road Portmarnock, using the new cycle path connecting to the Greenway, stopping at Baldoyle Community Hall to collect more participants, then continuing to Howth for a well-deserved ice cream!

There was an excellent turn out with approximately 30 participants, with several families with young children taking part. The cycle demonstrated the importance of well-connected and easily accessible cycle paths, to encourage maximum participation in cycling.



### Cycling Without Age

In July we launched the 4<sup>th</sup> Trishaw in Fingal with Baldoyle becoming available to the Public for Bookings.

Over the course of the Summer, we held Cycling Without Age Open Days in Skerries and Santry as well as Volunteer Pilot Trainings across the four locations on multiple occasions

### Wheelchair Bike Trips

Over the summer months we worked with a number of Disability Service Providers in the Malahide and Dublin 15 areas to facilitate access to the Wheelchair Platform Bike. This bike allows people in a wheelchair to enjoy the sensation of going for a cycle without the need to transfer from their wheelchair. The summer initiative proved very successful and popular and we are looking at ways to expand this initiative to make the bike more easily and openly accessible.



### Staff eBike Trials

In August we launched our Staff eBike Trial Initiative. This initiative gives staff who sign up the opportunity to trial an eBike for a 30 day period. The trials were heavily subscribed with over 40 people signing up to take part. During the trials staff will be asked to complete a pre and post-trial survey with the hope being we will see an increase in cycling activity both to and from work, but also in people's personal lives.

### Staff Bike Repair Class & Cycling Skills Lessons

The Active Travel team have organised a basic bike maintenance class, which will run in Blanchardstown this September for Fingal staff.

Also running in Swords this September is a cycling skills class for staff who are hoping to return to cycling after a break or for staff who would like to build their confidence in cycling.

### Active Travel at Flavours of Fingal

The Active Travel Team were delighted to be part of the Fingal Village again this year for Flavours of Fingal. The Weekend was a great success with our Bike Locking and Transport Hierarchy Games proving very popular among visitors to our stand. We also had Pedal Powered Games on the Wellness Lawn and were able to provide the Events Unit with two Raleigh Closed Box eCargo Bikes for the weekend which helped them navigate the crowds while transporting equipment around the site.



### Active Travel at Malahide Family Day

The Active Travel Section we're represented at a very wet Malahide Family Day in July. Despite the weather, the event was well attended, and it was a brilliant chance to engage with residents and visitors to Malahide for the day.



### Learn 2 Cycle with a Disability

Our Learn 2 Cycle with a Disability Course continued over the summer months with courses in Donabate, Rivervalley and Flemington Community Centre. As we continue into the Autumn we have courses in Applewood, Rivervalley and Bayside-Sutton.

### Active Travel & Heritage Week

This year as part of Heritage Week we helped in organising 3 Heritage Walks in Malahide, Portmarnock and Swords. These free walking tours gave a great insight into the rich heritage of Fingal.

### Active Travel at the Vintage Picnic

Cycling Without Age was represented at the Vintage Picnic in Swords Castle, this brilliant Age Friendly Event was a great opportunity to spread the message about Cycling Without Age in Fingal. Well done to all in Community for organising a brilliant event.



### Adult Cycling Lessons

We are starting a new set of adult cycling lessons in partnership with Cycling Ireland from Monday 28<sup>th</sup> August in Mick Walsh Park in Mulhuddart. These sessions are targeting members of our new communities to encourage them to engage with Fingal and Active Travel

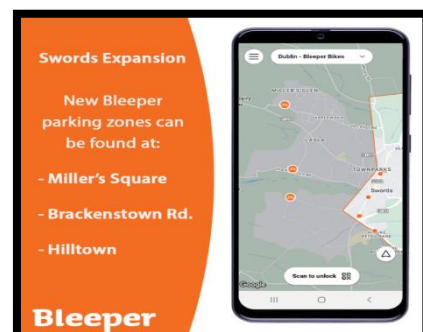

## Swords Parking Hubs

As part of the drive to improve bike share usage in the Swords area Bleper Bike have put in place Parking Hubs in three locations around swords. St Cronan's Avenue, Ward Rivalley Park and Applewood Village. These Hubs have been trialled in other locations in Dublin City and have proved very successful.

