Welcome to the Fingal Library Service Development Plan 2024-2029, which sets out a clear vision for the strategic direction of library services in the County. The Plan is based on four themes: Space and Place; Engagement and Collaboration; Access and Inclusion; and Culture and Knowledge. These themes are underpinned by actions which will improve library services in Fingal and in turn lead to enhancements in people's lives through engagement with literature, knowledge, culture, creativity and technology.

This Plan demonstrates that libraries in Fingal are not just buildings with books, but rather they are community hubs in which people can enjoy and experience events and activities, including talks and workshops on topics as diverse as healthy living, skills for life, environmental awareness and local history.

Libraries in Fingal are dynamic spaces, constantly adapting and anticipating new developments in reading trends, in technological advancements and in societal change. At the heart of this, as outlined in the Plan, are our core values such as intellectual freedom, diversity, inclusion and accessibility.

The Plan recognises the key role that libraries play in meeting the challenges of climate change. Over the lifetime of the Plan, Fingal Libraries will continue to deliver community education programmes in the areas of sustainability and climate action. We will also continue to deliver programming in line with the Government's national plan for the Sustainable Development Goals, to promote health and wellbeing, quality education and reduction in inequality.



The Plan took several months to progress through the various stages: consultation and engagement with stakeholders, policy mapping, desk research, survey development and survey results analysis. Consultant, Sinéad Begley, kept the process on track, providing expertise and a guiding voice as milestones were met in the development of the Plan.

The public consultation process was a key part in the development of the Plan, and we want to thank all those who responded to the survey and who took part in a series of consultation meetings. A total of 1,139 responses to the survey were received from library users, schools, groups and organizations. The responses reflect high satisfaction with libraries in Fingal, with most respondents feeling their needs are being met by the services provided. Unsurprisingly, the survey also indicated that users really value the friendly and helpful customer service they receive from staff. We are very proud of our library services in Fingal, and of the committed and hard-working staff who provide this frontline service.

Our overall vision for the service, as set out in this Development Plan, is that Fingal Libraries will continue to be a dynamic and inclusive community space supporting culture, recreation, literacy, education and lifelong learning in the County.




Executive Summary

Under the Local Government Act 2001, the Council has a statutory obligation to produce a Library Development Programme to be adopted by the Council. The Fingal Library Service Development Plan 2024-2029, which is the second library plan for the County, will build on the progress achieved through implementation of the strategy for the period 2018-2023. We will continue to strive to provide a dynamic and inclusive space supporting inclusion, culture, recreation, literacy, education, and lifelong learning in the County in the context of the Council's vision for Fingal as a great place in which to live, work, do business and visit.

Over the period of the first strategy significant progress has been made in enhancing library buildings and facilities with the refurbishment of Malahide, Balbriggan, Baldoyle and Blanchardstown Libraries. The extension and refurbishment of Skerries Library is nearing completion and the My Open Library service, which offers extended opening hours was launched at Baldoyle Library in July 2022. In November 2023, the Council went to tender for the construction of the Swords Cultural Centre, which will house a County Library, theatre, gallery, events spaces, and a makerspace. The Centre will be a hub for reading, literature, literacy, knowledge, arts and culture for Swords and Fingal.

A Makerspace has been opened at Blanchardstown Library and a Maker in Residence appointed. The space enables the community to access and learn about innovative technologies in a unique setting, where creativity is encouraged and protected, and entrepreneurship, inquiry-based learning, digital literacy and creative approaches to problem solving are encouraged.

Fingal Library Service has continued to respond to the evolving needs of the whole community by offering services to Ukrainians coming to Ireland and providing a range of online and in person services during COVID. A range of new e-services including music streaming, genealogy, and coding are now available. Sensory resources and quiet times have been introduced, and all branches are signed up to the Age Friendly charter.





Libraries have been co-ordinating the Creative Ireland Programme in Fingal since January 2022. An eclectic range of creative and cultural programming has been delivered including story trails at Ardgillan Demesne and Kenure Park, Writers', History and Children's Literature Festivals, and exhibitions and talks to mark the Decade of Centenaries Commemorations Programme.

This new Plan reflects the direction set for libraries by the National Public Library Strategy 2023-2027, The Library is the Place¹, which seeks to improve access, use and visibility of public libraries as an essential community service. The Strategy recognises the role of libraries in the development of sustainable, inclusive, and empowered communities that make an explicit contribution to meeting the challenges of climate change. The government's National Implementation Plan for the Sustainable Development Goals 2022² also recognises public libraries as sustainable institutions which play a big part in helping to provide knowledge, understanding, and resources in our communities.



Fingal Library Services



Collections and Resources

Fingal Libraries' collections have expanded over the past five years, and offer enhanced physical and digital collections, designed to appeal to a wide range of interests, ages and needs.

