#### A Message from AnnMarie Farrelly, Chief Executive, Fingal County Council

As we approach the end of 2021 it is a good opportunity to look back and review all that has been achieved this year under challenging circumstances. Whilst we didn't get the respite from Covid 19 that we would have hoped for at this point in time we can still look back and be proud of what has been accomplished through the dedication and commitment of the Elected Members and staff alike.

We have delivered quality services to the people of Fingal across all our departments and new projects, initiatives and services were rolled out. We all acknowledged early on in the pandemic how fortunate we are in Fingal to have such wonderful amenities in our county and these have been a great source of respite during these testing times. Our teams in the operations department provided additional cleaning, litter bins and litter picking, additional staff resources were applied to key areas including the beaches, parks and open spaces and new public benches were installed. There was an increase in street furniture licensing to support business and enhanced outdoor dining in all areas. There was significant investment in public conveniences and new EcoToilets and Changing Places units were installed in a number of key locations and there were extended opening hours to the end of October. 2022 will see a Refurbishment Programme for existing Public Conveniences in Howth, Skerries, Rush, Portrane and Donabate. There is provision for an additional spend in Regional Parks, Open Spaces & Beaches of €1.2m which will greatly enhance these amenities for

Important work was done this year with much cross departmental collaboration to ensure that many of

our ambitious capital projects will see activity on the ground and reach key milestones in 2022. Next year will see us planning for Greenways, expending a significant annual budget not to mention our capital programme, Active Travel projects, Biodiversity, Digital Innovation, Integration and the provision of quality homes and infrastructure in Fingal and I think this clearly demonstrates the ambition we have and the desire to consistently enhance the lives of our citizens and stay aligned to our mission of being a vibrant, outward looking, well run Council that shows leadership and embraces diversity and opportunity.

The Development Plan review is going to be a busy time for both the Elected Members and staff first thing in the New Year. Work is ongoing to ensure arrangements are in place to facilitate the development plan meetings in January whilst being in a position to comply with the public health guidance in place at the time.

On behalf of myself and the Executive Management Team I would like to thank the Elected Members for their support and commitment this year and I also wish to thank each and everyone of our indoor and outdoor staff who adapted so well in an ever changing environment and responded with such positivity to all that was asked of them.

I would like to wish you and your families a Merry Christmas and a happy and healthy New Year.


Our Twitter account, @fingalcoco, had 535,000 impressions during November and an average engagement rate of 1.2% for 307 tweets.

Over the first week of October, a series of workshops were delivered to the students in collaboration with the Academy of the Near Future and What the Hack - organisations which engage the public in seeking solutions to challenges they face.

Participants were mentored to create innovative solutions to answer the question "How can we build a stronger, cohesive and more vibrant community?"

Ardgillan Community School, Bremore Educate Together Secondary School and Coláiste Ghlór na Mara were among the schools which took part, involving nearly 100 students.

Through workshops, the students learned about how new technology and innovation can improve our community and developed their own creative ideas to tackle local issues.

Finally, the students 'pitched' their ideas to a panel of judges with a prize for the best concept.

The team from Coláiste Ghlór na Mara came up with a solution which aimed to tackle food waste with the development of a platform to educate people about food waste and meal preparation - prompting them to make changes to their food consumption habits.

## Conservation Works at Heritage Properties



Malahide Castle – The Great Hall conservation works have commenced and are scheduled for completion in Q1 2022.

**Ardgillan Castle** – the painting of the public areas of the Castle is complete. Further minor works to enhance the overall look of the public rooms have been identified.

Consultants have been appointed to undertake the Ardgillan Conservation Management Plan and work is to commence shortly.





Rodaigh visited Local Studies and Archives on 10th November to view acquisitions from the collections of Howth Castle. Following the sale of the Castle and estate in 2018, the contents of the Castle and its library were auctioned in September 2021. The items acquired by Local Studies and Archives include The Earl of Howth Estate Atlas, a manuscript atlas produced in 1863, which contains over 20 hand coloured maps, with details of every field in the estate and the names of the tenants. The Howth Castle Rent Book dates from 1766–1780 and contains 140 pages of hand-written entries of tenants, the rents they paid and any amounts owed.

Also obtained was an Illuminated Address, illustrated by the illuminator J. Hopkins and sent on behalf of the tenants in North County Dublin to the Earl of Howth on the death of his father in 1874. It is signed by nine of the tenants. These three items alone are extremely important as sources

for local and family history in North County Dublin.

Other items acquired at the library auction were Almanacs from 1765, 1775 and 1776 along with an 1840 edition of The Antiquities of Ireland by Francis Grose. At the Howth Castle contents auction Fingal Local Studies and Archives also acquired a George Petrie pencil and water colour drawing "Howth Castle" dated 1819, a watercolour "Ireland's Eye" by Frederick Lawless dated 1879, a Francis Grose original watercolour "St. Mary's Abbey, Howth" along with 6 original hand-coloured James Malton's Views of Dublin and several photographs of Howth Castle.

