# A message from AnnMarie Farrelly, Chief Executive, Fingal County Council

The Dublin Citizens' Assembly, has been convened to consider the type of directly elected mayor and local government structures best suited for Dublin, and to bring forward proposals in that regard. I was delighted to accept the invitation to participate in a panel discussion, along with the other Dublin Chief Executives, last Sunday, 1st of May, and to address the 80 members of the Assembly and present an overview of Fingal as an area and Fingal County Council as the third biggest local authority in Ireland in terms of the population it serves, the staff it employs and the budget it spends. I took the opportunity to highlight the strategic importance of Fingal to the Irish economy with Dublin Airport acting as the principal international gateway for trade, inward investment and tourism. Furthermore, we have also been entrusted by government to set up and operate the Aircraft Noise Competent Authority responsible for ensuring that noise generated by aircraft activity at Dublin Airport is assessed in accordance with EU and Irish legislation.

Our priority of making Fingal a good place to do business has seen much success due to our cross-departmental approach in helping indigenous and foreign direct investment businesses establish themselves within the county. We are Fingal-focused acting quickly and decisively for the good of the communities we serve and having councillors from Fingal making decisions that affect the people of Fingal is something that Fingallians identify with. This is largely due to the excellent working relationship between the executive and the elected members. The current Council, which was elected in May 2019, has made 276 separate decisions over the past three years, some of which were nationally significant and pioneering. Local Government is the form of government closest to the citizen with direct accountability for every one of the 380 different services we provide to the people of Fingal. Every day we have presence on the ground in every corner of the county through the work of our Operations crews, Community Officers, Librarians, Social Workers, Sports Officers, Litter Wardens, Arts Officers, Traffic Wardens, Lifeguards, Park Rangers, Environmental Officers, and many, many more of our 1,500 dedicated staff and I am immensely proud of what is achieved on an ongoing basis through the close partnership of the executive and elected members. The Fingal response to date to the Ukrainian crisis has been

commendable and we are endeavouring to assist to the fullest possible extent to meet the needs of refugees arriving in Fingal. We will continue to keep you updated as the situation evolves. The Liam Rodgers Centre in Drinan, Swords has been stood down as an emergency accommodation centre. The occupants have been transferred to more permanent accommodation. The Ballyogan site, in the Dun Laoghaire Rathdown Area, is now operational and will operate on a regional basis providing temporary emergency accommodation for those fleeing Ukraine on behalf of the six counties which comprise the Eastern Region for Major Emergency Management purposes. An online briefing for elected members on the Fingal response has been arranged for tomorrow, Friday, 6th May and will give an overview on the community response forum and information surrounding accommodation for refugees aswell as providing information on what various FCC Departments such as Community, Libraries and Events have done and are doing as part of the response.

Since 2010, REDC have been tracking sentiment among Fingal residents through a regular residential satisfaction survey commissioned by Fingal County Council. The purpose of the survey is to understand attitudes and opinions among residents of the work of the Council which, in turn, helps the Council continue to provide the highest level of customer service to its residents.

The survey questions residents about their personal experience of living in Fingal, awareness and satisfaction with Fingal County Council, Housing and Council Services as well as their experience of dealing with the Council and knowledge of its work.

The 2022 survey involved face to face interviews with 1,012 residents aged 18+ across the county with interviews being conducted in each of the seven electoral areas. The results will be presented by REDC to councillors in an online briefing on Tuesday, May 17 at 5pm.

Our Twitter account, @fingalcoco, had 452,900 impressions during April and an average engagement rate of 1.7% from 338 tweets.



On Facebook, April's posts reached 161,520 people. The number of followers on Facebook is now 27,444 which is a rise of 173 from March.



## 453 Elected Members' Reps Submitted in April



Staff continue to work on the Customer Relationship Management System (CRM) and issue responses to representations from Elected Members (Councillors, TDs and ienators) and complaints submitted by the public. The month of April had a total of 453 lected Members' representations. The tabl above shows the total number of Electe Members representations assigned to each Department to date in 2022.

#### New Chief Executive Order System is live

The new CE Orders system went live in Fingal on Friday 22nd April. Initially the system has been deployed to the Directorate of Economic, Enterprise, Tourism & Cultural Development, and the Digital Services Department in a pilot phase which will run until 23rd May.