To increase access to very high demand titles our branch stock now includes a short loan system, so users can borrow popular items for a limit of 10 days (multiple copies are available).

New additions to our physical stock include energy kits that can be used to measure how your home uses energy. We've also added sensory toys for use in-branch and greatly increased our stock of class sets of books for teachers to borrow.

As well as our key digital services, we now offer a wide range of literacy-enhancing services. LOTE4Kids, offers digital picture books in over 50 LOTE (Languages Other Than English). Touch Type Read and Spell teaches touchtyping to help children and adults to improve their reading and spelling skills.

The TumbleBook and TumbleMath databases have over 1,100 children's e-books and Maths books including animated talking books, readalong chapter books, graphic novels, puzzles, and games.

The Creative Ireland Programme is an all-ofgovernment initiative committed to enhancing access to, engagement with, and enjoyment of Ireland's culture and creativity.

During the lifetime of the first Fingal Culture and Creativity Strategy, 2018-2022, Fingal initiated many projects that fostered creativity in the community. Some of the highlights included Cruinniú, the national day of creativity for children and young people, and the Festival of History, which builds on local and national expertise in the area of history.

The community funding stream of Creative Fingal has supported a wide range of projects and organisations from pipe bands, and photography clubs, to exhibitions, publication of recipe books, and creative play initiatives.

Building on the success of the previous strategy, the new Fingal Culture and Creativity Strategy 2023-2027 embraces the mission for Fingal to become a great place in which to live, work, do business and visit, and focuses on the following strategic priorities:

- Changing population and demographics.
- Making cities and counties great places to live.
- Climate action.
- Town centre first and the rural economy.
- Digitisation and ongoing transformation.

Fingal Library Events

Through its event programming, Fingal Libraries aims to meet the needs of a diverse community in the areas of information, learning, culture, literacy, life skills, enterprise, and leisure. Workshops and events include story time, board games, toddler time, mindfulness, genealogy, and literature and events for people with additional sensory needs.

Events are offered across all ten library branches and the mobile library service facilitates events offsite to extend the reach of programming to a wider audience. Three brochures are produced annually in Spring, Summer, and Autumn/Winter to promote both themed and one-off events.



Specialist festivals are also programmed including the Fingal Festival of History, the Children's Literature Festival and the Write Time, the annual Fingal writers' festival. Each of these events aim to connect expert creative practitioners including writers, illustrators, and historians to our citizens and to provide access to events and activities for free.



Europe Direct, Blanchardstown

Europe Direct, Blanchardstown provides a link between Fingal's citizens and the institutions of the European Union. The dedicated Europe Direct centre is a welcoming, comfortable space, which provides access to EU publications and a variety of workshops, citizens dialogues, classes, podcasts, and opportunities to become informed active EU citizens.

Library staff are on hand to assist with queries ranging from how to obtain an EU passport to setting up a business in the EU, as well as consumer rights information. The Europe Direct Centre also promotes and supports the roll out of EU initiatives such as The European Green Deal, A Europe Fit for the Digital Age and EU Action on Mental Health.

Fingal Makerspace, Blanchardstown

The Fingal Makerspace was established in 2021 and became fully operational in 2022. The space itself houses a range of modern equipment including, 3D printers, a vinyl cutter, laser cutter, hand tools and software programmes. This accessible, dynamic, and inclusive space is at the heart of Fingal County Council's commitments to sustainability, community building and inclusion.

The Makerspace which offers a range of free programming and events including an introduction to 3D printing, electronic buggy building, and music production workshops, provides the public with access to equipment and technology.

Initiatives such as regular design meet-ups and the Repair Café also provide the opportunity for the public to experiment and forge connections with the wider maker community. All users can benefit from staff and volunteer expertise free of charge, and the practical nature of STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) activities fosters young people's creativity and problem-solving skills outside of the school setting.

My Open Library, Baldoyle

Fingal's first My Open Library service opened in Baldoyle in July 2022 and was officially launched by the Mayor of Fingal, Cllr. Howard Mahony. This service offers extended opening hours and provides library access to members from 8am to 10pm, 365 days a year.

The service has expanded rapidly increasing from 77 members, and 691 visits at the end of 2022 to its current membership of 340, with 2,954 visits made between 1st January and 8th December 2023. Study spaces remain the most popular aspect of My Open Library. May 2023 saw the highest recorded visits to date at 729 with the service being widely used by exam students.

Members also issue and return books, collect reserved items, and use the printing services. The busiest day of the week is Sunday when numerous families as well as students visit the library.

Feedback from My Open Library members has been extremely positive with increased accessibility cited as one of the main benefits.

Local Studies and Archives

Fingal Local Studies and Archives are based at 46 North Street, Swords. The service collects, preserves and makes available historic records relating to Fingal and Dublin by transfer, donation, and purchase. Outreach includes exhibitions, publications, talks, the Fingal Festival of History and participation in Heritage Week and Culture Night.