## Community eCargo Share Bike

The public share eCargo Bike is available from Mountview Community Centre in Dublin 15 and is operated by Bleper Bike. The Bike has seen a small amount of use since being introduced in June, but it is starting to climb now. From Monday 28<sup>th</sup> August Bleper Bike are offering customers their first use of the bike for free. This will be applied through a coupon and be available through the Bleper Bike App.

### Virtual Parking Bays

We have installed nine Virtual Parking Bays in Dublin 15, these geofenced spaces don't require sheffield stands but provide a safe space to finish bike share trips. These spaces have led to a large increase in usage in areas underserved by Sheffield Stands.

## Climate Action

### Fingal's new Climate Action Plan is on the way!

The Environment Climate Action and Active Travel Department are preparing a Draft Climate Action Plan 2024-2029 (CAP). This Draft Plan continues the progress made through the Climate Change

Action Plan 2019-2024, building on the successful outcomes and learnings from the first cycle. The Draft Plan contains an exciting list of climate actions across six thematic areas including a Community Engagement theme which is a new addition to this CAP and reflects the Council's ambition for the Plan. The other thematic areas include Energy and Buildings, Transport, Flood Resilience, Nature-Based Solutions, Circular Economy and Resource Management. The Plan demonstrates Fingal's continued commitment to climate action by proposing innovative climate adaptation and mitigation actions which the Council intends to take.

Four key targets have been identified for the Plan:

- 50% improvement in the Council's energy efficiency by 2030;
- 51% reduction in the Council's greenhouse gas emissions by 2030;
- To make Dublin a climate resilient region, by reducing the impacts of future climate change-related events; and
- To actively engage and inform our communities on climate action.

An extensive public consultation process will begin in mid-September when the Council hosts a series of public information events to actively engage with and inform the public and other stakeholders of the proposed Plan. There will be an opportunity for the public to engage with the draft Plan during this process, and there will be an opportunity for feedback in the form of submissions during the consultation period.

Details of the public information events will be posted on Fingal's social media in the coming weeks, and we strongly encourage you to take action and come along and have your say!

### Climate Action at Flavours of Fingal

The Climate Action Team attended the Fingal Village at Flavours of Fingal to raise awareness of climate change and to highlight climate actions we can all take. The Team spoke to members of the



public about the effects of climate change that are evident in our everyday lives globally and locally and how important taking climate action and living more sustainably can be in helping reduce our carbon emissions and prevent further global warming.

The Team provided information on natural alternatives to using environmentally harmful chemicals in the household and in the garden and there was a food waste display demonstrating how food waste can be managed in the home, the composting process and the importance of the peat free compost produced as an alternative to garden peat which comes from our precious bogs, one of the more important carbon sinks provided by nature. 1000 food waste caddies were provided free to members of the public at the event.

There was also an opportunity to highlight Fingal's Climate Change Action Plan 2019-2024 and the fact that it is under review and a new Climate Action Plan will be out for public consultation in mid-September.



## **ENVIRONMENT**

### **Environmental Awareness**

Anti-Litter Anti-Graffiti Competition funding was awarded to 16 applicant groups in July. The total amount awarded was €21,338. The groups are listed on the Fingal County Council website <https://www.fingal.ie/anti-litter-anti-graffiti-competition-2023>. Groups receive 50% payment up front, and 50% payment upon completion of their litter or graffiti project. This competition is supported by the Department of Communications, Climate Action and Environment.

Children from Blakestown Junior NS supported by transition year students from Blakestown

Community School created a model of a Sustainable City. Teacher Marie Burke was delighted to loan the model 'city of the future' to Fingal County Council Environmental Awareness Officer who arranged for its display in five Fingal libraries throughout the Summer. The model features solar and wind energy, EV charging points, local farmers market, a biodiversity area, water and wastewater treatment systems and a playground.

The Keen to be Green water phase visits were completed with community centres now working to reduce water use and manage waste sustainably.

Dyslexia-friendly wildlife books were offered to Fingal primary schools, 26 schools availed of the offer and will use them from September.

'Sea-shore Trips' provided beach and marine workshops to members of the public in August. Topics included coastal biodiversity, dune restoration and the importance of a litter-free environment.

