



Edition 17 of Fingal News was published on March 1st and achieved a record number of conversions for both the English and Irish editions. The English edition had 661 reads from 706 impressions, a conversion rate of 94%, while the Irish edition had 28 reads from 60 impressions, a conversion rate of 47%. The previous bests were 80% for the English version of Edition 14 and 43% for the Irish version of Edition 15.

Seachtain na Gaeilge & **Irish Language Updates**



A very successful virtual Seachtain na Gaeilge festival took place in March with a programme of live and recorded virtual events and the language promoted extensively on Social media and through daily bulletins issued to staff.

The public consultation regarding the proposed 4th Irish Language Scheme concluded with 4 submissions received and the Draft 4th Scheme was presented to the SPC on March 24th and will be presented to the May Council meeting.

Irish language training continued with 9 staff members starting the Certificate in Professional Irish with Gaelchultúr.



Fingal Councillors Representations **Top 1,579 so far** This Year

Staff continue to work on the Customer Relationship Management System (CRM) and issue responses to Councillors representations and complaints submitted by the public.

The month of March had a total of 565 Councillor's representations with an overall total of 1,579 in the year to date. The table shows the breakdown of representations to each Directorate with Operations receiving 812 followed by Housing and Community at 486.


Launch of the **Smart Balbriggan** Programme Framework



Smart Balbriggan was founded in June 2020 by Fingal County Council as a Smart Dublin District where innovation projects are fast-tracked. Smart Balbriggan will complement and support the delivery of the Our Balbriggan Rejuvenation Plan (2019-2025) and the Fingal Digital Strategy (2020-2023) by trialing and testing new technology projects and solutions.

The Smart Balbriggan Programme Framework was developed thanks to input from the Balbriggan community and is our key guiding document, outlining our strategic priorities, principles, objectives and planned actions for the programme. Connectivity, mobility and community engagement initiatives are core focus areas for the district. A public Trello board has been set up to showcase the latest project developments as they happen.



On the 24th March Fingal County Council participated in the launch of the Dublin Belfast Economic Corridor.

The launch included a joint report "The Dublin-Belfast Economic Corridor: Current Profile, Potential for Recovery & Opportunities for Cooperation" from Dublin City University (DCU) and Ulster University (UU) which looks at the challenges for the region including Brexit and COVID-19 and the opportunities to establish clusters in key sectors, leverage collaboration and drive economic development in the region.

The Grow It Forward campaign is a collaborative programme between the Irish Public Library Service and the Grow It Yourself (GIY) organisation, that supports people to live healthier and more sustainable lives by growing some of their own food. The campaign runs from 23rd March to 30th June.

This project is part of a national programme developed by GIY to support the Government of Ireland's Living with COVID Resilience and Recovery Plan, as the lead activation under the Healthy Eating pillar, delivered in partnership with the national library network.

Through this partnership Fingal Libraries will be distributing starter growing kits for people to grow at home. Each kit will contain five packets of seeds: tomatoes, carrots, mixed oriental greens, peas and beetroot. They will also contain 9 gift tags and a Grow It Forward planting information sheet. Participants are asked to Grow It Forward by sharing their kits as little seedlings, plants in pots or the produce at harvest time to 9 other people, so that the goal of impacting as many people as possible can be achieved. Following on from the 2019 initiative which aimed to support local businesses by transforming the existing streetscape into a welcoming and attractive community space, the Council is launching another call for applications under "Parklet Partners" initiative with a deadline of the 30th April.

The parklet, which accommodates dining space and additional seating, is aimed at encouraging people back into the centre of towns and villages while complying with public health guidance.

Our Planting Programme is in Bloom!

Since this highly popular initiative was introduced in 2014, the Dublin 15 Operations Team have planted more than 28,000 sqm of open space comprising of in excess of 2.8M Bulbs. In 2021, the existing bulb plantings at numerous locations will be rejuvenated as part of the mechanical bulb planting programme. The citizens of Dublin 15 are also currently enjoying the emergence of 4,340m2 new pollinator friendly bulbs planting at 12 new locations this year.

Many new areas of bulb planting were added to Howth Malahide's Open Spaces and road verges in Autumn 2020 and are now just beginning to come into bloom for the first time. Pollinator friendly bulb mixes were chosen and planted throughout. The blooming of the bulbs at locations including Carrickbrack Road carpark, Summit carpark, St Fintan's Road Park, Howth and Seagrange Park, Sutton means that the first grass cutting of the season can be delayed at these locations which is of huge benefit to pollinators & biodiversity.