CE Orders is a new system specifically designed to streamline and automate the creation, approval and management of Chief Executive Orders across all Directorates and Departments in Fingal. It also automatically generates the CE Orders Register. The system utilises SharePoint Online technology for the document repositories and the associated search functionality.

Once the pilot for CE Orders has concluded, the system will be rolled out to remaining Directorates in four deployment cycles over the next two to three months. It is expected that all Directorates will be fully live by end July 2022.

#### Reader Pens at Library branches

We have a new service on offer to members of the public called Reader Pens. Reader Pens read words and full lines of text aloud for independent reading. Those with dyslexia, those who have difficulty with reading or pronunciation, those learning languages or those with vision problems will find these pens extremely helpful pieces of technology.

This device reads text out with a natural speaking voice.

The pens have built-in dictionaries so you can access definitions as you read for better understanding.

At present the pens are in Balbriggan, Blanchardstown, Swords and Malahide Libraries for use in branch.

We plan by the summer to have them in all libraries with the option of borrowing them for a limited period.



## **Fingal Skills Portal Launched**

## Refurbished EIRE 6 Sign

The Eire 6 restoration team had their official launch of the Eire 6 neutrality sign at Howth's east mountain on Saturday 9th April. It was hosted by President Michael D. Higgins on the day to celebrate the event.

There was an Air Corps fly past at 3.10pm and a flotilla of local boats sailed by to celebrate the official launch of the EIRE 6 Neutrality WW2 sign. This WW2 era sign was sensitively restored by local volunteers over the past years with the support of Fingal's Operations department and following the advice of Fingal's biodiversity officer.







#### **Additional Playground Equipment** - The Glebe Park Balrothery

Additional Playground equipment including a Trim Trail and Zip Wire was added to Glebe Park Playground in Balrothery. This additional equipment was partly funded via the DCEDIY funding from the Department of Children Equality Disability Integration and Youth.



#### Playground Refurb at St. Catherine's Estate



Initial site works have commenced for the long-awaited playground refurbishment at St Catherine's Estate Rush. This project is being funded by the Fingal County Council 2022-2024 Capital Budget at a cost of €100,000 plus an additional €15,000 from DCEDIY funding from the Department of Children Equality Disability Integration and Youth.

## Porterstown Park All-Weather Running Track & Sport Pitch Facility Update

Bridge Central Piers, Columns and the central pier head beam were completed in April and following four nights of road closures on the

N3, bridge beams were positioned in place to form the main bridge structure over the N3 motorway, a most significant phase of this project. Works have commenced on the underpass under the Snugborough Road, with excavations taking place in April in advance of

the precast units being installed in May. Construction of walls and columns continued through April to support the bridge crossing of the River Tolka. The website www.snugboroughinterchange.ie containing information on the project is now live and will continue to be

Snugborough Interchange Upgrade Project

On 4th April, work commenced on the site of the new All-Weather Running Track and Sports Pitch facility at Porterstown Park. The launch of the works was attended by Deputy Mayor Daniel Whooley and Dublin West TD and Minister for Sport Jack Chambers alongside local Councillors and community groups who will benefit from the new sporting facilities.

Significant earthworks are ongoing, following a topsoil strip, earth grading to the exact levels required using laser guided technology is taking place. (Pictured is the west curve of the running track taking shape). The next steps over the coming weeks include drainage installation and the importation of stone to form the base layer of the synthetic surfaces of the running track and pitch.

To date significant stakeholder engagement has kept park users, local sports groups and clubs well informed and the Council's Parks and Green Infrastructure Division will continue to liaise as required going forward. It is anticipated that the facility will be complete by Q1 of next year and will become a valuable state of the art sporting amenity for the people of Dublin 15 and the wider area.

The contractor is onsite constructing the Church Fields Link Road and Cycle Network which will facilitate the development of the entire Church Fields landbank with the potential to deliver 1,000 mixed tenure homes.

Construction is already underway of 67 social homes at Church Fields Phase 2B.

Construction of a further 20 homes at Wellview is also underway with delivery scheduled for later this year (pictured below).