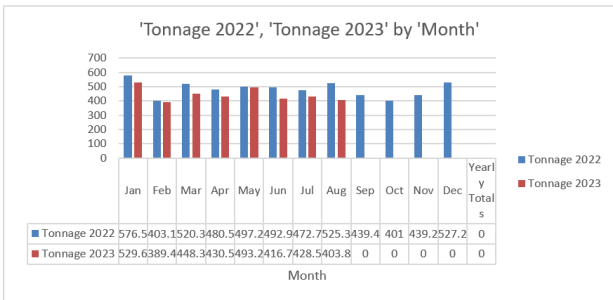

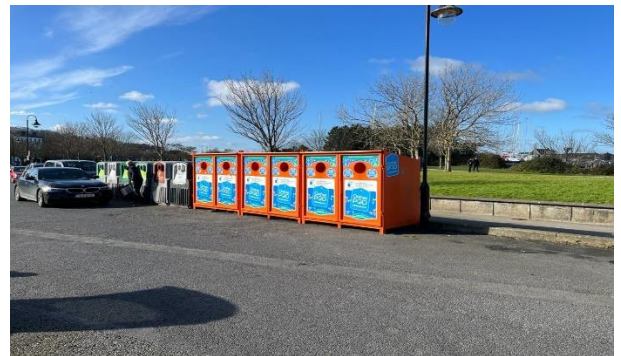

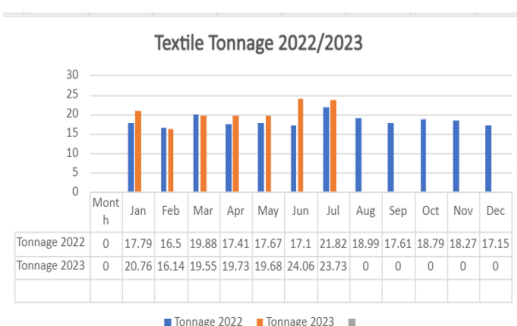


Textile Bank at the Seatown Carpark collected 130Kgs of textiles over the month of July 2023. Please continue to recycle at this location.

## Litter Management

During July and August, the Litter Wardens continued with their daily patrols, including all the litter black spots.



As Dog Fouling is an issue on all our beaches and can have a potential impact to water quality. Planned bathing water sampling have been taking place from May to September this year.

The Litter warden continued to raise awareness of the issue of dog fouling on beaches, they carried out extra inspections on the Saturday and Sundays prior to the water sampling. They carried out an awareness campaign in July and August on the following beaches, engaging with dog owners and dispensing dog poo bags, to make people aware of their responsibilities to clean up after their dogs.

Litter Wardens are also erecting anti dog fouling signage in areas where complaints were received. The Litter Warden also checked to see if any issues had arisen for the Operations crews, and they carried out inspections and followed up with fines/warning notice if evidence found.

A total of **276 planned** inspections were carried out on litter black spot all over the Fingal County Council area. All the bring banks in the Fingal were inspected daily to ensure that there was no dumping. Any evidence found was dealt with under the Litter Pollution Acts.

The Litter Warden carried out investigation on reports of abandoned cars and burnt-out cars. The Litter warden carried out foot patrols in Howth and Swords and engaged with local businesses to ensure they were keeping their premises free of litter. Warning notices and fines were issued when deemed necessary.

There was 1 case before the district court in July, it was successful prosecuted and costs awarded.

### Dog Warden Service

The dog wardens continue to carry out enforcement in relation to breaches of the Control of Dogs Act 1986, Control of Dog Regulations 1998, Parks and Open Spaces bye-laws and Beach and Foreshore bye-laws. They also educate dog owners on the responsibilities of keeping a dog and remind owners to pick up after their pets when in public places. The dog wardens also increase their patrols of the beaches during the summer months to optimise bathing water quality and retain the status of Fingal's Blue Flag beaches.

The dog wardens are also continuing with door-to-door licence checks. Dog owners should ensure that they hold a valid licence for their dog and if issued with a 10-day notice by the dog wardens, should present their licence to [controlofdogs@fingal.ie](mailto:controlofdogs@fingal.ie) within the 10 days provided on the notice. Failure to do so may result in a fine being issued for failing to produce a dog licence when requested to do so by a dog warden and keeping a dog without a valid licence. The fine per offence is €100. 249 '10 Day Notices' were issued by the dog wardens during July and August 2023. 56 fines were issued during July and August 2023.

