

# Why is a raven like a writing desk?

When Lewis Carroll first posed this question in Alice's Adventures in Wonderland, he had no answer in mind. It was a nonsense riddle, consistent with Wonderland's loose relationship with reality. Since then, answers have been suggested. Carroll himself stated that "it can produce a few notes, tho they are very flat; and it is nevar put with the wrong end in front" - "nevar" being "raven" backwards. Other suggestions are that "Edgar Allan Poe wrote on both" or "both have quills dipped in ink". We propose another interpretation, as the raven is the symbol of Fingal County Council. Why is a raven like a writing desk? They both support writers.

Welcome to the Write Time Festival, Fingal Libraries' annual celebration of creative writing and literature. This is the 10th year of the festival and once again we will be running a library programme in our branches as well as a showcase in the Carnegie Free Library.



#### **Cecelia Ahern in Conversation**

Cecelia Ahern has been a star of Irish literature since her sensational debut, *P.S. I Love You*, written when she was only 21 years old. She has published 21 novels, including her most recent, *Paper Heart*, a romance set in rural Ireland. It is the story of Pip, who keeps herself deliberately tucked away in her own small world. When she meets an astronomer, he encourages her to see a bigger world with more possibilities than she imagined. Cecelia will be in conversation with award-winning author and curator Henrietta McKervey.







**Cecelia Ahern** wrote her debut novel *PS I Love You* at the age of 21 years old, which was published in 2004. It became one of the biggest selling novels of recent years and was made into a hit film starring Hilary Swank, as was her second novel *Love, Rosie* starring Lily Collins. She is published around the world in 47 countries, in over 30 languages and has sold 25 million copies of her novels. She has published 21 novels, including two Young Adult novels and the highly acclaimed collection of stories, *Roar*, which is streaming now on Apple TV+ starring Nicole Kidman. Her most recent novel is *Paper Heart*.

**Colin Barrett** is the author of the short story collections *Young Skins* and *Homesickness*. His debut novel, *Wild Houses*, was longlisted for the 2024 Booker Prize, and won the 2024 Nero Debut Fiction Prize. His short stories have regularly appeared in The Stinging Fly magazine, Granta, Harpers and The New Yorker.



Aoife Barry is a freelance arts journalist, Sunday Times arts columnist and the co-presenter of Irish arts and culture podcast *Get Around To It*. She's the author of the bestselling non-fiction book *Social Capital* (HarperCollins Ireland) and has had bylines across publications including the Irish Times, the Irish Independent, Tatler, The Journal and Irish Examiner. She features regularly on RTÉ Radio One and Today FM and her essays and fiction have been published by ROPES journal and Banshee, and broadcast on Sunday Miscellany.

**Kevin Barry** is the author of four novels, most recently *The Heart in Winter*, and three story collections, most recently, *That Old Country Music*. He also works as a screenwriter and playwright. His most recent play credit is *The Cave* which played at the Abbey Theatre and Galway International Arts Festival in summer 2025. His stories and essays regularly appear in the New Yorker, Harpers, Granta and elsewhere. His work has been translated into more than thirty languages. He is a member of Aosdána. Originally from Limerick city, he lives in Co. Sligo.

Sam Blake is an award winning multiple No. 1 bestselling crime writer, whose latest book *The Killing Sense* is out now. Sam has been shortlisted for the Irish Crime Novel of the Year on numerous occasions and her second YA novel *Something's About to Blow Up* won the International Education Services Teen/YA Novel of the Year in 2024. Sam Blake is the pen name of Vanessa Fox O'Loughlin who is the founder of Writing.ie, the Inkwell Group Publishing Consultancy, and the powerhouse behind the Writers Ink online coaching and mentoring community. She has been instrumental in launching the careers of hundreds of writers in Ireland and abroad. Vanessa/Sam is the current chair of the board of the Society of Authors, the largest UK Union for writers that focuses on the business of authorship and assisting writers in their professional careers.

