## A Message from AnnMarie Farrelly,

## Chief Executive, Fingal County Council

Financial planning and management is a key consideration for all departments across the organisation at all times. At this time of year there is a particular focus in this area with the Members approving a significant capital programme in October and the annual budget meeting scheduled to take place on the 9th of November. The role of the Elected Members and their commitment and expertise is critical in ensuring we can continue to enhance and deliver key services across the county for all of our citizens.

All departments and staff across the organisation are working hard to progress projects and I am looking forward to seeing significant progress on the ground in 2022. I was delighted to see homes and businesses in Balbriggan receiving a 'What Next' leaflet detailing updates on the physical transformation pieces of the Our Balbriggan Rejuvenation Plan. Investing in the regeneration of Balbriggan remains one of our top priorities and confirms our commitment to help drive growth for businesses and residents in the town. Work commenced last month on the construction of a new €1.5million All-Weather Sports Pitch Facility at Ward River Valley Regional Park in Swords with the facility due to be completed by the Second Quarter of 2022. This will be a valuable sporting amenity for the people of Swords and wider area. A lot of work has been done by Councillors, staff and other stakeholders over the last few years to make this project a reality and this is a significant milestone in the journey. Funding for the €1.5m project has been provided by Fingal County Council and the Dublin Airport Authority (DAA).

Staff resources are critical to the delivery of our projects and to this end the HR department continue to engage in large scale recruitment campaigns for a wide range of roles.

Fingal Inclusion week which is an initiative of Fingal County Council Community Office, the Integration Officer and the Fingal Public Participation Network will run from the 15th to the 21st of November with a fantastic programme of 76 events taking place around the County. It is very important to raise awareness of the excellent work being done by community groups, PPN and our own Fingal staff to combat social exclusion. The week also seeks to raise awareness of the barriers experienced by citizens of Fingal that lead to social exclusion and promote an understanding of inclusion in Fingal and I hope that you will support this initiative

Ten Fingal projects and initiatives have been nominated in this year's All Ireland Community and Council Awards. These awards are an opportunity to highlight and promote the work carried out in our communities and showcase the successful collaborations between communities and councils. Five Fingal projects have also been nominated in the Chambers Ireland 2021 Excellence in Local Government Awards. I am very pleased that so many Fingal initiatives and projects have been acknowledged for their innovation and excellence and I wish all Fingal entrants the very best of luck in this year's awards which take place this month.

# LEADER Programme Supporting & Financing Projects

The Dublin Rural LEADER Local Action Group and the Fingal LEADER Programme continues to deliver funding and support to eligible projects in the administrative areas of Fingal, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown and South Dublin.

The updated 2021/22 Transitional Funding Arrangements for the LEADER Programme has the Dublin Rural LEADER LAG approved for €1,882,175 to cover both projects funding and administration funding for the period April 2021 – December 2022. Of this amount, €1,411,631 is available for LEADER Project Applications under the categories of Rural Enterprise, Social Inclusion and Rural Environment. Historically, Fingal Projects comprise of 65-70% of the total LEADER Projects Funding, roughly corresponding to Fingal's share of the Dublin Rural LEADER Geographical Area.

The LEADER Programme reverted on the 1st April to EU Transition Rules for the period 2021-22 with a new Dublin Rural LEADER Local Development Strategy to be put in place



for 2023 onwards. Under the Transitional Arrangements the Dublin Rural LEADER LAG and the LEADER Programme will continue to be funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development under the same eligibility and LEADER implementation rules as before. LEADER will continue to approve and fund new projects as usual.

The next meeting of the Dublin Rural LEADER Local Action Group (LAG) will take place in November.

Going forward there is currently over €3 million in the new LEADER projects pipeline of which over €1 million is for Rural Enterprise.

Fingal County Council continues to deliver the financial and administrative oversight responsibilities for the approval and drawdown of LEADER funded projects following the national transfer of the LEADER Article 48 Administrative Checks from Pobal to the Local Authority Sector.

#### National Women's Enterprise Day Celebrated

## Halloween Amnesty 2021



In preparation for Halloween the Council met the Gardaí in advance and any stockpiles were removed in advance and crews worked up to lunchtime on 31st October.