Failing to hold a valid licence for a dog that you are own or are responsible for can incur a €100 fine.

### Day of Action - Dog Warden and An Garda Síochána

On Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> the Dog Wardens joined members from Howth Garda Síochána in a

planned beat/patrol of Howth Head and Harbour area to engage with the public and to advise dog owners about their responsibilities. The weather wasn't agreeable on the 26<sup>th</sup> July and footfall was low so the wardens called back out on Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> August to accompany the guards in the harbour area.



### Dog Shelter Service

Dublin County Dog Shelter holds "Meet and Greet" visits for anyone looking to rehome a dog. Visits can be arranged by calling the shelter and arranging an appointment. These visits can be arranged from Monday – Friday from 11am to 1pm and from 2pm to 3.30pm.

The shelter is also open on Saturday from 11am – 1pm. The shelter is closed to the public on Sundays.

The dog shelter holds stray dogs picked up by the dog warden and dogs who have been surrendered by their owners either to the dog wardens or

directly to the shelter. At the beginning of July there were 8 dogs in the shelter. During July and August 2023, 55 dogs were brought to the shelter by the dog wardens as stray or surrenders and 1 dog was surrendered by a member of the public. Of these 55 dogs, 18 have been reclaimed by their owners, 21 dogs have been rehomed to rescue and 8 have been rehomed to members of the public. At the end of August there are 15 dogs remaining in the shelter.

### Horses

Weekly inspections continue to take place on Dunsink Landfill to monitor the numbers and welfare of the horses onsite. There are 10 hay feeders being refilled by the Operations Department on a weekly basis to ensure adequate forage for horses on the landfill. There were 2 horses seized from the public realm during July/August. Both horses weren't microchipped so notices were placed in local garda stations advising the owners to contact Environment Department to reclaim their horses. No owners came forward so the horses are now in the process of being rehomed to a suitable equine premises.

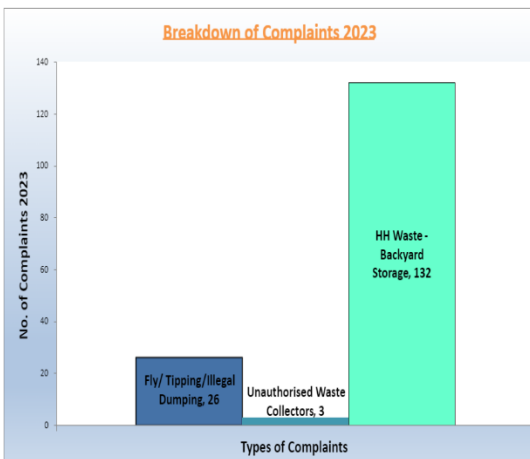
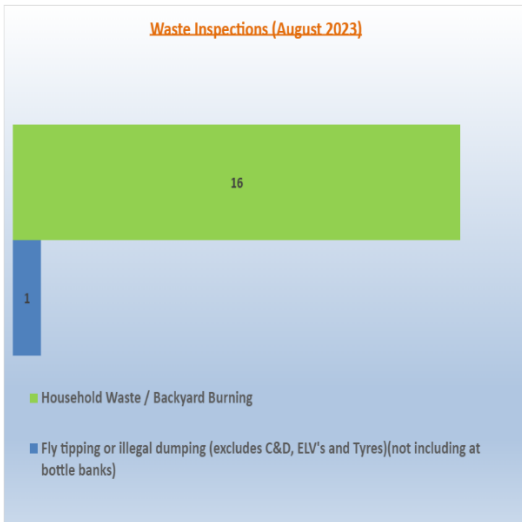
### Waste Enforcement & Regulation

#### Waste Complaints

The Waste Enforcement and Regulation Section review and comment on planning permission applications. To date for 2023 a total of **94 planning applications** have been reviewed and reports issued. The proposed developments are assessed to gauge their potential to generate construction and demolition wastes and how these

waste streams will be managed including by-product materials such as soil & stone and concrete.