Zainab Boladale is a journalist, TV presenter and public speaker. She was born in Nigeria and raised in Ireland. In 2017, she made her TV debut on RTÉ's children's programme, news2day, as the first Afro-Irish woman on Irish TV news. On news2day, she presented stories from around the world to the young people of Ireland. Zainab now travels around the country as a presenter and reporter for Ireland's long-running factual feature programme, Nationwide. Zainab has also written and directed a first short film, *Worthy*, which debuted on the film festival circuit in 2023.

**Kevin Curran's** third novel, *Youth*, was published to critical acclaim by The Lilliput Press in 2023. It was an Irish Times, Sunday Independent & RTE Culture Best Book of 2023. It was also a Colm Toibin's Laureate for Fiction's Book Club choice for 2024. The paperback edition was published February 2025. He has published two other novels, *Beatsploitation* (2013) and *Citizens* (2016). As well as writing non-fiction for the Guardian and the Observer, he has also published short stories, most notably in The Stinging Fly Best of 20 years anthology and the *One Dublin, One Book* Best of 21st century Dublin writing anthology. For over fifteen years he has been teaching in his home town in Balbriggan, Co Dublin.

Wendy Erskine's debut novel *The Benefactors* is published by Sceptre and her two short story collections, *Sweet Home* and *Dance Move*, are published by The Stinging Fly Press and Picador. She was chosen by the Observer as a Best Debut Novelist of 2025 and has been listed for the Gordon Burn Prize, the Republic of Consciousness Prize, the Sunday Times Audible Short Story Award and the Edge Hill Prize. She was awarded the Butler Prize for Literature and the Edge Hill Readers' Prize. Dance Move was a BBC Radio 4 Book at Bedtime. Her writing on arts of all kinds, from sculpture to body-building, has been published in the Guardian and the Quietus among others, and for PVA Books she edited well I just kind of like it, an anthology about art in the home and the home as art. A Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature, she is a frequent broadcaster, interviewer and willing collaborator on all manner of projects. She is also a secondary school teacher in Belfast.

**Seán Farrell** was born and brought up in the Irish midlands. He spent fifteen years in France, and now lives in Sligo with his wife, the writer Elske Rahill, and their four children. *Frogs for Watchdogs*, his debut novel, was published by New Island in February this year and is being re-released by John Murray in spring 2026.



**Seán Farrelly** is a writer based in Dublin. He has had four plays produced and two short stories published in the Irish Times as part of a young writers' supplement. He has worked as a writing mentor and workshop facilitator for young people since 2018. His first book *Tom Burne Has Left the Chat* will be published by Faber May 2026.



Olivia Fitzsimons' debut novel, *The Quiet Whispers Never Stop*, was shortlisted for the Kate O'Brien and Butler Literary Awards and named as one of the Irish Examiner Books of the Year for 2022. She is a contributing editor with The Stinging Fly and commissions/edits the This So-Called Writing Life essay series. Her writing has been awarded Literature Bursaries from the Arts Council of Ireland and Northern Ireland, as well as residencies from Centre Culturel Irlandais Paris and The Dean Art Studios. She has given workshops and masterclasses at universities and festivals across Ireland, and her fiction and essays have appeared in numerous publications, including The Stinging Fly, The Irish Times, Banshee, and broadcast on RTE and BBC Radio 4. She is adapting Donal Ryan's novel, *All We Shall Know*, for the screen and working on her second novel and a short story collection. Olivia is passionate about access to the arts, with a focus on pay and conditions for working-class and diverse writers.

**Shane Hegarty** is a Skerries-based author of books for children, Series such as *Boot* and *Darkmouth* have been translated into 20 languages and his books has been shortlisted for the Irish Book Awards, Waterstones Children's Book Prize and, most recently, the Laugh Out Loud Awards. He is also the Creative Director of the *Magic of Stories, Fingal's Festival of Children's Literature* held in Swords Castle each year.



**Claire Hennessy** is the author of several YA novels and a short story collection for adults, *In The Movie Of Her Life* (Doire Press, 2025). She reviews YA fiction for the Irish Times and facilitates creative writing workshops for a variety of audiences in Dublin and online. She has worked in publishing, arts administration, and education.



