LCDC Funding 2021

HEALTHY IRELAND –Round 3

Healthy Ireland is a government led initiative aimed at improving the health and wellbeing of everyone living in Ireland.

In 2021, through the Covid 19 Pandemic, the LCDC oversaw the continuing progression and financial administration of Round 3 of the Healthy Ireland Programme. The actions included five CYPSC led projects and two Community Mental Health projects. Round 3 also included the continued provision of a pilot Social Prescribing Project in Dublin 15 with a geographical emphasis on Mulhuddart, a designated area of disadvantage.

In early 2021 under Community Engagement Action over 300 individual merchandise packs were created and disseminated to 13 individual community groups and services in Fingal. Some merchandise was held for distribution at community events in late 2021, in line with Covid-19 restrictions.

In June 2021, the Healthy Fingal Strategic Plan 2021 – 2025 was launched by the Mayor of Fingal. The launch included a video which showcased health and well-being activities in Fingal and recorded messages from the Minister for Public Health, Well Being and National Drugs Strategy, CEO of Fingal County Council and the Head of Health and Well Being, HSE. A brochure was created providing a snapshot of the plan and action items. Seven animations were also created to provide a simplified and short message regarding the plan and each action item which could be shared digitally. Each animation and the launch video included Irish Sign Language interpretation.

In late 2021, the Healthy Fingal Keep Well webpage which was initially created as part of the Community Resilience Fund was re-designed as the Healthy Fingal webpage. The webpage includes information and links to community-based services, programmes, and events under each pillar of the Healthy Fingal Strategic Plan 2021- 2025.

2021 saw the recipients of the Community Mental Health Fund Small Grants Scheme delivering local level initiatives which promoted and enhanced mental health and well-being.





Community Enhancement Programme 2021

The Community and voluntary groups in Fingal were invited to apply for Community Enhancement Programme (CEP) 2021 funding. The CEP is funded by DRCD and administered by Local Community Development Committees (LCDCs). Fingal was allocated €150,521 in grant funding.

The Programme has a particular focus on supporting groups in areas of disadvantage. The 2021 CEP provided small grants to assist re-opening facilities such as community centres, men's and women's sheds, parish halls, clubs, and youth centres. The grants range from a few hundred euro to €10,000. Funding helped groups and clubs to get back on their feet and could be used to carry out necessary renovations and repairs, to purchase equipment such as tables and chairs, tools and signage, laptops and printers, lawnmowers, canopies, training equipment and so on. The key theme of the 2021 Community Enhancement Programme is supporting groups as they re-opened facilities which have been closed due to COVID-19.



Covid-19 Emergency Fund Round 2 -2021

The COVID-19 Emergency Fund was funded by the DRCD and administered by Fingal LCDC.

Round 2 of the COVID-19 Emergency Fund offered funding of €1.7m nationally with €59,820 allocated to Fingal County Council.

The type of expenditure supported included

- Adapting facilities to safely accommodate people
- Adapting services to increase virtual participation
- Positive impacts on the environment such as a reduction in energy consumption
- Collaboration with the Local Authority or other relevant bodies in Fingal
- The creation of a sense of place within the community
- Technology investment which will be accessed by individuals and communitites
- The return to community activity while complying with COVID19 guidelines

This funding scheme was of particular interest to local community and voluntary groups as there was no requirement for them to have match funding. This enabled greater flexibility and opportunity for groups when applying for funding.

In addition to supporting groups involved in the Community Call initiative, Fingal County Council considered funding applications from community groups and community services to support Safe Return to Community Activity whilst complying with COVID 19 guidelines. These costs could relate to COVID signage, protective screening i.e. perspex, cleaning/ sanitizing equipment and materials i.e. steamers, sprays, hand sanitizers, Under the scheme, 30% of available funds were ring-fenced to provide small grants of €1,000 or less.



Social Inclusion & Community Activation Programme

The Social Inclusion Community Activation Programme (SICAP) is a key intervention for the harder to reach groups. Delivery is being overseen and managed by Fingal LCDC. SICAP aims to address poverty, long term unemployment and social exclusion through local engagement and partnership between disadvantaged individuals, community organisations and public sector agencies. The total budget for SICAP in Fingal in 2021 is €1,246,141 for which a contribution comes from the European Social Fund (ESF) Programme for Employability, Inclusion and Learning (PEIL). The Programme Implementer, Empower achieved its two key performance indicators (KPI's) for 2021 and ensured that the programme and services were delivered within the financial parameters approved by the LCDC.