Litter, Anti-Social Behaviour & Vandalism

Unfortunately, excessive littering, anti-social behaviour and vandalism incidents had grown to unsustainable levels in some areas which was exacerbated by the fine weather. In order to combat this, the Howth Malahide team commenced placing additional temporary bins, at various locations to deal with the increased littering at popular locations where the public frequent. Over 50 temporary bins are now in place and making a great difference to the littering issue. Cleansing staff and Park Rangers are continuing to be rostered to work additional hours to cope with the issues. More compactor bins allowing for greater capacity were ordered, delivered and work on the installation of 10 of them commenced at the end of March.

Unfortunately, the overnight anti-social behaviour and vandalism increased in March at Malahide Demesne to such an extent that we had no choice but to engage a Security Firm to carry out additional overnight on-site monitoring and patrolling to protect the Demesne and grounds.

Previous to them coming on board, the Fairy Trail was very badly vandalised, the Cricket Pitch was attacked and there have been several other smaller acts of vandalism throughout the Estate during night time. Incidents and littering have now reduced however the situation is being extremely closely monitored in cooperation with the Gardai.


A new tree trail was also introduced into Bremore Regional Park which was a collaborative project between

County Speed Limits Project


-Following ratification of the Speed Limit Review n February, two tenders have been prepared. The first has been published and is a tender for delivery of a large number of speed signs to FCC











The extensive public consultation on the draft revised strategy concluded on the 28th March. During the consultation period the Council actively encouraged public participation through presentations to the Area Committees, social media posts, press releases, public information and Q&A sessions and a promotional video.

This has resulted in a wide range of valuable submissions, these will be compiled and reviewed in full, making a valuable contribution to the final version later in the year.



The part 8 planning process for Bremore Regional Park Development Project has commenced.

An overview of proposals was presented to elected members at the March meeting of the Balbriggan, Rush Lusk Swords area committee meeting. The project is an important step in delivering the long-term vision for the park and comprises a multifunctional sports campus, improved central zone and new coastal pocket park. The proposals combine family orientated spaces which facilitate play, active recreation and social interaction with a high-quality public realm which will allow people to sit, look and experience the sea. The project will deliver significant public amenities to the local community and transform the relationship between the town of Balbriggan and the park.

Building on the successful community consultations held to date, the council actively encourages feedback and comment on the proposed Bremore Regional Park Development during the submission period of 16th March to 30th April as detailed in the part 8 planning application available at: https://consult.fingal.ie/en/consultation/ proposed-bremore-regional-park-development-project

It is intended to hold a non-statutory public consultation in April 2021, which will set out a small number of routes (c.3-5 route options) over the entire route corridor, with associated descriptions of each option.

From this, an emerging preferred route will be developed for further consultation and preliminary design in advance of a planning application. As part of this, a Teams briefing will be arranged for councillors, in advance of the consultation start date

Consultation begins on Fingal Development Plan 2023 - 2029

Fingal County Council has commenced the review of the current Fingal Development Plan and preparing the new Fingal Development Plan 2023-2029. The beginning of an eight-week public consultation on the Strategic Issues Paper, was launched on 12th March.

An Information Booklet, summarising the seven themes contained in the Strategic Issues Paper, is being distributed to households across Fingal and can also be viewed at www.fingal.ie/ developmentplan.

Place, Climate Action, Connectivity and Movement, Employment, Economy & Dublin Airport, Cultural Heritage, Green Infrastructure & Natural Heritage and Infrastructure & Utilities.

Four online consultation seminars featuring a total of eight presentations on topics raised in the Strategic Issues Paper will be held in April and a Minecraft workshop is also being developed to encourage the participation of younger citizens.

The Development Plan process is scheduled to run for the next two years and will involve three public consultation stages before the final plan is adopted by Councillors in February 2023. The current stage, which is known as the pre-draft, sets out the strategic direction for the Plan and will form the framework The seven themes are: People and into which objectives and policies at the subsequent stages will sit.

Construction to begin on Fingal's first Affordable Housing Scheme in 11 years at Dun Emer, Lusk



Construction is about to commence on site to deliver the first affordable housing scheme in the county in 11 years at Dun Emer, Lusk. Ó Cualann Cohousing Alliance will oversee the construction of 51 homes, of which 39 will be affordable and 12 will be social housing. Details in relation to the affordable homes, the affordable scheme, eligibility criteria, etc. are available on the website www.fingal.ie. The site also has a Frequently Asked Questions section and additional queries can be emailed to affordablehousing@fingal.ie.