**Emmet Kirwan** is a playwright, actor and theatre maker from Tallaght in Dublin. He studied at the Samuel Beckett Centre Trinity College Dublin. For over 20 years Emmet has worked in Irish and British Theatre, performing on many stages including Project Arts, The Abbey, The Gate, Donmar warehouse, The National Theatre and The Soho, as well as working with leading Irish theatre companies such as Landmark, Rough Magic, Fishamble,

This is Pop Baby, Guna Nua, Pan Pan, Corn Exchange and Barabas. His most recent work as a writer and performer is *Accents*. A spoken word verse play in a musical collaboration with Eoin French and directed by Claire O'Reilly. *Emmet's play Dublin Oldschool* directed by Phillip McMahon won the Stewart Parker award for playwriting it has toured internationally and transferred to The Dorfman in The National Theatre for a sell out run. It was adapted into a feature film with Element pictures. Emmet's poem *Heartbreak* from *This is Pop Baby's show RIOT* was adapted into a short film that won an Irish Film and Television Award for Best Short Film. He is also known for writing and starring in the RTE 2 comedy series Sarah and Steve for Accomplice television.

**Niall MacMonagle,** writer and critic, has edited several anthologies including the *Lifelines* series, the *Poetry Now* Textbooks, *TEXT A Transition Year English Reader, Windharp Poems of Ireland since 1916* and *Paul Durcan 80 at 80*. He writes a weekly art column for the Sunday Independent and in 2017 was awarded an Honorary Doctorate by UCD for services to literature.



Christodoulos Makris has published five books of poetry, as well as several limited edition pamphlets, artists' books, digital projects, audiovisual works and other poetry objects. His work has appeared in Granta, The Stinging Fly, The Guardian, The Irish Times, Poetry Ireland Review, and elsewhere. He was Writer in Residence at Maynooth University in 2018-19, with some other recent awards including a Curatorial Commission from Museum of Literature Ireland (MoLI) in 2024; an Artist Residency at Irish Arts Center, New York, in 2024-25; and a Public Poetry Commission from Cúirt International Festival of Literature, Galway, in 2025. He has given numerous talks, lectures and workshops, most recently at Seamus Heaney Centre, Belfast; New York University (NYU); The University of Stuttgart; and for Poetry Ireland's 'Insights' Masterclass Series.

**Anne McDonald** is an award-winning poet, playwright and artist. She has recently won the 12th Annual Bangor Poetry Competition (2025) and the Keshkerrigan Short Story competition (2025). Her first play "Crystal Belles in Bettystown" has been read in her hometown of Bettystown, Co. Meath, and in Dublin City, directed by Claire Galligan. Her poetry collection "Crow's Books" was published in 2020. She has had many short stories and poems published widely in print and online journals, and her work has been reviewed and broadcast on RTE Radio. She is a creative writing facilitator working with adults and is a firm believer in the power of creativity to heal, inspire and connect people. Anne was awarded the Cill Rialag Writing Residency and the John Hewitt Summer School Residency, and her work is supported by the Meath Arts Office.

**Lisa McInerney** is the author of three novels: *The Glorious* Heresies, The Blood Miracles and The Rules of Revelation. She has won the Women's Prize for Fiction, the Desmond Elliott Prize, the RSL Encore Award and the Premio Edoardo Kihlgren for European literature. She is published in 12 languages. In 2022, she was appointed editor of The Stinging Fly.



Henrietta McKervey's fifth novel The Woman in the Water, inspired by a 'lost' character in Daphne du Maurier's suspense classic Rebecca, will be published in spring 2026. She has a Hennessy First Fiction Award and won the inaugural Maeve Binchy Travel Award while studying for an MFA in Creative Writing at UCD. Her Travel Award project, an exploration of the 31 sea areas of the Shipping Forecast, featured on RTÉ and BBC. She curates the ECHOES Maeve Binchy literary festival, programmed International Literature Festival Dublin 2025, and contributes on arts, culture and entertainment to the Irish Times, Irish Independent and the Brendan O'Connor show on RTÉ Radio 1.