Fingal County Council's Recycling Centres accommodated the annual Halloween Amnesty from Wednesday 20th to Saturday 30th October. Combustible materials such as beds, sofas, wooden doors etc. were accepted over the 9 day period to reduce the amount of material which may otherwise be disposed of on Halloween bonfires with consequent health and safety risks to members of the public and damage to public open spaces.

#### Meter Replacement Programme

As part of the Annual Meter Replacement Programme 2021, The Operations Department has completed the purchase and installation of 10 new coin, card and contactless Pay & Display machines. These new machines replace older coin-only machines which have reached end of life.

In addition to the delivery of the Annual Programme of Works depot crews deliver on other area work programmes. See some of the examples of the work being carried out across Fingal below:





The combi calisthenic unit provides a form of exercise designed to build strength, flexibility and stamina and which also helps to increase cardiovascular fitness. The only weights involved in Calisthenics exercises is your own body weight. The combi calisthenic unit is suitable for individuals with differing abilities and is wheelchair accessible. This unit in Holywell was completed in early October.









## **Public Conveniences Open**



Work is ongoing on the installation of the new public toilets in the Howth/Malahide area. The eco toilets have all been installed. The toilets at the Summit, Howth have now been opened to







On 18th October work commenced on the construction of a new €1.5million All-Weather Sports Pitch Facility at Ward River Valley Regional Park in Swords. (Pictured is the contractor establishing their site compound for the works).

The new third generation synthetic all-weather pitch will be a full sized GAA & Soccer pitch which will be similar to the facility at Bremore Regional Park in Balbriggan. The new floodlight facility will be accompanied by car, coach and bicycle parking to service the needs of the pitch users as well as improving access to the park.

The project is being led by the Council's Parks & Green Infrastructure Division and the contract for the works has been awarded to Haffey

Sports Grounds Ltd. following the conclusion of the competitive tender process.

Funding for the project has been provided by Fingal County Council and also by the Dublin Airport Authority (DAA) to address a requirement for community gain that the airport authority is providing as part of the development of the North Runway at Dublin Airport.

It is anticipated that the facility will be completed by the 2nd Quarter of 2022 and will become a valuable sporting amenity for the people of Swords and wider area.

#### **Upgrade Works at Bremore Castle**



Upgrade works to the boundary of Bremore Castle are ongoing at Bells Lane, Balbriggan following the appointment of a contractor by the Parks and Green Infrastructure Division Projects Team.

The works will consist of the construction of a stub wall and solid bar railings and gates along the south of Bells Lane and at the perimeter of Bells Cottage and the installation of gates at the entrance to the Bremore Castle car park.

Electrical and telecoms ducting will be installed as part of the project to facilitate the undergrounding of the existing telecoms line, the provision of fibre-optic connectivity to the Castle and public lighting for Bells Lane and the car park.

The works will constitute a significant improvement in the aesthetics and functionality of Bells Lane, the car park and Bremore Castle. It is anticipated that the project will be completed in early Q1 2022.



Following the 6-week non-statutory public consultation earlier this year the Project Team has been assessing submissions and will publish a Public Consultation Report in November 2021. An update on the public consultation report outcome will be given at November's ACM. Further to this the Project Team has commenced environmental screening of the project proposals to determine the appropriate planning process and has commissioned further ecology surveys along the proposed route. Once these processes are complete, the design will be advanced for a planning application. A Teams briefing for the ACM members will also be organised to provide further information on the scheme progress.

## **Fingal Coastal Way Progress**

Following the successful route options public consultation in April and May, the Project Team has been assessing submissions and will publish a Public Consultation Report in November. An update on the public consultation report outcome will be given at November's ACM. We have also been meeting with residents and landowners who engaged through the consultation process and following this an emerging preferred route will be developed for further consultation and preliminary design in advance of a planning application.





#### Sutton-Malahide **Greenway Information**

The Project Team is currently assessing design options with the intention of moving to a nonstatutory public consultation in Q1 2022.