Applications for the Dun Emer Affordable House Purchase Scheme will be accepted via an online portal. A video demonstrating the application process and documents to be uploaded with the application will be available on the website in the coming days. In accordance with the Scheme of Priority adopted by the Council, priority will be given to eligible applicants in the order in which they applied. The opening date for receipt of applications will be announced very shortly. Guide prices for the development are set out below;


The aim of the series of discussions is to encourage more women to step forward with confidence into coaching roles in their local sports clubs. Plans have been developed to try to encourage the formation of a soccer club in the Tyrrelstown area and targeting the set-up up of both a boys and girls section. This series will be part of a strategy to encourage women to step forward and volunteer. This will be followed up with a practical session (when restrictions allow).



Virtual Community **Centre Established**

A Fingal Virtual Community Centre has been established by the Community Development team with support from Fingal Communications Department in an effort to keep connected with the community while facilities are closed due to the current Covid-19 restrictions.

A 'Community Engagement Programme' has been operating for the past 8 weeks on this virtual platform aimed at identifying taster sessions for adults and children on a range of topics. This programme has proven to be very successful with high engagement across the county. It was advertised via the Council's community facilities' social media platforms and the Council's Communication Unit and a large percentage of participants are living in the vicinity of a community centre. Age Friendly Fingal along with Age Friendly Programme managers across the country are working on a submission for the green paper on Ageing. The purpose of this green paper is to launch a broad policy debate on ageing to discuss options on how to anticipate and respond to the challenges and opportunities it brings, notably taking into account the UN 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and UN Decade for Healthy Ageing. Competences for dealing with the effects of ageing are largely in the hands of Member States and the EU is well placed to identify key issues and trends and support action on ageing at national, regional and local level. It can help Member States and regions develop their own, tailor-made policy responses to ageing. The European Pillar of Social Rights2 sets out a number of principles that relate directly or indirectly to areas impacted by ageing, such as on old age income and pensions, long-term care, health care, inclusion of people with disabilities, social protection, work-life balance

This green paper takes a life-cycle approach that reflects the universal impact of ageing and focuses on both the personal and wider societal implications of ageing. These include everything from lifelong learning and healthy lifestyles to how to fund adequate pensions or the need for increased productivity and a large enough workforce to sustain healthcare and long-term care for older people.

Age Friendly Fingal are well placed in supporting this submission as we work closely with members of our older population and we link in with members of our active Older Peoples Council.

Bleeper Bike Rides Continue to Increase across Fingal

Bleeper's bike rides increased from 741 rides in January to 1097 rides in February. This amounts to a 148% increase in the last month and a 204% increase in rides on the same period in 2020.

This number shows the immense increase in the popularity of cycling during the last 12 months. Saturday and Sunday remain the most popular days for rides and accounted for 25.98% and 19.05% of the months total use respectively. Bleeper had 80 bikes in operation in Fingal during February, an increase of 15 bikes on last month.

Fingal Bike Share Scheme - Monthly Bike Rides Started in Fingal - Bleepe

Howth train station was the most popular location to hire a Bleeper bike during February and there was a high level of usage along coastal routes with a longer duration of bike hire. We will continue to promote usage of Bleeper through our social media platforms. The hire of Bleeper's bikes continue to be free for all Fingal staff.

Environmental Awareness Campaigns and Initiatives

The Instruments Project has had lots of donations of mainly guitars, drums and fiddles, these are being cleaned, mended and repaired where necessary and will be offered to individuals and groups in Fingal who will benefit. We are actively seeking groups that are interested in receiving instruments.

A Swift-nesting project has been funded in Castleknock in cooperation with Castleknock Tidy Towns, Swift Conservation Ireland and four local schools. This will increase the existing population of Swifts and increase awareness in the schools and locally about the importance of wildlife and our role in protecting and enhancing nature.

The 'Keen to be Green' collaboration between Environmental Awareness and Community Department Facilities Network has begun and we are looking forward to introducing measures in the centres that will demonstrate sustainable leadership.

An arrangement has been agreed with the Rediscovery Centre whereby paint for community projects will be provided and delivered to Fingal locations as requested by community organisations.

The Re-Paint project will see the recycled paint used throughout Fingal for estate walls and mural projects.

Adopt a Patch litter kit has been delivered to numerous locations around Fingal to enable residents to keep their areas litter free.

Installation of Bike Racks Continues

Schools looking to encourage their students to cycle may still apply for bike racks and can do so by completing the online application and submitting it to Active.Travel@Fingal.ie

Due to a number of bike thefts from Powerstown Educate Together in Dublin 15 recently, a bespoke bike cage with roof has been gifted to the school to enclose the existing 100 bike racks on site. The cost of this enclosure will be funded by the NTA.

Bike racks will continue to be installed throughout the County throughout 2021 as cycling continues in popularity