These items will greatly add to the knowledge and understanding of the history of the Howth Castle Estate and Howth itself. The items are available to view by appointment at Local Studies and Archives, 46 North St., Swords: https://www.fingal.ie/council/service/local-studies-library

#### LEADER Updates





The updated 2021/22 Transitional Funding Arrangements for the LEADER Programme has the Dublin Rural LEADER LAG approved for €1,882,175 to cover both projects funding and administration funding for the period April 2021 – December 2022. Of this amount, €1,411,631 is available for LEADER Project Applications under the categories of Rural Enterprise, Social Inclusion and Rural Environment. Historically, Fingal Projects comprise 65-70% of the total LEADER Projects approved, roughly corresponding to Fingal's share of the Dublin Rural LEADER Geographical Area.

The LEADER Programme reverted on the 1st April to EU Transition Rules for the period 2021-22 with a new Dublin Rural LEADER Local Development Strategy to be prepared and put in place for 2023 onwards. Under the Transitional Arrangements the Dublin Rural LEADER LAG and LEADER Programme will continue to be funded by the Department of Rural and Community Development under the same eligibility and LEADER implementation rules as before. LEADER continues to approve and fund new projects as usual.

During November, the Dublin Rural LEADER Local Action Group, which oversees the LEADER Programme in Dublin, approved €230,748.76 in funding for 5 new projects in Rural Dublin. This brings the total number of projects approved

The DBEC Oversight Board will work collaboratively to develop a regional proposition for economic growth with the assistance of KPMG to deliver a development plan to identify priority areas of cooperation between the local authorities. during the LEADER Transition Programme to 15 since it began on April 1st, 2021, with a total value of €543,984.52.

The approved projects are in the areas of Economic Development, Rural Environment and Social Inclusion.

The projects approved for funding were:

Balbriggan Meals on Wheels which is approved for €24,063.75 for an outdoor dining area which will be of enormous help to facilitate the provision of meals to their clients in a safe outdoor setting.

Donabate Portrane Community Centre CLG which is approved for €24,354.00 for a Feasibility Study to capture the needs of existing groups that use the facilities to assist and guide them in expanding in line with community needs.

St Maur's GAA Club Rush which is approved for €89,154.58 to install rainwater harvesting and irrigation in St Maur's GAA Club premises and for use on the pitches. The Project will reduce the demand on the public water supply and reduce the volume of water going into the public drainage system. The next meeting of the Dublin Rural LEADER Local Action

Group (LAG) will take place in December. Going forward there is currently over €3 million in the new LEADER projects pipeline of which over €1 million is for Rural Enterprise.

Fingal County Council continues to deliver the financial and administrative oversight responsibilities for the approval and drawdown of LEADER funded projects following the national transfer of the LEADER Article 48 Administrative Checks from Pobal to the Local Authority Sector.

Filming for the Green Flag awards was carried out in Malahide Demesne.

This year, 6 Fingal parks received green flags and two Community Awards.

The Fingal sites to retain Green Flag status in 2021 are: Ardgillan Demesne, Malahide Demesne, Millennium Park in Blanchardstown, Newbridge House and Farm, Santry Demesne and St Catherine's Park. Santry Community Garden and The Rock Garden in Swords also received a Community Award, the second year in a row it has managed to achieve the accolade.



The glasshouse restoration project is starting to generate great interest from the public as the works become more visible. Planning & Strategic Infrastructure Department are leading on this project and are facilitated on site by Operations Department Staff and the team at Ardgillan Demesne.

#### New Playground Toilet Facilities Now Completed





The final part of the overall Playground Toilet Refurbishment Contract was completed in Ardgillan Demesne during November 2021.

The before and after images speak for themselves. The unit contains 5 direct entry unisex fully wheelchair accessible toilets with an additional fully serviced 'Changing Places' special needs bathroom which remains locked but accessed with the Irish Wheelchair Association universal access key.

Similar toilets are also in situ in Millennium Park Blanchardstown, Santry Demesne and Newbridge Demesne.

#### **Forest of Fingal - A Tree Strategy for Fingal**

Forest of Fingal, A Tree Strategy for Fingal was approved at the November Council meeting. This ambitious new strategy aims to use every opportunity to continually develop a thriving, diverse and sustainable tree population in Fingal, in line with the County's sustainable urban development. The aims and objectives provide clear guidance to enhance the delivery of significant improvements to tree cover in Fingal for the future. The approach to urban tree management has evolved significantly in recent years and the new tree strategy takes account of these changes and innovation. The Council is aware of the value of our trees and the Strategy is proof of the Council's continued commitment to one of the most important natural assets in the County.

The Strategy applies to all trees, woodlands and hedgerows managed by the Council, as well as seeking to ensure due consideration is given to trees in the planning and development process.