The Local Studies collections include photographs, postcards, maps, artwork and an extensive printed collection of local history books and periodicals, reference works, directories, and general genealogical and historical books. The Archive contains records of local government in County Dublin from 1775 to the present day, including the Turnpike Trusts, County of Dublin Grand Jury, Poor Law Unions, Rural District Councils, Howth Urban District Council, Balbriggan Town Commissioners, Dublin County Council and a variety of private collections including the Hely-Hutchinson Papers, Holmpatrick Papers and Hone Papers.

Skerries Library

Dating from 1910, Skerries Library is a protected structure and considered to be a fine example of the series of Carnegie Libraries built in Ireland. It is a two-storey structure with a cut stone front façade and is flanked by St. Patrick's Church on one side and by Floraville Park on the other.

In March 2022, work commenced on site to refurbish the Library and to construct a substantial extension to the rear of the building, with associated siteworks and the upgrading of the public realm area.

The refurbishment of the library is being carried out in line with best conservation practice. The refurbished and extended library will re-open to the public in 2024 and will be a much-enhanced building with reading and study facilities, and meeting rooms. There will also be an events area and an opening directly into Floraville Park, to accommodate outdoor storytelling and other library activities.

Swords Cultural Quarter

Swords Cultural Quarter

In November 2023, the Council went to tender for the construction of the Swords Cultural Centre. This iconic building will include a county library, theatre, gallery, arts spaces, a makerspace, and a café. It is planned to begin construction in 2024, with the new building due to open in 2026.

The Centre will be a hub for reading, literature, literacy, knowledge, arts and culture for Swords and Fingal. It will have a strong focus on people and experiences, and through the delivery of a modern, dynamic, inspirational. and educational programme of events and activities, will become a destination and a focal point for the local community and visitors.





How the plan was developed

The County Librarian convened a Library Services Development Plan Working Group in March 2023 and the process of developing the plan began. An analysis was undertaken to ensure that the Fingal Library Service Development Plan 2024-2029 would align with and support the delivery of strategic objectives of both national and Council plans and policies where appropriate.

As part of the process of developing the strategy a workshop was conducted with the management team to identify external factors that may influence the operating context for the development and implementation of the plan over the period of its implementation. Staff from across Fingal Libraries took part in online workshops (in April 2023) to assist in identifying strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats in relation to the library service in Fingal.

Public consultation

A key part of the process of developing this Plan was the public consultation process, which invited the community, schools, groups, and organisations to give their views on the future of the public library service in Fingal. Two online surveys were developed (for individual members of the public and organisations and schools in Fingal) and made available on the Consult Fingal website consult.fingal.ie over the period from May to November 2023. The surveys explored if and how respondents use the library, how well their needs are met currently, what they value most about the library service and if they have encountered any barriers to availing of services. Suggestions for the future of library services were also sought.

The survey for the public was promoted extensively by staff in branch libraries, the mobile and housebound services, at library and Makerspace events, through posters and digital signage in branches, on the Council's website, and on social media. Staff also promoted the survey to members of the public in the Swords Pavilion Shopping Centre (October 2023). Foróige kindly assisted in circulating the survey link to youth workers to share with young people engaged with the organisation in Fingal. A total of 1,108 responses were received from users across all branches and service points. The survey for schools and organisations was shared with schools in Fingal, the Fingal Public Participation Network, and the Fingal Ethnic Network. In total twenty-eight organisations including ten primary schools responded to the survey.

In addition to the surveys a series of consultation meetings were conducted with Fingal Comhairle na nÓg, Foróige LEAD (League for Equality and Against Discrimination) and YAD (Youth Against Discrimination) groups, and Fingal Older People's Council.

The findings of the public consultation reflect a high level of satisfaction with services, with the majority of respondents feeling their needs are being met. Users value the friendly and helpful customer service from staff; free access to books and other resources and collections; and safe, pleasant, community spaces in which to read, relax, study, work, learn, connect with other people, or spend time with family or friends. Having access to technology and opportunities to attend events are also appreciated.

The findings of the consultation in relation to issues raised by users and suggestions for improving service both generally, and at branch level, will be very useful in planning for the delivery of services in the future. Issues most frequently raised include lack of library services in some areas, lack of space, issues with noise or conflicting user needs, and the need for differentiated study or quiet space, issues with facilities or maintenance (e.g., toilets, seating, lifts, or ICT), limited book stock, long waits on reserved items and restricted opening hours at weekends, evening, and bank holidays.

Some non-users of the library (both individuals and groups) indicated that they would be encouraged to use the library by some of the existing services including the availability of online resources, access to events, Makerspace and creative activities, and access to Wi-Fi and computers. This suggests that increased promotion of these aspects of services could further extend the reach of libraries.
