

by Adam Haslett



by Bryan Washington



by Brandon Taylor



by Kate Fagan



by Garth Greenwell



by Orlando Ortega-Medina



by Douglas Stuart



by Taylor Jenkins Reid



by Nathan Harris



by Monique Truong





by John Boyne






NIAMH MULVEY

by Jeanette Winterson





by Amal El-Mohtar and Max Gladstone



by Samantha Shannon



by Andre Aciman



by Justin Torres



by Laila Ibrahim



by Khashayar J. Khabushani






OUTRAGE:



The Story of Polari, Britain's Secret Gay Language by Paul Baker



He traces its historical origins and describes its linguistic nuts and bolts, explores the ways and the environments in which it was spoken, explains the reasons for its decline and tells of its unlikely re-emergence in the twenty-first century.

by Jeanette Winterson



It was a story of survival. This book is that story's the silent twin. It is full of hurt and humour and a fierce love of life. It is about the pursuit of happiness, about lessons in love, the search for a mother and a journey into madness and out again.



GAY SCIENCE:

The Totally Scientific Examination of LGBTQ+ Culture, Myths, and Stereotypes by Rob Anderson

Rob Anderson borrows the familiar science textbook format to skewer ridiculous queer stereotypes with his own version of science. Using the principles of natural, social, and formal sciences, Rob answers extremely serious questions like: Why can't gays sit in a chair properly? Why don't lesbians have electricity in their movies? Are colleges turning people bisexual? How does gaydar work? You'll read about the three subtypes of the gay uncle species, examine the Periodic Table of LGBTQ+ Elements, & understand gay crime and punishment.



GAY AND LESBIAN ACTIVISM IN THE REPUBLIC OF IRELAND, 1973-93


This study traces the emergence of visible gay and lesbian communities across the Republic of Ireland and their impact on public perceptions of homosexuality. It explores the critical and hidden activism of lesbian women, the role of rural provincial activists, the importance of interactions with international gay and lesbian organisations and the extent to which HIV and AIDS impacted the gay rights campaign.



STRAIGHT JACKET:

Overcoming Society's Legacy of Gay Shame by Matthew Todd

Straight Jacketis a clarion call for gay men, the wider LGBT community, their friends and family. It looks beneath the shiny facade of contemporary gay culture and asks if gay people are as happy as they could be - and if not, why not? Straight Jacket offers invaluable practical advice on how to overcome a range of difficult issues. It also recognizes that this is a watershed moment, a piercing wake-up-call-to-arms for the gay and wider community to acknowledge the importance of supporting all young people - and helping older people to transform their experience and finally get the lives they really want.



HER NAME IS ALICE

Alice Litman died by suicide in May 2022, aged just twenty years old, having already waited almost three years for her first appointment at a gender identity clinic. In stunningly beautiful prose, Caroline Litman captures the realities of an often-messy journey navigating both her daughter's transition and the days, weeks and months after Alice's death. Searing, urgent and utterly unique, Her Name is Alice is the raw, human story of a mother's love and grief for her child – and of a young trans woman who is impossible to forget and who must be remembered.

QUEER AS FOLKLORE: The Hidden Queer History of Myths and Monsters by Sacha Coward

Queer communities have often sought refuge in the shadows, found kinship in the in-between and created safe spaces in underworlds; but these forgotten narratives tell stories of remarkable resilience that deserve to be heard. Join any Pride march and you are likely to see a glorious display of papier-mâché unicorn heads trailing sequins, drag queens wearing mermaid tails and more fairy wings than you can shake a trident at. But these are not just accessories: they are queer symbols with historic roots.



OUT OF THE SHADOWS: The Psychology of Gay Men's Lives

Drawing on a lifetime's work as a clinical psychologist, Walt Odets uses the stories of his patients as well as those of his own deep relationships with other gay men to illuminate how these difficulties may be overcome. From a 74-year-old who only felt able to come out after his wife had died, to the boy raised in a strict religious family who worked his way to San Francisco, to the middle-aged defence lawyer who left everything behind to embrace a new life, the experiences here explore everything from grief to survival, childhood pain to the definition of gay itself.



PIECES OF A BOY: A Few Queer Things That Happened by Sam Morris


In this unfiltered collection of essays, Morris fearlessly confronts the complexities of personal history with raw honesty. He unveils profound and witty revelations, navigating through the emotional landscapes of estrangement, elite performing arts education, Berlin hedonism, and the rollercoaster of love and lovelessness. Morris paints a vivid portrait exhuming the past, revisiting violences endured, through a darkly comic lens, in this compelling exploration of the human experience.



THE HOUSE OF HIDDEN MEANINGS

RuPaul's ever-shifting nature has always been part of his brand. Yet that adaptability has made him enigmatic. In this memoir RuPaul makes himself truly known. Stripping away all artifice, RuPaul recounts the story of his life with clarity and tenderness. From his early years as a queer Black kid in San Diego navigating complex relationships with his absent father and temperamental mother, to forging an identity in the punk and drag scenes, to finding love with his husband Georges LeBar and self-acceptance in sobriety, RuPaul excavates his own biography.



LOVE IN EXILE

Shon Faye grew up quietly obsessed with the feeling that love was not for her. Not just romantic love: the secret fear of her own unworthiness penetrated every aspect and corner of her life. It was a fear that would erupt in destructive, counterfeit versions of the real love she craved. Faye's experience of the world as a trans woman, who grew up visibly queer, exacerbated her fears. But, as she confronted her damaging ideas about love and lovelessness, she came to realize that this sense of exclusion is symptomatic of a much larger problem in our culture.


A Hidden History of Queer Women by Elizabeth Lovatt



A Memoir of Love and Loss by Rev. Richard Coles



WE CAN BE HEROES:


A Survivor's Story