As environmental awareness improves, more and more of us are conscious of the importance of our trees. This was made very evident with the considerable number of quality stakeholder submissions received as part of an active public consultation campaign earlier in the year. It is anticipated that the official launch and publication of the Strategy will take place early next



#### **Updates from the Heritage Office**



The Heritage Office was delighted to support Castleknock Tidy Town's Virtual Heritage Tour which was recently launched by Fingal's Mayor Cllr. Seána Ó Rodaigh. Featuring contributions from well-known local personalities including Bernard Brogan, Senior Dublin GAA footballer; Dr. Noëlle Healy, Senior Dublin GAA ladies footballer and Sarah Hawkshaw, Irish Olympian, the video focuses on the historic village of Castleknock from the 'hurry up bell' and Harry Clarke window of St Brigid's church to the Myo's pub, the site of a former blacksmiths. Graveyard; Burial site in Ward River Surveys of St Columba's Towers, Swords, Malahide Demesne Church, Lanistown Castle, St Catherine's and St Marnock churches, Rush Tower House and an archaeology audit of the Donabate-Portrane Peninsula. Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien was briefed on the Fingal projects ahead when he visited Lanistown Castle, Newbridge Demesne ahead of the launch of the Community Monuments Fund 2022 which is open for submissions from the public to the Heritage Office until 15 February 2022.

#### Hole in the Wall Road Upgrade

Works in November included completion of the new cycleways and footpaths and surfacing and lining of the road pavement. Remaining tasks include electricity connections for the traffic lights at the Mayne Road/ Drumnigh Road junction and fibre optic installation. Following the completion of these tasks, this project will be substantially complete and the new road can be opened to traffic for all road users which we are aiming for in early December. A road safety audit will then be carried out on the road. This FCC and LIHAF-funded project will serve to underpin the ongoing residential development in the area and significantly enhance road safety on the local transportation network.

# A Call for Fingal Turnkey Properties

Expression of Interest: Advance Purchase Arrangement for Residential Development Through Turnkey Agreements

Home builders and housing developers in Fingal are being asked to consider offering unbuilt houses or apartments with planning permission, to local authorities under an advance purchase turnkey arrangement.

Fingal County Council is seeking to enter into advance purchase arrangements to secure turnkey homes in areas where the need, in particular, for social and affordable housing, is most acute. This call is targeted at advance purchase opportunities for a minimum of 10 and a



maximum of 150 dwellings in any one scheme.

It is anticipated that, depending on circumstances and proposals, Fingal County Council enter into an advance purchase agreement for an approved number of homes, with payment on completion. The advance purchase agreement also provides for the direct sale of homes by the developer to an eligible purchaser nominated by the local authority. Joint venture arrangements that include an Approved Housing Body (AHB) will also be considered.

# Balbriggan's Call to Action



On the 18th of October 2021 Mayor O Rodaigh gave the opening address to mark the UN International Day for the Eradication of Poverty. Aster Family Resource Centre in Balbriggan in collaboration with Balbriggan Educate Together and support of Fingal Community Officejoined in solidarity to raise awareness on "Child Poverty in our Community." This event was in collaboration with the 6th class students of The Balbriggan Educate Together National School and was a huge awareness campaign success.

The UN International Day for the Eradication of Poverty is a worldwide event that marks the significant gathering of 100,000 people in Paris to honour the victims of extreme poverty, violence and hunger. This gathering declared that poverty is a human rights violation and called for international effort to address it. Every year people come together to show solidarity with those who suffer under the violation of poverty throughout the world.

#### Sports Funding

Although the equipment and youth sports funding has closed for Sports Clubs, we have committed to funding over 105 clubs (9 applications to be approved at full council meeting in December) approximately €130,000 in 2021.

This practical element of the Women in Sport Masterclass Series was part of the overall plan to develop and encourage greater female involvement in coaching positions in sport.

This event was delivered by Dublin Ladies Football Manager Mick Bohan. The 2-hour workshop took place in Tyrrelstown AWP with 68 coaches in attendance from all over Fingal (50% from D15).

Mick spent time coaching the newly formed Tyrrelstown GAA Girls u10 team and worked with coaches on the principles of coaching children. We are looking at developing similar practical sessions in other sports in 2022.

#### **Environmental Awareness Projects**

Anti-Litter Anti-Graffiti projects are ongoing and nearing completion in several communities including murals in Swords, Rush, Balbriggan and Corduff Dublin 15 and biodiversity areas in Mountview/Fortlawn Community Youth and Youth Community Sports Hub and Castlefield Park Clonsilla.

Teachers from 17 Fingal schools received online training for composting and had a site visit to assess opportunities for composting at the school. Several leaf mould cages were set up to compost leaves. Oberstown Childrens Campus young people are making the wormeries and pallet bins for the project. This is all part of the funded Composting for Schools Pilot in the Dublin area.

In support of ReUse month, repaired bicycles and instruments were gifted to a number of schools including a

full drumkit to New Cross College, 10 guitars and 5 keyboards to Lusk Community College & Lusk Senior National School.