#### 1,473 Local Authority Home Loan Applications


There were a total of 1,473 home loan applications received by Fingal County Council (FCC) since the introduction of the Rebuilding Ireland Home Loan (RIHL) now known as the Local Authority Home Loan (LAHL).

Any applicant normally resident anywhere in the state can apply for a mortgage under the scheme.

Of the 1,473 applications

received, 911(62%) were received from addresses within Fingal and 562 (38%) were received from outside of Fingal.

#### **CBL Online Portal**

The new online portal to facilitate the Choice Based Letting (CBL) scheme has proven efficient with staff and applicants. CBL is an approach used for the allocation of designated Social Housing Units. It allows housing applicants to express an interest in being considered for the allocation of designated Social Housing Units.

Applicants with active applications can access Choice Based Letting by logging onto https://cbl. fingal.ie using their unique username and password. To access their unique username and password applicants must contact choicebasedlettings@fingal.ie with their housing

reference number and phone number. The housing team has issued over 1,200 secure passwords and usernames to date. Applicants are actively encouraged to obtain their passwords and usernames to express interest in any properties advertised.

Approved Social Housing applicants log in each week to check the dwellings that are available using their username and password.

Applicants are encouraged to obtain their username & password. To date 1654 passwords have been sent since the CBL portal opened (08/12/2021) of which 217 have been issued during the month of April.

Virtual events include Self-led family cycles using maps prepared by the Team of suitable family cycle locations, "Pedal for your Medal", Bling your Bike Competition and #CycleThere photo competition.

Other events include an all-inclusive cycle event with Prosper Fingal in Malahide Demesne, BMX bike tracks for local schools, transition year cycle in Balbriggan, Spin and Swim event in Velvet Strand, Adult Cycle Training, Cycling without Age launch and much more.

Staff events include guided and self-guided lunchtime cycles from Blanchardstown and Swords offices and we are encouraging staff to participate and catch up with their colleagues while also enjoying the outdoors and getting some exercise.

Bike week will culminate with a flagship, family fun cycling event to be held in Malahide Demesne on Sunday 22nd May.



Fingal's Climate Action Section have partnered with Skerries Tidy Towns and The Conscious Cup Campaign www.consciouscup.ie on a Skerries based pilot campaign which runs between 21st and 28th April and aims to promote reusables and encourage a move away from single use disposable cups.

In Ireland, 22,000 single use cups are wasted every hour, the combination of plastic and paper in their design making them virtually non-recyclable. In an effort to reduce this waste, 14 cafés and businesses in Skerries have signed up to the Reusable Cup Campaign. They are actively displaying campaign posters at their premises and are promoting the fact that they accept reusable cups on their social media.

Some businesses have branded and unbranded reusable cups to sell in-store and are displaying Conscious Cup Campaign posters provided by the Council.

The Council supported the event with prizes and promotional material and the participating cafés came together to produce a promotional video to raise awareness on social media.

## **Glass Recycling Made Clear**



In April a visit to the glass recycling in Naas Co Kildare was conducted by staff from the ECCAT Department.

Fingal County Council manage the Regional Glass Collection and Recycling Contract on behalf of the 4 Dublin Local Authorities.

A detailed tour of the factory was undertaken showing the full process of how the glass in broken down into small pieces that are required to make into new glass bottles. All products are recycled as far as possible i.e., sand from the process is sent on to factories for recycling, as are metal and plastic which are bailed on site, the whole process striving towards zero waste.

The contractor gave a background to the company and what they do and how they process the glass, which is then transported to Fermanagh to be turned into glass bottle once again. This was an example of the circular economy being brought from start to finish on the island of Ireland.



## **Marram Grass Planting Workshop held in April**

Clean Coasts in collaboration with CARO and Fingal County Council hosted a marram grass planting workshop on Portmarnock beach on Saturday 9th April. Participants learned how to plant marram grass and about the critical role it plays in protecting coastlines.





There have been 21 grants of permissions in respect of single house construction, 144 grants of permission for domestic extensions, 60 commercial/retail grants of permission in respect of housing developments of which 5 relate to development of 2 - 20, 1 relates to 20 - 50 and 1 relates to 50 -100.