A briefing for the local ACM will be undertaken in the coming weeks to provide information on the updated design, which is being reviewed in light of lessons learnt on other schemes and evolving design and greenway design standards. In advance of wider public consultation next year, the Project Team has commenced consultation with directly affected landowners along the route.



## Keen to be Green Project Launch

The launch of Fingal's Keen To Be Green Facilities Project took place at the Clayton Hotel Dublin Airport and received much coverage online in early October from articles in the Dublin Gazette to community blogs and community facilities websites and social media posts.

The 'Keen To Be Green' Project is part of Fingal County Council's continuing commitment to its five-year Climate Change Action Plan making Fingal more resilient to Climate Change. Fingal's Keen To Be Green facilities project has five stages that each facility will commit to: Waste Management, Water Conservation, Transport and Biodiversity.

## Housing for All

A new Housing Plan for Ireland



Housing for All - a New Housing Plan for Ireland is the government's housing plan to 2030. It is a multi-annual, multi-billion euro plan which will improve Ireland's housing system and deliver more homes of all types for people with different housing needs.

The government's vision for the housing system over the longer term is to achieve a steady supply of housing in the right locations with economic, social and environmental sustainability built into the system.

It is estimated that Ireland will need an average of 33,000 new homes to be provided each year from 2021 to 2030.

The policy has four pathways to achieving housing for all:

- •Supporting home ownership and increasing affordability •Eradicating homelessness, increasing social housing delivery and supporting social inclusion
- Increasing new housing supply
- Addressing vacancy and efficient use of existing stock
- The pathways contain actions to be taken by government

departments, local authorities, State agencies and others. The pathways are supported by actions to enable a sustainable housing system.

The social housing delivery targets for Fingal covering the years 2022 - 2026 have now been received from the Department of Housing Local Government and Heritage. They are in line with the objectives set out in the Housing for All plan with Long Term Leasing being phased out over the lifetime of the plan and emphasis placed on new build

The targets are listed in the table below;

#### Construction Continues at **Dun Emer**

Construction of the 39 affordable and 12 social homes continues at Dun Emer in Lusk alongside the upgrade works to the road infrastructure which is funded by the Affodable Housing Fund (formerly the SSF)

The eligible purchasers nominated by Fingal County Council are now proceeding with the purchase of their homes from the developer.





#### **Parslickstown House Renovation**



Refurbishments to Parslickstown House Community Centre in Dublin 15 are continuing including the Annex Hall which is due for completion Mid-November.

Funding was received from the Department of Tourism Culture Arts Gaeltacht Sport and media under the sports capital program of €113,000. Matching funding of €50,000 was also awarded from the Community Development Office to reconfigure, insulate and make the hall accessible for the whole community.

On completion there will be a fully accessible multipurpose space available for community enjoyment. This will comprise of a large dance studio, accessible toilets, and two small meeting rooms. On completion this project will enable a number of youth, sport, dance, fitness, education and training groups to use the facility. This space will also complement the existing facilities in the area. It is envisaged that the project will reach completion by 15th of November.

#### She Leads, We Lead

Fingal Women **Bringing Change** 



The Community Development Office is providing a new programme for women to improve their skills and learn about how to lead change in Fingal, with sessions led by a team of women who have all championed change in their own communities through their leadership. This programme presents a series of 7 sessions that aspire to motivate and train women to become leaders in their community and also help women feel confident through developing key skills and understanding how other leaders work effectively.

Open sessions are being held on Wednesday November 3rd, 7-9pm in Mountview Community Centre, Dublin 15, and Thursday November 4th, 7-9pm online, to introduce participants to the benefits that they can bring to their communities and themselves through leadership training. The diverse team of women that will be leading the programme include Ayodele Yusuf of Balbriggan Integration Forum, Catherine Joyce of Blanchardstown Traveller Development Group, Shelly Gaynor of the Independent Living Movement Ireland, Bridie O'Reilly of Fingal Older People's Council. and Geraldine Rooney of Fingal PPN and Centre for Independent Living Blanchardstown.

#### New Arrivals at Balleally Landfill/Rogerstown Park

In October, the resident herd of cattle at Balleally landfill were joined by a flock of sheep totalling 126 ewes and 4 rams.