In 2021, the local development company Empower met all the targets set out in the Annual Plan as approved by the LCDC.

Connect & Include

In 2021, one of our primary actions under Goal 2 of SICAP is Digital Poverty (Action 10). Digital exclusion and disadvantage was the most prominent barrier to surface during the Covid pandemic for the most hard-to-reach target groups. Connect & Include is Empowers digital inclusion initiative that seeks to support vulnerable and disadvantaged individuals and families who may be experiencing digital exclusion. Research has shown that the level of an individual's digital connectivity has always had a direct correlation to levels of prosperity and poverty. As educational and social supports moved online, this has caused a digital divide for children and young people from disadvantaged families. Empower continues to collaborate with local Community Groups, Family Support Agencies, disability services and DEIS schools to identify individuals and families most in need of digital connection and support during this crisis.





Fingal Community Anti-Racism Network (FCARN)

The FCARN is a new network of volunteers, community groups and other stakeholders committed to Anti-Racism and supporting those affected by racism. It was established by Empower SICAP staff in September 2021. The Network aims to:

- Build safe communities
- Build inclusive communities
- Educate and create awareness about racism, and how to respond within communities
- Support witnesses and victims, break isolation and get support from other members of
- the community network

Empower has already supported associated members formulate an Anti-Racism Protocol, Terms of Reference and engage with the communities of interest to inform them about the Network. We have also collaborated with other stakeholders such as INAR and Fingal Communities Against Racism to become part of the network to offer support to its members.



Early-Years Provision Deficit

Fingal CYPSC carried out extensive research and published a report in 2021 entitled *Double Disadvantage – Reduced access to early childhood care and education for children at risk of poverty in Fingal,* which highlighted the lack of early years provision and impact it has on disadvantaged communities. Fingal has the lowest proportion of community-based childcare services in Ireland, with only 10 not-for-profit early years services, and only 1 in the North County. Fingal is the youngest county in Ireland and Balbriggan the youngest town. Lack of not-for-profit early years services is a major barrier for SICAP target groups to engage. Not-for-profit community services provide high-quality, responsive provision, early intervention, and family supports to reduce the risk of poverty. They are much more than just a childcare service. SICAP staff were part of the FCYPSC who commissioned the report and were also at the forefront of advocating for the implementation of its recommendations.

2021 was a challenging year for all but there were still many positive projects approved under Dublin Rural LEADER. Projects ranged from responses to Covid 19, environmental themes and capacity building for commu-nity groups. The LAG continued with online meetings which proved effective in approving the projects and re-viewing emerging trends. Rural Communities and Enterprises in Dublin received a major boost in 2021with the announcement that the geographical area eligible for funding under the LEADER Programme was significantly expanded. The new areas included in the expanded Dublin Rural LEADER Programme are Balbriggan, Skerries. Portmarnock, Dubber, Castleknock-Knockmaroon, Lucan North, Glencullen, and Shankill-Rathmichael.



The Project will reduce the demand on the public water supply and reduce the volume of water going into the public drainage system. This project will enable the club to become self-sustaining in their water usage taking it away from the public system, using rainwater for both bathrooms in the clubhouse, which would lower their demand for public water.






Local Economic & Community Plan



The purpose of local economic and community plans is to set out the objectives and actions needed to promote and support the economic and community development of the relevant local authority area.

The LCDC has a key role arranging for the implementation of the community elements of the LECP as well as re-viewing the economic elements of the plan. The LECP provides a framework for strategic and operational plans in

the county. The objectives and actions of SICAP and the LEADER programmes are closely aligned in the high level goals and objectives as set out in the Fingal LECP.

The Local Government Reform Act 2014 provides for the development of a 6 year integrated Local Economic and Community Plan to promote and support the economic and social development of the local authority area. Fingal LECP recognises that local and community development interventions need to support economic activity from the ground up, while helping to combat social exclusion and poverty, through targeted interventions to improve educa-tion, training and employment opportunities within disadvantaged or marginalised communities.



The main conclusions arising from the most recent review of the Fingal LECP were:

- The vast majority of LECP actions were considered valid and progressing well.
- The LECP 2016-2021 did not take account of BREXIT.
- Climate change and child centred actions should be prioritised in any future version of the LECP.
- 2 or 3 big ticket county wide actions could be identified, covering the areas identified above in any future version of the LECP.