Máighréad Medbh is a poet, essayist and performer with nine published books and another two forthcoming from Arlen House and Macha Press. She is interested in the rhythms of experience and in long-form, exploratory works. Her verse fantasy, *Parvit of Agelast*, was shortlisted for the 2017 Pigott Prize. Dedalus Press published her prose work, *Savage Solitude*, in 2013. Máighréad has been published in many Irish and international journals and anthologies, most recently The Hong Kong Review, and holds a PhD in creative writing from DCU. She was 2025 recipient of the Aodh Rua Ó Domhnaill Poetry Exchange residency in Galicia.

Alan Nolan is the author and illustrator of Fintan's Fifteen, Conor's Caveman and the Sam Hannigan series, and he is the illustrator of the popular Gordon's Game books written by Gordon D'Arcy and Paul Howard, as well as Animal Crackers by Sarah Webb. He is the recipient of the Children's Books Ireland 2024 Award for Outstanding Contribution to Children's Books. His book Molly Malone & Bram Stoker in the Riddle of the Disappearing Dickens was shortlisted for An Post Children's Book of the Year 2024 (Senior), and his new book, The Grand Central Cinema Club, is out now. Alan runs illustration and writing workshops for children, and you may see him lugging his drawing board and pencils around various schools and libraries.

Joseph O'Connor's 22 books include the million-selling Star of the Sea, Ghost Light, Shadowplay (Costa Award shortlist), My Father's House and The Ghosts of Rome. His work has been translated into 40 languages and has won many awards including the Prix Madeleine Zepter for European Novel of the Year, an American Library Association Gold Medal, Italy's Premio Acerbi, France's Prix Millepages, and the Irish PEN Award for outstanding achievement in literature. He is Chair of Creative Writing at the University of Limerick.

Roisín O'Donnell is an award-winning Irish writer. Her short story collection *Wild Quiet* was shortlisted for the Kate O'Brien Award and longlisted for the Edge Hill Prize, and she won the An Post Irish Book Award for Short Story of the Year in 2018. Her first novel Nesting was published in January 2025; it became an instant Sunday Times Bestseller and was long listed for the Women's Prize for Fiction. Roisín was listed as one of the Observer's Ten Best New Novelists of 2025. Donal Ryan described *Nesting* as 'one of the best and most important novels of our time,' while the Irish Independent declared it 'A novel that truly matters.'

**Belinda McKeon** is the author of the novels *Solace* (Picador, 2011) and Tender (Picador, 2015). She is the director of the MA in Creative Writing at Maynooth University.



Gill Perdue is the author of bestselling crime novel *If I Tell* which was nominated for Crime Novel of the Year in the An Post Book Awards 2022. *If I Tell* is the first in the Shaw and Darmody series of crime thrillers published by Penguin, set in the fictional Dublin suburb of Clonchapel. A second Shaw and Darmody, *When They See Me*, was published in 2023 to excellent reviews – described as 'a thrilling read,' (The Independent) and 'an impressive follow up.' (Belfast Telegraph.) It was published in paperback in May 2025. In July 2025 her hotly-anticipated third novel, *The Night I Killed Him*, a cold-case murder set in Corrig Point, an exclusive South Dublin yacht club, launched in Dun Laoghaire – where else? This book received rave reviews – with Marian Keys declaring it: 'Utterly magnificent!' *The Night I Killed Him* went straight into the bestseller lists and gained excellent reviews. Her first standalone thriller will appear in 2026.

Fiona Scarlett is from Dublin but now living in Co. Kildare, with her husband and two children. Her debut novel Boys Don't Cry was published by Faber & Faber in April 2021 and was an instant Irish Times Bestseller. It was shortlisted for Newcomer of the Year in the Irish Book Awards, and the Kate O'Brien first novel award. She was recently named as one of An Post Irish Book Awards 'New Voices 20 Best New Irish Writers' and her second novel May All Your Skies Be Blue was published in February of this year. She is currently adapting Boys Don't Cry for screen as well as working on her third novel.

Built in 1908 for Balrothery Rural District Council, it was designed by architect Andrew Scott. The Carnegie Library continued to provide a library service to the people of Swords until a new, larger library was opened at Rathbeale Shopping Centre in early 1983. In 2023 the library underwent extensive renovation, transforming it into a beautiful new Fingal venue aimed at fostering creativity in the community and laying foundations for cultural programming in the Swords Cultural Quarter and the new County Library and Arts Centre, Culture House.