Once a development has been granted planning permission, compliance documents relating to construction and demolition waste and operational waste management are forwarded to the Waste Enforcement and Regulation Section for review. The submissions are assessed for compliance with national legislation, guidance and best practice. To date in 2023 a total of **97 compliance submissions** have been assessed by the Waste Enforcement and Regulation Section and reports issued to the Planning Department. It is vital to condition planning permissions and assess planning compliance submissions to avoid situations where unauthorised waste collectors are used and waste is illegally disposed of. Construction and demolition waste can include hazardous streams such as asbestos or contaminated soils therefore it is important waste management is considered from an early stage of a development and authorised waste management contractors are used to carry, treat or dispose of construction and demolition waste which is a valuable resource.





### End of Life Vehicle (ELV) Project

When Fingal County Council commenced the End of Life (ELV) Vehicle Project, a total of 87 illegal ELV sites were identified both low and high-risk sites. Considerable progress has been made to date with 85 illegal ELV sites closed resulting in over 1,500 ELV's brought to Authorised Treatment Facilities (ATF's) for recovery and disposal.



In July 2023 two cases were successfully prosecuted in the District Court with fines issued and legal costs awarded to Fingal County Council. The site operators in Lusk and Swords pleading guilty to offences under Section 39 and Section 55 of the Waste Management Act 1996 for illegally dismantling ELV's on site without the appropriate waste authorisation and for failing to comply with a Section 55 Notice to cease illegal activity and to clear the site of waste. Both sites have now been cleared and all illegal ELV activities have ceased. The last remaining 2 ELV sites are being cleared at present with operators co-operating with the Waste Enforcement Section to ensure ELV's and waste materials are removed and disposed of at authorised facilities. Follow up inspections are ongoing to ensure that sites previously cleared remain closed and that all illegal car breaking activities cease on a permanent basis.



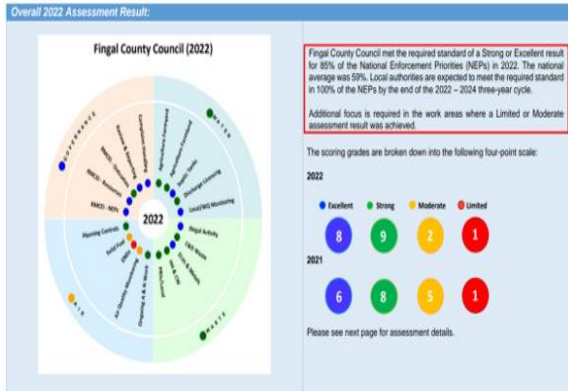
### RMCEI Performance for 2022

Fingal County Council met the required standard of a **Strong** or **Excellent** result for **85%** of the National Priorities in 2022. The national average was noted to be 59% with Fingal scoring high in the key thematic areas of 1/ Waste Enforcement, 2/ Water Pollution and 3/ Governance with ongoing improvements noted from the previous year. A plan is currently being devised to help improve performance in relation to Noise and Air Pollution which will involve the recruitment of additional officers to address national air/noise priorities and the current workload.

### Update on Code of Practice for CCTV

In accordance with the [Circular Economy and Miscellaneous Provisions Act 2022](#) (CEMPA 2022) the LGMA were tasked with developing Codes of Practice for:

1. The use of CCTV under the Waste Management Act, 1996.
2. The use of Mobile Recording Devices under the WMA, 1996.
3. The use of CCTV under the Litter Pollution Act, 1997.



A Local Government Sector working group have been working to develop these Codes of Practice since May 2022.

In accordance with Section 14C of the Waste Management Act, 1996 and Section 23B of the Litter Pollution Act 1997, as amended by the CEMPA of 2022 the three draft Codes of Practice have been prepared and were submitted to the

statutory consultees on Friday 4<sup>th</sup> August. The statutory consultees are as follows:

- (i) the Minister for Environment, Climate Action and Communications,
- (ii) the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage,
- (iii) the Minister for Justice, and
- (iv) the Data Protection Commission

A deadline of the 12<sup>th</sup> September 2023 has been set for the statutory consultees to revert with comments on the Codes of Practise. Following that the working group will examine and consider any feedback and adjust the Codes of Practise if required and move towards taking the appropriate Governance steps to conclude the final codes.