The sheep will provide an important function in their grazing paddocks by reducing the need for diesel fuelled tractor motors that have been used to mow these meadows, thereby providing a more sustainable practice that fits with the Councils' climate action policy.

# **Environmental Awareness Projects And Initiatives Continue in Fingal**

Composting for Schools Initiative is being rolled out to 40 Fingal Schools this term. This includes composting bins, resources for classes and teachers, two site visits by composting experts and guidance on how to manage waste.

The Green Schools Flag Awards Events were held online and 21 schools in Fingal were awarded.

ReLove Fashion was launched for Secondary Schools for this academic year.



ReUse month initiatives included an offer of repaired musical instruments and bicycles to Fingal schools which received a huge response.

Picker Pals Litter Initiative is being rolled out to 40 new classes in primary schools, this is in addition to the already active 80 Picker Pals classes.

Recycled paint has been provided to community groups

across the county and this has been a huge success. 285 5-Litre cans of paint were delivered by the Rediscovery Centre to communities all over Fingal from Balbriggan to Baldoyle, Howth to Meakstown, Naul to Dublin 15 since June 2021. This enabled people to clean up their areas and get busy together, investing time and effort in their local areas.



#### Road Safety Week in Fingal

Irish Road Safety week took place from 4th to 10th October. Throughout Irish Road Safety Week, Fingal County Council drew the public's attention to resources that highlight key safety issues and help reduce risk of accident, injury and loss of life.

With free Car Seat Safety checks, school education events and helpful video guides to tyre safety, winter readiness and bike safety tips there was something that every type of road user can avail of and this was promoted via our social media platforms.

Big thanks to the Mayor, Chief Executive, our two School Wardens and the children of St, Patrick's Snr National School for helping us launch Irish Road Safety Week.



# Waste Enforcement - Metal Theft & Traceability Investigation

End of Life Vehicles (ELVs') and their components can have a significant monetary value (catalytic converters, lead acid batteries, alloy wheels). Metal recycling facilities can potentially facilitate this illegal activity by accepting high value waste streams arising from illegal sites or criminal activity. These waste streams enter metal recycling facilities under the guise of 'general public' and are subsequently processed for cash payments.


Fingal County Council's Waste Enforcement Unit are assisting the Garda Divisional Crime Task Force with a major investigation into metal theft and traceability (catalytic converters) within the Dublin Region. This joint operation has resulted in several metal recycling facilities being searched within the last 6 months with large quantities of catalytic converters recovered in conjunction with millions of euro worth of precious metals such as palladium, rhodium and platinum. Palladium is now more valuable than gold and rhodium hit record highs earlier this year, having increased in value more than 200% since March 2020.

Waste Enforcement officers targeted individuals who transported high value waste streams to metal recycling facilities without a waste collection permit with a view to profit. Waste facilities were also investigated for breaches of permit conditions for allowing members of the public, as opposed to commercial customers, access to the facility to sell high value waste streams.

11 legal files have been finalised and summonses filed with the district court for S34 and S39 breaches of the Waste Management Act 1996. Each file takes several weeks to prepare as officers need to prove

beyond a reasonable doubt that an offence has been committed. Further work will be required in terms of court appearances and giving evident to secure convictions however the work undertake so far has had a dramatic effect on reducing the theft of catalytic converters throughout the Country and the subsequent sale/acceptance of high value waste streams at metal recycling facilities.

The Waste Enforcement Unit is also assisting 15 other Local Authorities in similar investigations regarding the illegal transportation of high value waste streams throughout the country. A total of 100 individuals who transported wastes such as catalytic converters without a permit are being investigated in conjunction with several large metal recycling facilities. The work undertaken by Fingal County Council's Waste Enforcement Unit has helped raise awareness on metal theft and traceability at a local, regional and national level through collaboration with the Gardai, the Waste Enforcement Regional Lead Authority (WERLA) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Further work is required to bring about legislative changes to tackle several key issues identified by the FCC Waste Enforcement Unit regarding metal theft and traceability. This work has already commenced with WERLA and the Gardai highlighting key issues on foot of FCC intel at a recent National Waste Enforcement Steering Committee.




